US Air Force One carrying Clinton and his wife Hillary arrived at Bangkok's military airport from Manila where the US President had been attending the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation forum summit, reports AFP.

## JSD nat'l convention tomorrow



## Agreement at APEC summit

## Free trade by 2020, tariff cut on high-tech goods

SUBIC BAY (Philippines), Nov 25: A key Asia-Pacific economic summit today agreed to start tearing down trade barriers from January 1 and gave surprise support to a US proposal for slashing tariffs on high-tech goods, reports AFP.

The high-powered meeting of Clinton, Chinese President Jiang Zemin, Japanese Prime Minister Ryutaro Hashimoto and 15 other leaders promised to achieve free trade by 2020.

Clinton scored a double victory in summit, coming away with support — albeit qualified — for a contentious US proposal to liberalise trade in computers and related products by 2000.

That followed his groundbreaking agreement with Jiang at an informal meeting the day before for reciprocal state visits that effectively signalled the thaw of seven years' frosty relations between the two powers.

The result of the summit in the former US naval base of Subic Bay was "a national achievement," said John Wolf, the United States' coordinator for the 16-member Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC).

We are delighted with the outcome of the summit. It achieved a number of things for

which we have been working very hard through the years," he told reporters.

During the summit, Jiang promised that as part of Beijing's commitment to the free trade goal, China would slash import tariffs from 23 per cent to just 15 per cent by 2000.

The group's ambitious liberalisation schedule, tagged the Manila action plan for APEC, commits APEC to free trade

among developed countries by 2010 and 2020 for the rest.

In their statement, titled "From Vision to Action," they agreed to implement 16 initiatives from January 1.

The APEC leaders gave their support to a principle for free trade in the region at a summit in Bogor, Indonesia in 1993 and drafted a framework for action a year later in Osaka, Japan.

The trade liberalisation deal garnered little sympathy among left-wing Filipinos who charge lowering trade barriers will harm the poor in a country that relies heavily on agricultural products.

Some 10,000 protesters, who had staged a massive overnight motorcade from Manila towards the Summit site in Subic Bay, were blocked by 2,000 riot police and an overturned crane

## Yasmin murder case: Evidences of 3 recorded

RANGPUR, Nov 25: Trial of the Yasmin murder case resumed today in the Special Court, Rangpur.

Of the total nine accused in the case, three were charged under the Women and Child Repression Control Act (64) and their trial started in court.

The three are former ASI Moinul Haque, former constable Abdus Sattar and former driver Amrita Lal Barman. They are now under custody in jail hazard.

Special Court Judge Abdul Matin who is also the district and sessions judge, Rangpur, recorded depositions of three witnesses today. They were mother of Yasmin Sharifa Begum, CID investigation officer II OJ Alzal Hossain and Waheda Khatoum, mother-in-law of house lord Abdul Ahsan Ahmed Ali of Dhamondi, Dhaka in whose house Yasmin worked as a maid.

The mother of Yasmin, during submission of deposition was seen weeping. During cross

## BAC probe into 'irregularities' in BB proposed

The Finance Ministry has sent a proposal to relevant authorities for a probe by the Bureau of Anti-corruption (BAC) into alleged irregularities by a section of the 'high-ups' in Bangladesh Bank (BB), according to informed sources.

A Finance Ministry probe produced earlier by Finance Secretary Aktar Ali Khan had detected irregularities and flouting of rules in the central bank in granting licences to a number of non-banking financial institutions.

Bangladesh Bank Governor Khorshed Alam was removed barely three weeks before the expiry of his contract service following submission of the probe report.

The probe in October came in the wake of sudden removal of Deputy Governor Mahbubur Rahman Khan, who had been blamed for much of the alleged irregularities. He allegedly did

## Complaint with Speaker, copy to UNDP

## JS Task Force constituted without consulting BNP

The BNP has lodged a complaint with the Speaker that the party was neither consulted while constituting the Jatiya Sangsads Task Force nor taken into confidence in conducting its activities, sources in the party said.

A seven-member Task Force, headed by Speaker Humayun Rashid Chowdhury was formed on October 30 to make recommendations for more effective functioning of the Jatiya Sangsads and strengthening support services for lawmakers and the JS Secretariat. The Task Force includes three MPs from Awami League, two from BNP and one from Jatiya Party.

The opposition BNP has also sent a copy of the complaint to the UNDP, the coordinating body of the funding agencies to help implementation of recommendations to be made by the Task Force, the sources added.

Expressing full agreement with the objectives set for the Task Force, the BNP in its written complaint said that the way the Task Force was constituted, and now working, would not produce a positive result, the BNP sources said. The party also requested the Speaker to take necessary steps to make the body work effectively on the basis of consensus on the issue.

