## DID U' KNOW?

(The Professor does)

**T**HAT Franz Beckenbauer (b. 1945) of Germany, won the World Soccer Championship titles as both a player and a coach. Beckenbauer was born in Munich. Originally a midfielder, he made a mid-career switch to the libero, or sweeper, position, which altered the course of soccer tactics by adding an attacking dimension to what had traditionally been exclusively a defensive position.

Beckenbauer's strong-willed personality and his technical and tactical command of the game made him an ideal captain. He led his club, Bayern Munich, to three consecutive European titles in 1974, 1975, and 1976. In 1974 he was the captain of the West German national team that won the World Cup. In 1976, after being voted European Player of the Year for the second time, Beckenbauer shocked the soccer world by moving to the United States to join the New York Cosmos of the North American Soccer League (NASL).

In 1984 Beckenbauer became the soccer coach of West Germany, leading the team to two World Cup finals. Although in 1986 his West German team lost to Argentina, he coached his team to victory over the same opponent in 1990.

Hail Beckenbauer!

# Belarus woman wins Macao race

**MACAO, Dec 1:** Belarus woman Elena Makova edged defending champion Li Yemel of China in the Macao marathon race here today clocking two hours, 40 minutes and 13 seconds, reports Xinhua.

Li came second at 2:45:53, followed by Australian Lynn Clayton in 2:46:03. Poland's Krystina Kuta won the fourth place at 2:48:03.

Makolova, 27, said that she was in good shape during the race. She lost two kilograms after the race to weigh at 44 kilograms.

The Belarus first participated in international marathon in April 1995, and this is the second victory since her triumph in the Las Vegas marathon last February.

# Zahid's weapon zaps NZ

**RAWALPINDI, Dec 1:** Debutant Mohammad Zahid captured seven wickets to steer Pakistan to a thumping victory by an innings and 13 runs against New Zealand in their second cricket Test here today, reports AFP.

Zahid's devastating pace bowling earned him the man-of-the-match title as well as the distinction of becoming the first Pakistani to claim a total of 11 wickets in a debut Test match.

Pakistan levelled the series 1-1 after having lost the first Test at Lahore last week.

"There was nothing wrong with the wicket, but Pakistan played very good and they thoroughly deserved the victory," said New Zealand captain Lee Germon.

Zahid, 20, who replaced injured pacer Waqar Younis, said he was "delighted" to learn that he had created Pakistani cricket history.

Pakistani cricket manager Mushtaq Mohammad said Zahid was "a yard or two quicker" than Waqar Younis, known as the world's fastest bowler.

New Zealand were off to a confident start on Saturday after Pakistan secured a 181 lead scoring 430 in reply to New Zealand's 249 in the first innings.

Resuming today at their overnight 69 for no loss, the Kiwi openers, Bryan Young and Justin Vaughan, took the score to 82.

Vaughan, who scored 27, was trapped lbw by Zahid.

After that, a sensational rout saw the Kiwis wickets falling like pins, with nine batsmen off for only 86 runs.

Zahid finished with match figures of 11 wickets for 130 runs, including eight lbw decisions.

Only opener Bryan Young withstood the Pakistani attack, to score a half century. Young was out when he played a reckless shot off Zahid offering a simple catch to Zahoor Elahi in the gully.

Saeed Anwar, who was given the Pakistan captaincy in place of the injured Wasim Akram said, "I am very, very happy."

"The boys worked hard and our batting clicked this time," said the prolific batsman, who himself made a breezy 149.

Anwar praised leg-spinner Mushtaq Ahmed and Zahid for their "brilliant" performances with the ball.

He also commended New Zealand saying "They are a very fighting side and they have given us a very good series."

# Bishop baffles Aussies

**SYDNEY, Dec 1:** All rounder Ian Bishop starred with both bat and ball Sunday as the West Indies kept alive their hopes of winning the second Test against Australia at the Sydney Cricket Ground, reports AP.

Bishop followed up a career-best innings of 48 by taking two Australian second innings wickets as the home team eked out a 104-run lead to stumps on the third day.

Australia — 27 runs in front thanks to their first innings' total of 331 — were 77 for the loss of two wickets with Matthew Elliott (45 not out) and Mark Waugh (2 not out) at the crease.

