## Big booster for St Vincent

BRIDGETOWN. Barbados Jan 7: Pending the final allocation of dates for the upcoming West Indies vs Sri Lanka series. St Vincent Et Grenadines are set to host their first Test match. it was announced here Monday. reports AFP.

The Arnos Vale Field in Kingstown will, along with the recreation ground in St Johns. Antigua, host the two Tests which Sri Lanka will contest in the region later this year.

"It's a great fillip for cricket not only in St Vincent but also in the Windward Islands area." Lennox John, president of the St Vincent Et the Grenadines and the Windwards Islands Cricket Board, told AFP.

He added: "We felt our time had come. St Vincent Et the Grenadines have produced a few Test cricketers in the last 15 years and they never had a chance to actually see a Test match until they were chosen for West Indies.

'We need to expose our people to Test cricket and we feel this is a wonderful opportunity for St Vincent because it's Sri Lanka's first visit to the Caribbean and it will be the first time we will host a Test match."

The Arnos Vale Field has become a regular stop in limited overs series in the Caribbean for the last five years. In that time there has been substantial improvement to the facilities at the ground to bring it up to Test standard. "I do not think that Arnos

Vale is worse than any of the other grounds in the Caribbean. There were some doubts about the quality of the pitch, but I do not know why," John said. The upcoming Test could be

the first of several at the venue. which could host matches against England when they tour the region next year. The Sri Lankans are ex-

pected to travel to the Caribbean on completion of the series between West Indies and India in early May, although the dates have yet to be set.

to Kenya where we will start training on Monday. I should have my full squad of 19 players by Wednesday and everything will be all right."

Local newspapers reports said the NFA could not secure hotel accommodation for the players because it was in debt to several Lagos hotels.



The results of X-rays taken on the injured finger on Friday eliminated the possibility of Seles competing in Melbourne according to a statement, issued player on Monday Seles broke her right ring

finger in two places - the finger tip and the knuckle - while warming up for an exhibition tournament last month in Slovakia and has been unable to play since December 4. The injury forced Yugoslav-

born Seles last week to withdraw from the Sydney International, which is being played at White City. Seles won the Australian

Open in 1991, 1992 and 1993 before missing the event the next two years after being stabbed during a tournament in Hamburg, Germany, in 1993. She returned to win the Australian title last year.

Her absence will be a considerable blow for Open organisers as it follows the decision of fel, low major drawcard Andre Agassi to bypass the event to take a break before starting his 1997 playing schedule.

Netherlands, Australian Jason Stoltenberg and Jana Novotna of the Czech Republic also will miss the tournament, with American Todd Martin an almost certain absentee. "It is obviously a great

shame that Monica won't be here, but we fully understand and wish her well in her recovery," McNamee said in a statement. "The show goes on and we


