# AL sets programmes for council session

The Awami League has chalked out programmes for holding its national council session billed for the first week of December.

The programmes were drawn up at a lengthy meeting of the party's Central Working Committee (ALCWC) held yesterday with party president Sheikh Hasina in the chair.

Almost all the 65 members of the ALCWC attended the nine-hour long meeting split into two sessions. The meeting began at 10 am at the party central office at Bangabandhu Avenue and continued till the lunch break at 1 pm. It resumed at five pm at the Bhaban and ended at 11 pm, meeting sources

A member of the ALCWC told The Daily Star last night six teams were formed at the meeting and these would coordinate holding of council sessions of all district units of the party in six divisions. The composition of the teams would be made public today, he added.

Council sessions of district units are scheduled to be completed by November 15.

The national council session of the party was earlier scheduled to be held in September but was deferred due to floods in different parts of the country and parliamentary by-polls in the 15 constituencies of the Jatiya Sangsad.

The meeting also discussed about the extended meeting of the ALCWC, due to be held on October 11. Members of the AL-CWC. National Executive Committee, presidium advisory committee and presidents and general secretaries of the district units are likely to attend the meeting.

A party press release on yesterday's meeting, issued late last night, did not give details about the issues discussed.

Talking over telephone last night, some leaders who attended the meeting gave the impression that a wide-range of organisational and political is-See Page 12 Col 8

# Frequent load-shedding intentional: Khaleda

Leader of the Opposition in Parliament Begum Khaleda Zia yesterday said the prevailing power disruption is being created 'intentionally' to prepare ground for importing electricity from India, reports UNB.

Power plants are also being kept inoperative," she said while addressing a meeting with the Hazaribagh Jatiyatabadi Tannery Sramik Dal at her Minto Road official residence in the

Begum Zia said: We have no need to import power from any country. Bangladesh has adequate power generation capacity. If all the power plants can be made operational, the country's demand will be fulfilled.

She charged the ruling party with hatching conspiracy to make Bangladesh not only a market for foreign products but also a province of another country. She said: "They truling party) have already started working according to the conspiracy.

The BNP chairperson also accused the government of planning to give transit to India. "The nationalist forces will have to be united to save the country from these conspiracles and protect its indepen dence and sovereignty," she

There seems to be no difference between the former autocrat and the present government, the Leader of the Opposi tion said. "They talk about democracy, but do not practise. They talk about voting rights. but do not actually believe in

She said the ruling party has started running the country in "Baksali" style by unleashing repression and torture on the people, particularly, on BNP workers. 'We want to see the end of these repressions," she added.

## CID interrogating Taher Thakur

CID personnel yesterday began interrogating former state minister Taheruddin Thakur on his alleged involvement in the jail killing of November 3

CID is also probing his al-leged links with the killing of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman on August 15 that year.

Taheruddin was arrested Wednesday night in connection with the killing of Bangabandhu and was now under CID custody on an eight-day remand, that began on Thursday.

He was also shown arrested in the killing of four national leaders - Tajuddin Ahmed. Syed Nazrul Islam, Kamruzzaman and Mansur Ali - inside the Dhaka Central Jail on November 3, 1975, and was remanded for interrogation in this regard, according to CID

CID got some 'important information from Taher Uddin regarding the jail killing, police officialsaid yesterday.

## No progress in BNP plan for 'shadow cabinet'

Participants, visitors and foreign buyers who started gathering there at 8 am had to wait for more than 1 and half an hour to enter the exhibition pandel, set up at the ground floor of the hotel.