Bishop dismissed both Mark Taylor and Ricky Ponting.

Glen McGrath, armed with the second new ball, earlier broke the back of the West Indies' first innings with a two-wicket spell and the visitors were bowled out for 304.

As both teams struggled to gain the upper hand, disciplined bowling prevailed over some very poor batting.

The West Indies were 223 for four at lunch having lost overnight batsman Carl Hooper for 27.

The first Test century-maker faced 34 balls before being adjudged lbw before offering no shot to a Shane Warne full length delivery.

English umpire David Shepherd was quick in deciding on Hooper's fate and the dismissal lifted the lbw tally in the series to 8-1 in favour of the Australians.

After a painfully slow pre-lunch session, the West Indies lost three wickets for 14 runs off 33 balls — including Shivnarine Chanderpaul and Jimmy Adams, who figured in a 63-run stand for the fifth wicket.

McGrath claimed Adams (30) and Courtney Browne (0) with the second and last deliveries of his fourth over after lunch.

Adams miscued an on-drive to Michael Bevan at short leg, while Browne drove a chest-high catch to Greg Blewett at mid-off.

Bishop then found a perfect ally in Curtly Ambrose and in the next 39 minutes the pair put on 43 runs for the eighth wicket before Jason Gillespie struck for his first Test wicket on his debut.

Gillespie knocked back Ambrose's off stump and 13 runs later enticed Kenny Benjamin to bottom edge a full toss onto his off stump.

Bishop's vision of his maiden Test half-century vanished when he slugged at leg spinner Warne and was caught by Elliott in the deep.

Bishop hit six boundaries off 79 balls in his determined innings.

McGrath finished with four for 82 from 31 hostile overs, giving him a tally of 10 wickets at an average of 17.4 for the series.

Warne, showing signs of returning to his best, collected three wickets costing him 65 runs, while Gillespie was well rewarded with figures of two for 62.

Warne took his tally to 214 wickets placing him seventh behind Dennis Lillee (1,355 wickets), Craig McDermott (291), Richie Benaud (248), Graham McKenzie (246), Ray Lindwall (228) and Clarrie Grimmett (216) on the all time Australian wicket-takers list.

# Pak squad for Champions' Trophy

**KARACHI, Dec 1:** Pakistan Saturday announced a 16-member hockey team for the 18th Champions' Trophy to be played at Madras, India, from December 5, bringing in eight new players, reports AFP.

This is a team with new players as we are trying to build a solid squad for the next Olympics and the World Cup, chief Pakistani selector Ziaur-Raham Jamali told reporters.

The next World Cup is to be held in Holland in 1998 and the Olympic in Sydney, Australia, in 2000.

Two senior players, Shahbaz Jr and Tahir Zaman, have been left out. Officials said Zaman had a shoulder injury and Shahbaz was suffering from an eye ailment.

The team is also without several other well known players, including Shahbaz Ahmad, who played in the last Atlanta Olympics.

Observers said the introduction of the new blood was also necessitated by problems being faced by senior players and management.

Senior players had revolted against the hockey management by refusing to go to Atlanta Olympics over the allegedly authoritarian attitude of the managers and grievances related to payments.

Holland, Australia, Spain, Germany and host India will be the other competitors in the Madras tournament. Pakistan has won the trophy three times during the last 17 competitions.

# Davis Cup France take the lead

**MALMO, Sweden, Dec 1:** France opened a 2-1 lead over Sweden in the Davis Cup final on Saturday when Guy Forget and Guillaume Raoux won the doubles 6-3, 1-6, 6-3, 6-3 over Jonas Bjorkman and Nicklas Kulti in a match of see-sawing fortunes, reports Reuter.

Nerves played a key part in the match, with no player able to resist the palpable tension in the huge converted boat-building shed being used for the final.

Bjorkman, recently returned from a knee injury, was the most fragile, losing his first service game in the opening set and dropping it again three more times to allow the French pair through.

The experienced Forget, 31, and his 26-year-old partner wobbled in the second set, losing their deuce touch at the net as the Swedes wrapped it up in just 24 minutes.

But the French roared back and won the next five games in a row as they took the third set before attacking Bjorkman again in the fourth.

The hapless Swede dropped his serve in the sixth and ninth games with Forget putting away a forehand cross-court winner.