The letter of complaint, signed by Khandaker Delwar Hossain, Chief Whip of the Opposition in Parliament and a top-ranking leader of the BNP, was submitted to the Speaker on October 19.

Talking to this correspondent Sunday night, Delwar said: 'We wholeheartedly welcome the idea of the Task Force and the UNDP efforts to modernise the JS Secretariat. We strongly feel that reforms in both the institutional and operational sectors are imperative for the effective functioning of

Parliament.

"But the problem is that the ruling Awami League refuses to understand that the plans should be made in agreement with the Opposition," Delwar added.

Requested to substantiate the allegation, the Opposition Chief Whip said: "Two BNP legislators had been included in the Task Force without any prior consultation with the party, then a project director was appointed for the national project undertaken by the Task Force without consulting us."

The Chief Whip further alleged that the Task Force took up a programme to visit parliaments of some other countries without any discussion with the BNP.

"The attitude is inconsistent with the ruling party's slogan of running the parliament on the basis of consensus between

## People exposed to constant air pollution should use masks

People who spend time on the city roads as part of their jobs are most vulnerable to a wide-range of health problems, doctors, environmentalists and health workers said.

They stressed the need for introducing pollution masks to protect people such as traffic policemen, transport workers, rickshaw pullers, taxi-drivers, roadside vendors and thousands of others who are constantly exposed to an increasing level of air pollution during their normal duties.

Moreover, relevant government agencies should take stern action against the air polluters and conduct health awareness campaigns across the country.

We have lots of policemen and BDR personnel coming to us with respiratory problems," Ali Hossain said.

The first and most effective protection from air pollution is to use a pollution mask whenever someone is required to do his job in the heavy traffic of

the city on a regular basis, doctors and environmentalists pointed out.

## BCL leader of Tejgaon Polytech shot dead, protesters torch ward commissioner's office

A Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) leader of the Tejgaon Polytechnic Institute was shot dead in the city yesterday.

A gang of six unidentified gunmen shot Ziaur Rahman Patwari alias Reaz, 23, at point-blank range near the campus at around 11:30 am. A third year student of the Mechanical Department, he was immediately taken to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital

(DMCH) where doctors declared him dead, police said.

The reason behind the killing could not be known immediately.

Zia, son of Motiur Rahman Patwari of Bakarpur in Chandpur district, was made the convenor of the BCL unit of the institute on Sunday, police said adding he was a resident of Chamlibagh in Shantinagar area.

Zia was taking tea with some of his friends at a roadside stall, known as 'Mama tea stall' at Begumganj near the institute, at about 11:20 am. A group of around six armed men came in a white colour car and gheraoed Zia and his friends at the stall.

They then fired on him at close range.

According to hospital and police sources, two bullets hit Zia's abdomen and left arm. Zia died at about 1 pm.

None was arrested in connection with the murder till last night.

UNB adds: The killing sparked off violent protests as a group of Chhatra League (S-P) activists later at night set ablaze the local ward commissioner's office blaming him for the murder.

Witnesses said the enraged

## Cabinet okays refixing of DESA area, draft seed bill

The Cabinet yesterday approved the proposal for refixing the area under the Dhaka Electric Supply Authority (DESA), according to official sources.

The approval was given at the weekly Cabinet meeting held at the Prime Minister's office with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in the chair.

The Cabinet also okayed the draft bill of "The Seed (Amendment) Act 1996", a minister who attended the meeting told The Daily Star.

At the meeting, Sheikh Hasina asked her Cabinet colleagues to make sure that the fertilisers reach the cultivators at the grassroots level.

The Prime Minister asked the ministers to keep an eye on the fertiliser distribution system to make sure that it reaches the cultivators across the country, the minister said.

With the passage of the seed bill, only those getting permission of the National Seed Board would be able to import various types of seeds, he said.

The decision was made to ensure import of quality seeds which would have positive implications in the production of various foodgrains, the minister added.

## Jyoti Basu due tomorrow

Chief Minister of the Indian state of West Bengal Jyoti Basu arrives in the city tomorrow afternoon on a five-day official visit to Bangladesh.

He will be accompanied by West Bengal Minister for Home, Information and Cultural Affairs Buddha Dev Bhattacharjee, Minister for Finance and Excise Asim Dasgupta and the Chief Secretary and Waterways Secretary.

Basu's visit is considered crucial in finalising a water-sharing agreement between Dhaka and Delhi. He is coming at the invitation of Foreign Minister Abdus Samad Azad, who had earlier made a trip to Calcutta at the invitation of the former.

The West Bengal Chief Minister would be received by the foreign minister. He would be staying at Sonargaon Hotel.
