You just can't afford to play big shots straighttway. You have to hang around. That's what I told muself. My batting apart, I have to evolve strategies. I have to think a lot. The state of match always stays in mind.

LONDON, Jan 11: John Toshack has emerged as favourite to replace his former Liverpool teammate Kevin Keegan as Newcastle manager, reports AFP.

The former Wales international, currently in charge of Deportivo, has gone to the top of the queue of candidates after Bobby Robson indicated the wanted to remain as Barcelona coach.

Newcastle have a three-man delegation in Spain consisting of vice-chairman Freddie Shepherd, director Douglas Hall and chief executive Freddie Fletcher as they continue the search for Keegan's successor.

The club officials held talks with Robson at his home in Sitges but, after being rebuffed, are set to move on to Orunacand negotiate with Toshack