The win left the Swedish favourites in a tight spot with Stefan Edberg, who twisted his ankle on Friday, doubtful for the reverse singles on Sunday.

# Seizinger wins WC downhill race

**LAKE LOUISE, Canada, Dec 1:** Germany's Katja Seizinger won Saturday's World Cup downhill race here Saturday on a fast course, in 1 min 41.91 secs with France's Carole Montillet taking second place just 0.60 seconds behind, reports AFP.

Sweden's Pernilla Wiberg who finished third ahead of 1994 and 1995 Lake Louise winner Picabo Street, appeared happy with her performance especially as she is still recovering from recent surgery.

Both Seizinger and Montillet admitted they were surprised at their fast times on the course which had been heated so it would ice.

Seizinger was naturally jubilant.

"I had no problems," she said.

# India date with an incubus

**CALCUTTA, Nov 1:** A sensational debut bowling performance by 25-year-old Lance Klusener enabled South Africa to win the second Test against India by 329 runs at Eden Gardens today, reports Reuter.

Mohammad Azharuddin and Rahul Dravid began the day by hitting some scintillating shots with Azharuddin cutting and driving Klusener for successive fours.

But Dravid's dismissal at 88 led to the Indian collapse.

Dravid, who opened the Indian innings, got clean bowled to a yorker from Brian McMillan at his personal score of 23.

McMillan hastened the Indian fall by taking three catches off the bowling of Klusener at slips.

Left-handed batsman Sunil Joshi was the next to go as he gave a simple catch to McMillan at slips off the bowling of Klusener.

Azharuddin, who scored a breezy 52, was Klusener's next victim when he nicked out a catch to McMillan. Srivasth followed in a similar fashion.

Anil Kumble and Narendra Hirwani failed to provide much resistance as the Indian batting folded up at 137, some 93 minutes after the resumption of play.

Klusener will spearhead the South African bowling attack at Kanpur in the third and final Test, scheduled to begin on December 8, in the absence of Allan Donald who is leaving for home following a heel injury.

South African opener Gary Kirsten, with a century in each innings, piped Klusener to the man-of-the-match award.

Hansie Cronje, the victorious captain, said he was particularly pleased with the way his team batted.

"It was a beautiful Test match wicket and our batsmen really battled well, probably the best on the tour," he said.

It was India's second defeat in 17 home Tests since 1990 and Sachin Tendulkar's first as captain after winning the one-off Test against Australia and the first Test against South Africa in Ahmedabad.

