Govt-NGO jt move to save public health suggested

Arsenic pollution

The leader of a six-member medical team now conducting a research in the arsenic polluted areas yesterday stressed the need for a joint move of the government and the NGOs to save public health from the danger of this position, reports BSS.

"The effect of arsenic in the human body is horrifying and endangers public health in the arsenic infested areas," Dr Shibtosh Roy of Dhaka Community Hospital Trust told newsmen in the city.

His team has been conduct ing a research on arsenic effect in four villages of Pabna district, eight villages of Ishwardi district, eight villages of Kush tia district and one village of Meherpur district for the last three months.

Dr Roy said a laboratory should immediately be established to test the drinking waters of the affected areas.

Referring to the research study. Dr Roy said his team collected skin, nail, hair and urine of 53 male and female of the af fected areas and found arsenic in the urine of 94.34 per cent people, in the nail of 98.12 per cent people and 100 per cent skin of the people

Besides. 10 persons with urine, 21 persons with nails and 11 persons with skin were separately tested and the team found arsenic effect by 90 per cent, 85.72 per cent and 100 per cent respectively

The water of 41 tubewells of the arsenic affected areas were also tested by the team members during their research and they found 65.88 per cent of the tubewells had presence of arsenic above the normal level.

According to the test result Dr Roy said, 28 per cent of the affected people had arsenic in their urine by 100 to 1.500 times above the normal level. 47 per cent had arsenic in their nails eight to 20 times more than the normal level and 98 per cent had arsenic on their skins by 100 to 15,000 times above the normal level.

Effective control of STD can reduce HIV incidence

Community-based trials in Tanzania and Thailand have shown that HIV infection which cause the fatal disease AIDS can be prevented, a meeting of national programme managers from Southeast Asia was told here yesterday, reports UNB.

The lessons of this success is being learnt in other countries of Southeast Asia including Bangladesh, where trial programmes for prevention of HIV are already underway.

"Control of sexually trans mitted diseases is one of the main strategies to prevent HIV" World Health Organisation (WHO) expert S Pattanayak told the 12th regional meeting of National AIDS Programme Managers that began here in the morning. The three-day meeting will end Thursday.

The meeting, organised annually by WHO Southeast Asia Region Office (Searo), is being attended by experts on AIDS and public health from India. Indonesia. Thailand, Mayan mar, Nepal, Bhutan, Maldives, Sri Lanka and host Bangladesh.





On the Indian side, among the many ways they mishandled relations with Bangladesh. the most vicious was the handling of the water sharing issue Following the murder of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman Bangladesh became an 'unfriendly neighbour' in the Indian policy makers' eyes to be subjected to whatever such a neighbour deserves. Our concerns never received the attention or seriousness that one would expect from a giant and disproportionately powerful neighbour. Our share of the Ganges water was brought down from 44,000 cusec agreed to under Sheikh Mujib, to 34,500 under President Ziaur Rahman. Later, even that was allowed to lapse, and never renewed.

ter issue it will become clear that for 9 months out of the year the problem does not exist because there is either enough or surplus water. It is only the three lean months when we have shortage, out of which there is only one month when the crisis is really acute. In other words it has been our inability to solve this problem that lasts for three months (or at best four) which has caused such havoc to our people and land, and consequently made the Bangladesh-India relations

If we really examine the wa-

so bitter. Every aspect of our bilateral relations got nega tively affected because of the water issue and as a result no progress could be made on many other areas where cooperative relationship could have been of great mutual benefit. As we see it, India put the

water sharing problem with Bangladesh in the back burner and showed an incredible callousness as to its consequences on us. In fact Bangladesh was not on India's priority agenda for the last two decades. And on our side, we preferred to use it for domestic politics. Our military or civilian faced military governments, lacking popular support found India baiting a convenient tool, for which Indian policy on water became the natural logic. Begum Zia's elected government, though not belonging to the two above categories, essentially followed the same policy as far as the water issue was concerned.
