

U-16 cricketers for Calcutta

Bangladesh Cricket Board yesterday announced a 17-member Bangladesh under-16 cricket team to participate in an international U-16 tournament scheduled to begin in Calcutta from January 2 under the auspices of Calcutta Municipal Corporation.
The team which includes 15 cricketers and two officials will leave for Calcutta on December 31. Teams from South Africa, Sri Lanka and hosts India will participate in the meet, according to BCB officials talking to this reporter last night.

Concern over child labour

LOS ANGELES, Dec 24: Two dozen high school students were appalled when they discovered young people in other countries spend their days manufacturing soccer balls instead of playing with them, reports AP.
"We ran out during one practice and we were checking all the ball sand they all said, 'Made in Pakistan,'" said Sharon Paulson, a student at Monroe High School in North Hills. "That kind of made everything more real."
The students took their findings to the Board of Education and persuaded trustees to stop buying soccer balls from Pakistan and other countries believed to be using child workers.
The students' interest in child labour originated in teacher Mark Elinson's class on international law. The project, planned for three weeks, has lasted most of the semester.
"In just a matter of days, the kids found all of this information and from their interest it skyrocketed and everything just took off from there," Elinson said.

The students found information on the Internet as well as from several national and international organizations.
They focused on Pakistan, which produces 80 per cent of the soccer balls imported into the United States, according to the Washington-based International Labour Rights Fund.
They also learned that the Los Angeles Unified School District buys more than 800 soccer balls a year.
They heard the story of Iqbal Masih, a Pakistani who had been sold into bondage as a child to work as a carpet weaver. He escaped six years later and was an outspoken voice against child labour until he was assassinated last year at age 13.
And they found out about 13-year-old Craig Kielburger of Canada, who has started an international youth movement, Free the Children, to end child labour, particularly in the making of soccer balls.

Major international sporting goods manufacturers have taken steps to counter exploitation of children in Pakistan and elsewhere. They have helped set up schools to encourage children to study instead of work, and some have stopped contracting out work, often to families who put their children to work in the home.
The Pakistan government, and even the International Labour Organization, have said eliminating child labour is difficult as poor parents want their children to earn money.
Pakistan also has complained that it has been singled out in the child labour controversy, saying the problem is common to poor Third World countries in general.
The California students sent a letter to their local school board, prompting an invitation to speak before the Board of Education. Their work moved the City Council to approve a motion to investigate the production of soccer balls made in countries using child labour.
Not everyone embraced the students' work.

Double delight for DU

Dhaka University earned a delightful double in the Sixth Bangladesh Games yesterday when they lifted both the football and hockey golds on the penultimate day of the eight-day meet.
At the Mirpur National Stadium, the university booters clinched the 20th Sher-e-Bangla Cup, held as part of the Bangladesh Games football competition, defeating Narayananga DSA by a solitary goal.
The varsity hockey team posted an identical win over favourites Dhaka DSA at the Hockey Stadium to complete a resounding day of success.
In football, the strong Dhaka University team, aided by a 61st minute strike from Tipu, saw off a stubborn resistance from Monem Munna Narayananga, who moved into the semi-finals with a surprise win over favourites Ansars.

Narayananga had tried to establish control in the match with some early moves. But as the time progressed, specially after the breather, the University booters snatched the initiative from their counterparts and gradually began to dominate the proceedings.
Tipu, who plays for Brothers Union in the Premier Division league, put the students ahead in the 61st minute. The speedy striker after receiving not-so-exceptional a pass in the mid-field from Roxy, broke through the Narayananga defence through the left flank and went as close as possible to the post before driving home with an angled shot over a diving custodian Milan (1-0).
The scorers' could have been 2-0 ten minutes later when Roxy and Don shot twice from a goalmouth melee defeating Milan. But Narayananga defender Aman saved his side from imminent disaster by returning both the shots from the goal line.
In the remaining time, Narayananga, looked for an equaliser to prolong the proceedings into extra time. But their efforts came to naught because of a determined University defence who left no room for their opponents.