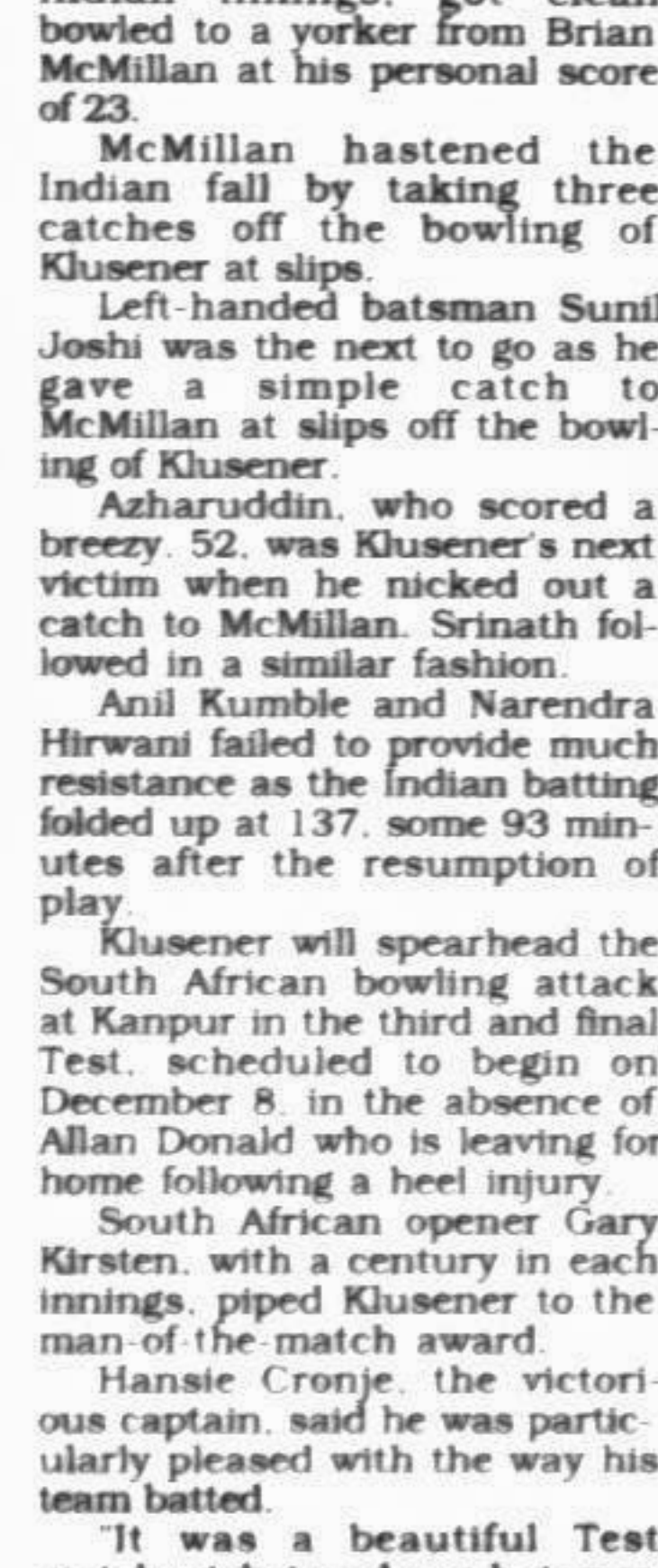

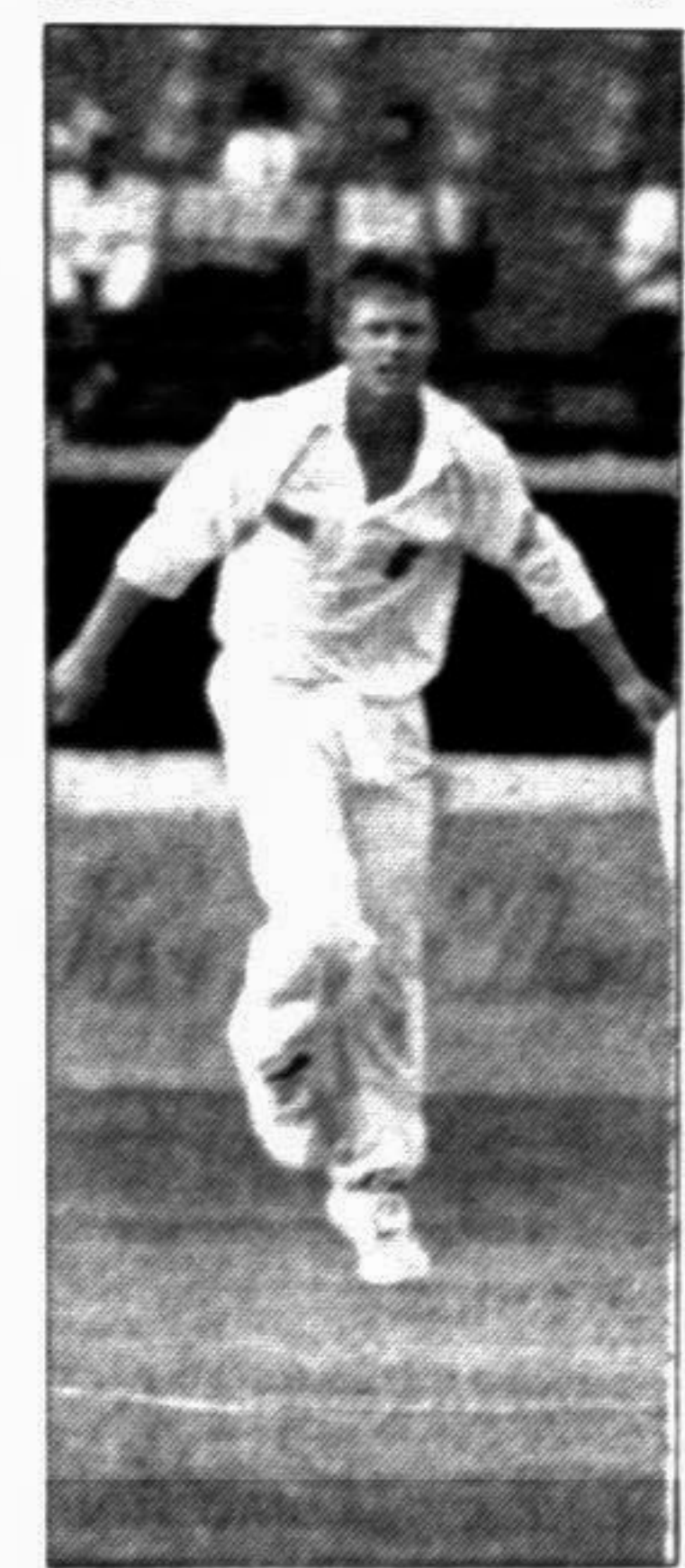

# Sachin faces odd balls

**CALCUTTA, Dec 1:** Indian skipper Sachin Tendulkar today said dropped catches, absence of a third seamer and lack of application by the batsmen were the main reasons for India's defeat in the second Test against South Africa, reports PTI.

"Had we taken some crucial catches, particularly those of Hudson and Kirsten in the first innings we could have made a match out of it. These catches would have lifted the side and put pressure on the South Africans, a sombre Tendulkar told reporters at a post-match press conference here.

Apparently bewildered with the behaviour of the Eden Gardens wicket during the Test, particularly in comparison to the World Cup when the ball had turned viciously, he said, "We missed a seamer. But how do we know that it would be in this way?" He, however, refused to blame the wicket for the defeat saying at the international level a team has to be prepared to play on any track.

Asked whether he preferred more interaction between the team management and the organising centre as far as the nature of the wicket was concerned, the Indian captain tersely replied, "No, that's the job of the officials."

Referring to the failure of

most of the established batsmen he said, "We have to apply ourselves more to occupy the crease for a longer duration. The longer we stay, more is the chance of piling up good scores."

Asked whether he felt that Azharuddin had got out to rash shots in both the innings, Tendulkar said while batsmen like Boycott and Gavaskar would always play cautiously, the same cannot be expected of the likes of Azharuddin and Vivian Richards who always go for their shots.

Disagreeing with a questioner that India lacked motivation, Tendulkar said, "It was simply not our day, nothing went right."

Refusing to blame the spinners who had failed to click in the match he said they got no assistance from the wicket.

