Valladolid hold Madrid

VALLADOLID, Spain, Dec 22: Rafael Alkorta's 58th-minute miscue, knocking the ball into his own net, cost Real Madrid on Saturday, enabling Valladolid to hold the Spanish league leaders to a 1-1 draw, reports AP.

The own goal came after Fernando Sanchez sparked Valladolid's offence in the second half. Fernando sent a cross to Victor Manuel Fernandez, who tapped the ball into the legs of Alkorta.

The own goal was very fortunate for Valladolid, which had a play a man short for the final 19 minutes after Fernando was ejected in the 71st minute.

The draw left Real Madrid with an 11-6-0 record, three points ahead of Deportivo, who had a chance draw even on points with a victory over Sporting Gijon on Sunday.
