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

ROAD CAR TO RALLY CAR

In the early days of rallying, there was little difference between the cars being raced in competition and those being driven on the road.

Today, international rules insist that more than 2,500 production models must be built in the 12 months before a car can be used in competition. But apart from similar looking bodies and a handful of identical engine components today's production-line machines have little in common with the ones which win competitions.

Take "555 Subaru Impreza" - the 555 Subaru World Rally Team car for example. The body shells used in racing start out the same as those used on the factory floor But then they undergo a comprehensive process of reinforcing and stiffening to transform them into shells which are strong enough to withstand virtually anything.

The production-line "555 Subaru Impreza's" five-speed gearbox is replaced with a purpose built, six-speed unit. The driver can change gear with levers fitted to the steering wheel, while the vital centre differential, which splits drive between the front and rear wheels, relies on highly sophisticated electronics and hydraulics. Suspension and brakes will also be transformed along with wiring, instruments, seats and cooling to produce a rally winner.

The "555 Subaru Impreza" has proved to be the winning car in two consecutive world rallies. Production cost of a rally

car is nearly twenty times that of the street car The "555