Asked whether he felt left-handed batsman Sourav Ganguly was not fully fit, Tendulkar said, "He went

Lal claimed he had introduced a number of changes in approach to fielding. "Fitness does not come in days, it takes time. Ultimately the responsibility is on the boys."

A visibly elated South African skipper Hansie Cronje, who admitted that he had not expected to wrap up the Indian innings so quickly today, attributed his side's victory to "team performance. The batsmen set up the win, the bowlers finished the work."

Praising debutant speedster Lance Klusener's heroic performance, he said, "Klusener learnt on Friday that playing Test cricket was tough. He was particularly unfortunate to run into a world class batsman like Azharuddin."

Cronje revealed that the newcomer was a little frustrated when everything was going wrong for him till his fifth over in the second innings. "He told me that it was frustrating that he waited for so long for this day to happen and when it does happen, everything seemed to go wrong. I changed his end and immediately he tasted success."

# Cairns fined

**RAWALPINDI, Dec 1:** New Zealand bowler Chris Cairns was fined 50 per cent of his match fee on Saturday for disrupting an umpiring decision during the third day of the second Test against Pakistan, reports Reuter.

Match referee Cammie Smith said in a statement Cairns had been penalised for breaching the players' code of conduct.

Cairns punched the air in disbelief after Pakistani umpire Javed Akhtar had turned down his vociferous leg before appeal against Salim Malik.

# KL keen to host Asian Games

**KUALA LUMPUR, Dec 1:** Malaysia will bid to host the 2006 Asian Games, Olympic Council of Malaysia (OCM) president Hamzah Abu Samah said Saturday, reports AP.

Hamzah said the Malaysia would officially make its bid at the Asian Games Federation meeting in Bangkok next week when he leads Malaysia's delegation to the meeting.

