Accord to root out insurgency, expand bilateral trade

Bangladesh and India have agreed to further strengthen bilateral ties and forge greater understanding on crucially important issues like rooting out cross-border insurgency, including terrorist activities of Shantibahini, and expand trade, es-pecially boosting Bangladesh's exports to the north eastern region of India.

The two countries also mooted the idea of forming a sub-regional group comprising four South Asian countries for greater cooperation to bolster trade and economic activities. The countries are Bhutan. Nepal, India and Bangladesh.

This was disclosed by Foreign Secretary Farooq Sobhan while briefing newsmen about the outcome of the official talks between Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and the visiting Indian Prime Minister Deve Gowda held yesterday at the Prime Minister's office. Besides, a one to one exclusive meeting, the two leaders later sat in discussions with ministers and officials of their respective sides present. The talks lasted nearly an hour.

The cabinet of caretaker Prime Minister Meraj Khalid met today and unanimously approved the presidential order to form a Council for Defence and National Security, a government minister told re-

The council will comprise the President, the Prime Minister and ministers for Defence, Foreign Interior and Finance, chairman of joint chiefs of staff committee, and chiefs of the army, navy and air force, the order said.

The subjects on which the Council can advise include "determination of national strategy and fixation of priorities in terms of overall national security," formation of a defence policy and coordinating it with external and domestic policies.

It can also be asked to advise the government on 'definition of the task of the armed forces ... in accordance with the national strategy," economic and financial policies affecting defence and national security, and recommend on internal security and proclamation of emer-

The last military dictator. Gen. Mohammed Zia-ul Haq. ruled Pakistan for 11 years until 1988 when he died in a mysterious plane crash.