Test status in ICC June agenda

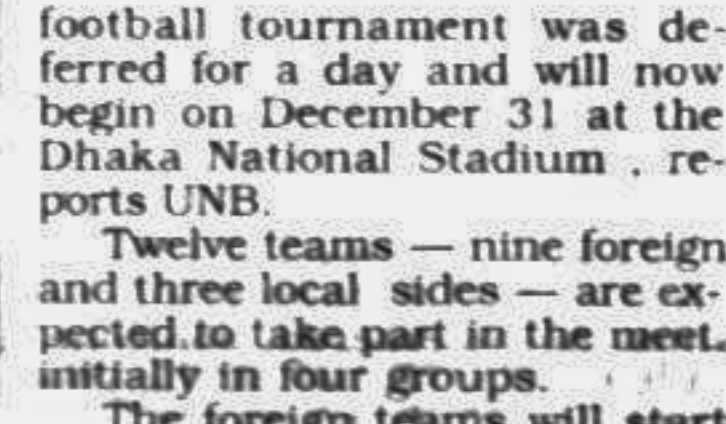

Bangladesh Army won the Sixth Bangladesh Games basketball gold with a marginal 66-63 point victory over Bangladesh Navy in the final held at the Dhanmondi gymnasium yesterday.
The winners led the first-half 34-31.
For Army, Rahim and Kamran scored highest 13 points each while Wahid added 12 points. On the other hand Sohail and Goswami scored 14 and 12 points respectively for the losers.
Earlier, Khulna snatched the bronze after narrowly beating Bangladesh Rifles in the third place playoff 72-71.
VOLLEYBALL
Bangladesh Army took volleyball gold after a hard fought 3-2 victory over Bangladesh Rifles in the final at the Volleyball Stadium yesterday.
In a see-saw encounter, army conceded the first set 12-15 and then went on to win the next two sets 15-13, 15-8. In the fourth set Army lost 11-15 but, however, they confirmed their title winning the final set 15-7.
Bangladesh Navy took the bronze.
TENNIS
Favourite Hira Lal became the men's singles champion yesterday beating Tofazzal in the final at the Ramna Tennis complex.
Tofazzal was twice of a gold when, partnering Laxman, he won the men's doubles final.

Nothing missing in '96

PARIS, Dec 24: Sporting heroes come in all shapes and sizes but the most enduring quality in 1996 was that so many of them had done it before.
Damon Hill finally won the Formula One motor racing title at 36 but the prize of the most durable champion must go to Evander Holyfield who out-boxed Mike Tyson for the world heavyweight boxing crown at 34.
Steffi Graf, refusing to be distracted by her father's trial over tax evasion, won all three Grand Slam tournaments the 27-year-old entered, including a seventh Wimbledon title in nine years.
Monica Seles, back from her two-year absence after being stabbed in the back by a spectator, won the Australian Open when injury forced out Graf.
Carl Lewis became only the fourth competitor to win nine Olympic gold medals when he won his fourth successive long jump title in Atlanta at the age of 35.
The home-made bomb which left two people dead in a public park may have made bigger news but the golden oldies were the stars of Atlanta.
Oarsman Steven Redgrave followed Lewis by becoming only the fourth sportsman in history to win gold at four straight Olympics when he and Matthew Pinsent won the men's coxless pairs.
Krisztina Egerszegi, a swimming veteran of 22 from Hungary, became the first person in history to win five individual Olympic gold medals with her third straight victory in the 200m backstroke.
Russian freestyle great Alexander Popov became the first man since Johnny Weissmuller in 1924-28 to repeat his feat as the 100m champion.
In athletics, world champion Donovan Bailey, 26, redeemed Canada's name eight years after Ben Johnson's Seoul shame by winning the 100m in a world record 9.84 sec.
However, 36-year-old defending champion Linford Christie of Britain captured just as much attention by getting himself disqualified for two false starts.
Gail Devers of the United States retained her women's 100m title at 29 and 28-year-old Michael Johnson of the United States and Marie-Jose Perrec of France won 200m-400m doubles.
Naim Suleymanoglu, the youngest weightlifting world champion ever in 1988 when competing as a Bulgarian, won his third Olympic title, competing for Turkey, as a 29-year-old at Atlanta.
Italian skiing idol Alberto Tomba, who had won three Olympic titles, finally peaked right in the World Championships at Sierra Nevada to win gold in slalom and giant slalom at 30 while 27-year-old Jansher Khan won his eighth world squash title.
New Zealand and Germany proved to be the most enduring competitors in team sports.
All the blacks, determined to make up for losing the World Cup final to South Africa, were the top rugby side.
They beat both Australia and South Africa twice in the southern hemisphere's tri-series and then won two of the three Tests in South Africa where they became the first all black side to clinch a series.
Germany, with the wonderful Matthias Sammer giving a liftable Franz Beckenbauer impersonation at the back, triumphed in the European soccer championship.
The ability to win sporting trophies brings fabulous riches these days and after helping the Chicago Bulls to their fourth NBA title in nine years 33-year-old Michael Jordan signed a 25-million-dollar deal to play for the Bulls next season.
That deal was, however, bettered by Shaquille O'Neal, a 24-year-old yet to win anything who left Orlando Magic for the Los Angeles Lakers for 123 million dollars.
Fame came late to some. Fifty-six-year-old Joe Torre, who spent 34 years as a player and manager before his World Series debut this year, saw his New York Yankees beat the Atlanta Braves to win their first north American baseball crown since 1978.
The Yankees became the first team to triumph after losing the first two games in the 92nd World Series.
One person to buck the trend of resistibility, and gloriously, was 26-year-old Michelle Smith.
Ireland's first Olympic swimming champion won three gold medals after years among the international also-rans.
Winning might be easier once you have been and felt the pressure but some, of course, react differently in the rarified atmosphere.
Tomiehaman of the United States shook off his reputation as the nearly man of golf by winning the British Open at 37.
Greg Norman's final round collapse at Augusta in April was of titanic proportions.
Nick Faldo, who had previously carved out last-gasp triumphs at Augusta in 1989 and 1990, made up six strokes on the final day to win the Masters as Norman's game fell to pieces.
"I hope I'm remembered for shooting a 67 rather than what happened to Greg," said Faldo.
"But obviously, it's going to be remembered for what happened to Greg."
Faldo can count on it.