"We have the backing of the government to bid for the Asian Games and has the financial means to take on the job," he said at the 17th biennial OCM general meeting.

Hamzah said Malaysia, which will host the 1998 Commonwealth Games, would have adequate facilities by then to host the Astad by the year 2006.



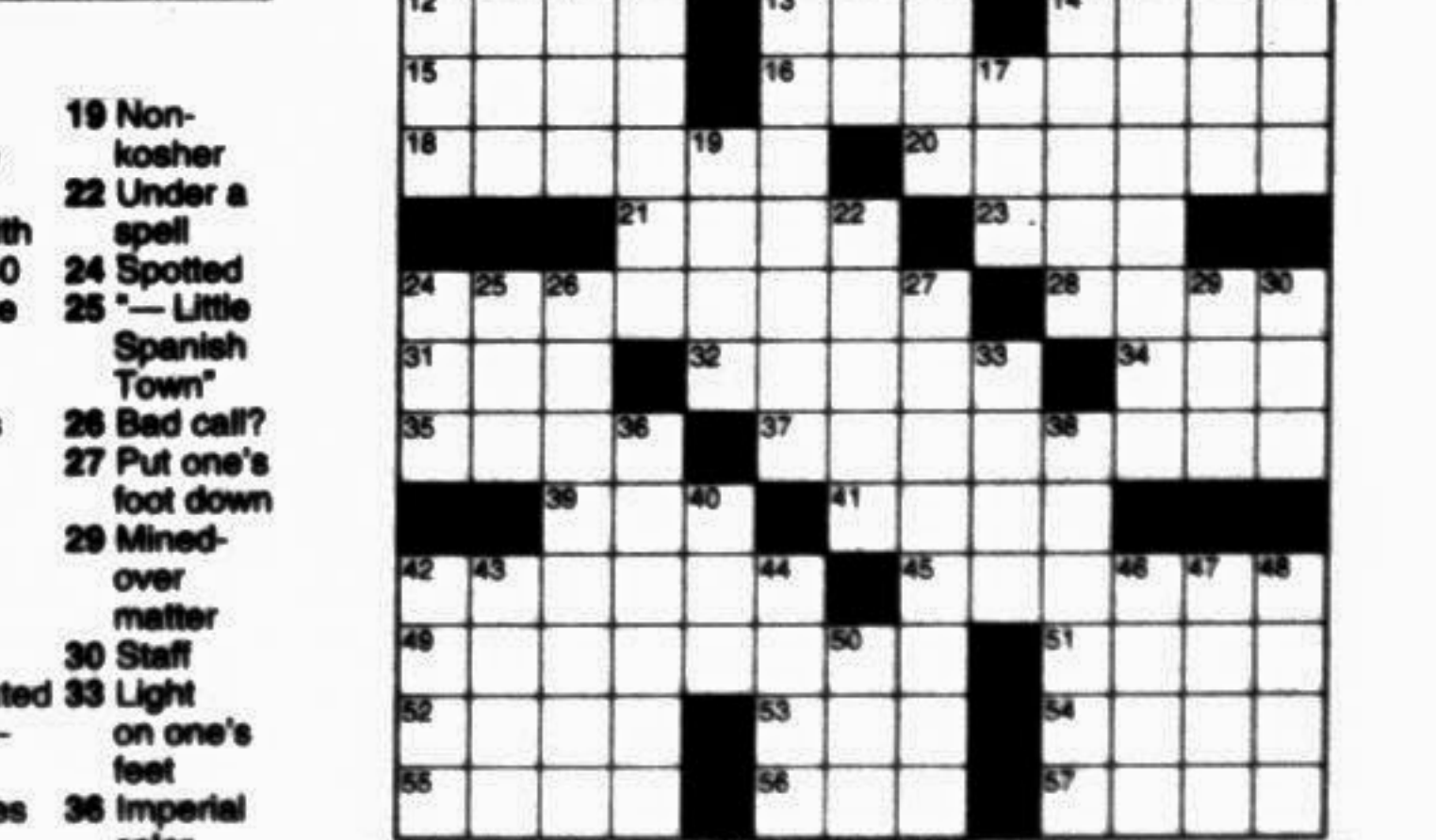
