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Finding the Centre

In a report, focused on the lackadaisical promotion and development of the private sector, the World Bank has put forward a package of suggestions for a turn-around in the situation. Three of them are purely in the nature of an organisational recipe and by the same token concrete and palpable while two have to do with changes in the current pattern of emphases.

In the first category fall the recommendations for a separate ministry for the private sector, transfer of the state-owned enterprises from the ministries of commerce, industry, textiles and jute to a single ministry, and formation of a prime minister's advisory council comprising key ministers and secretaries and top business leaders representing both the economic sectors and the territorial regions. The last two suggestions are for: (a) ensuring orchestration, accountability and userfriendliness in the workings of various organisations involved in private sector development, especially the BOI, EPB and BEPZA; and (b) establishing a process of consultation between the government and the private investors to bring to bear private sector participation on policy formulation.

The World Bank's prime concern has been the 'snail's pace' in the implementation of the privatisation programme. The rationale for this priority is the abysmally poor performance by the state-owned enterprises and their consequent loss accumulations that run counter to the principle of competitiveness which is key to free market operations. To address this focal point of the WB's concern what we need is finding a centre for the right approach. The centre lies in not only mustering but also applying an appropriate political will. Whether it is a question of disinvesting the lossmaking public sector enterprises or making the retained ones efficient and useful, political will is the central necessity.

If that be so, then the World Bank's advocacy of a prime minister's advisory council ought to take precedence over all other suggestions it has made including that of a new ministry for the private sector. If the key ministers and secretaries, and leading businessmen, regardless of their political affiliations, work in the council with the Prime Minister presiding and the relevant parliamentary committees providing political will to it there is no reason why it cannot act as a superministry. Proliferation of ministries cannot produce a breakthrough, but a compact, coordinating body like the one suggested by the WB most probably will.

Vanishing Act in Japan

It's a shame that Bangladesh had to be told — in writing as well as in person — of the abominable practice of trainees sent to Japan by government disappearing altogether. Didn't the government know of our trainees regularly abusing the host country's hospitality at the cost of good state-tostate relationship?

Now that the worst has happened, the government must act without fail and delay. The threeday annual consultation session between the governments of Japan and Bangladesh began in Dhaka on Sunday and the Japanese delegation did not lose time to formally complain about the vanishing Bangladeshi trainees. This they did with an unmistakable touch of exasperation. Steering clear of rudeness they, however, made their message unambiguous saying that the disappearances would tell upon the Japanese capacity to entertain trainees from this land. If our government cares for the finesse practised in the intercourse of nations, it would know the ultimate in shaming has been reached.

If the government has no power to ensure proper conduct abroad of persons sent out by itself, it should better give up training people overseas. Experience says this should apply not only to government employees but also cover athletes and teachers and the motley job-seekers.

And if we must send people out for a meaningful import of technology, the government must prove to itself and to foreign governments that it can make its people overseas behave. There are so many ways open to government to do this. After all the truant Bangladeshis do not disappear with their parents and kins and property back home.

We want the government to set about with determination to get the problem over with without needing much of a reaction time. The fact that Japan is the biggest of bilateral donors to Bangladesh's development is quite beside the point here. We should be responsible for our citizens' conduct abroad irrespective of their temporary domicile.

In the Zoo Alone?

The British Royalty's timely and profound pronouncements on nature, wildlife preservation and trends in architecture have been almost proverbial in their reverberations across the receptive circles around the world. While the Queen's spouse Prince Philip is the dour defender of wildlife, their son, Prince Charles, the heir apparent, has been an outspoken champion of architectural purity in the masonry world.

At the Berlin conference of the World Wide Fund (WWF) For Nature, Prince Philip was at his characteristic best, so far as we are concerned, when he observed that preservation of the Sundarbans was needed not for any particular country but for the sake of the beauty of the world nature. His worry stemmed from the fast depletion of the tiger and deer populations in the longest-ranging mangrove forest in the world.

The invasive human habitations have led to the shrinkage of foraging grounds for the animals. 



Undoubtedly the US has done a great job so far but as the negotiations have reached a critical stage and the present Israeli rightist government is virtually opposed to Israeli withdrawal from the remaining occupied land. Afghanistan is now a country of widespread violence. death and destruction which the country can no longer afford. Possibility of effective reconciliation between feuding parties looks dim because the Taliban's record of honouring truce or agreements is very poor. There is a little bit hope that already UN and a few other global powers have expressed their dismay at and disapproval of the manner in which the militia are conducting themselves.

However, the United States is pressing hard the ruling Afghan faction to work towards national reconciliation. The US is also raising concern in respect of human rights, women's rights, international terrorism and narcotics trade.

Reflecting growing alarm in Russia over the victory of the Islamic milit**ants in** Afghanistan President Boris Yeltsin called for a regional summit and had talks with his foreign minister. The secretary general of the UN warned the Taliban saying that the gender discrimination could seriously affect the UN relief operation and ongoing relief programmes. The United States had also warned the Taliban against curtailment of women's rights and human rights at large.

Afghanistan under of Taliban is marching towards such a destination which cannot be supported by conscious and sensible people of the world.
