### Saive pockets English Open title

KETTERING, England, Jan 13: Belgium's Jean-Michel Saive won the English Open championships after overwhelming the Czech Republic's Peter Korbel 21-10, 21-15, 21-19 on Sunday, reports AFP.

Korbel had played superbly throughout the tournament and had disposed of German number two seed Jorg Rosskopf in the semifinal. But he met his match in 27-

vear-old Saive who, with the third game tied at 18-18, responded to the late challenge with a fierce drive to the middle of the court that left Korbel standing.

After his victory Saive said: "I'm pleaded to win this title for the first time. I hope playing well in England this week will help me prepare and give me confidence for the World Championship next April in Manchester."

In the women's final, Taipei number one Tong Feiming, 27, also won comfortably, overwhelming number one seed Chi Powa, from Hong Kong 21-10. 23-21, 21-10.

Though Becker had 22 aces to Moya's five, and smacked 30 winning volleys to Moya's one. the 25th-ranked Moya proved far steadier and made many fewer errors. While Becker had 17 double faults, Moya had only six. Becker's 87 unforced errors were 36 more than Moya's total.

"I made many, many unforced errors, which I haven't done in a long time," Becker said. "The only thing I had was my serve. My timing and my groundstrokes were really bad today. I felt like he was getting tired at the end of the third set.

fending men's champion at any major tournament in the open era since 1968 lost in the first round.

Moya's upset wasn't as big a shock as it might have appeared. The 20-year-old was coming off a solid performance in the tuneup in the Sydney In-ternational, where he reached the final before losing to Britain's Tim Henman.

"It gave me confidence to improve my game on hard courts," Moya said of his victory in Paris over Becker in their only previous meeting. "Maybe I've changed my mentality. I think I

play more aggressively."

Becker, thinking about retirement in a few years, played well, if not spectacularly, in an exhibition tuneup in Melbourne. Against Moya, Becker simply looked too slow, made too many mistakes and couldn't produce the kind of comebacks he had in the past. Considered the king of five-setters, Becker is now 31-15 in matches that go the distance.

Steffi Graf nursed a fallen opponent, and Michael Chang rescued a ball girl who fainted in the heat as the injury-riddled Australian Open got off to a stumbling start.

Graf led 5-1 in the first set when Janette Husarova of Slovakia twisted her left knee changing direction while rushing the net.

Graf, who's had plenty of injuries of her won, put a towel under Husarova, carried out ice in another towel and unrolled an elastic bandage before a trainer and doctor arrived to finish the job of wrapping the knee in ice.

Michael Chang, the men's No. 2 seed, had no problem beating Kris Goossens of Belgium, 6-0, 6-3, 6-1. The only unexpected part of the match was the brief collapse of a ball girl, whom Chang helped out with a watersoaked towel he kept handy.

Chang isn't trained in first aid but, like Graf, knows what to do from experience in certain situations.

'Playing in some pretty tough conditions," he said, "You learn things, precautions that you need to take if you feel like your body temperature is rising a little bit higher than what you're normally used to."

Chang next plays Richey Reneberg of the United States, who got off court as quickly as Graf when his opponent, Oscar Burrieza of Spain, twisted an ankle at 2-2 in the first set. In uneventful matches, No. 5

### Pierce upbeat

MELBOURNE, Jan 13: Former champion Mary Pierce is aiming to put a dismal 1996 behind her and put her stuttering career back on the fast track. reports AP.

Pierce, winner of the 1995 Australian Open but beaten in the second round last year. opened this year's campaign Monday with a 3-6, 6-2, 6-4 win over 13th-seeded Elena Likhovtseva of Russia.

"I'm just working hard every day. I feel I'm getting better and better. I don't think I have anything to prove to myself or anybody." Pierce said after her 2hour, 5-minute Centre Court victory.

Pierce, who turns 22 Wednesday, climbed as high as No. 3 in the world in 1995, but suffered from a loss of form last year that saw her ranking fall to No. 20 at year's end. Now ranked No. 22, the

French right-hander made the final at Amelia Island and the quarterfinals at Wimbledon during 1996 but struggled elsewhere, missing the US Open with a right shoulder complaint.

A low point came when she was jeered by local fans at the French Open after her thirdround exit.

"Last year was a difficult year for me, changing coaches, injuring my shoulder was diffioult, never being able to train at the level I wanted to," Pierce

said She took October and November off and spent the time relaxing and training in Paris.

"It got to the point I couldn't lift my arm and I took few months off," said Pierce, who beat Likhovtseva on her fifth

match point. Now free of pain, Pierce said her aim was to stay healthy. But the ultimate goal is to win the

French Open. "It's a dream for me and always will be to hopefully win

AUCKLAND, Jan 13: Sweden's Jonas Bjorkman moved from 65th in the world into the top 50 with a straight sets 7-6 (7-0), 6-0 win over Denmark's Kenneth Carlsen in the final of New Zealand Open tennis championship today, reports

Bjorkman won 43,000 US dollars for taking the title while Carlsen collected 25,300 US dollars as he lost his third finals appearance.

A delighted Bjorkman said the fourth game of the second set, where he forced five break points on Carlsen's service before finally prevailing, had been the crucial point in the match.

"The fourth game was very important. It was where it all happened. Especially after Kenneth started off so well and was all over me early in the first set," he said.

"I struggled a bit in the first set but I made it to the tiebreak. and playing a good tiebreak. then felt very strong after that. Carlsen had raced to a 4-1

lead in the first set with two

breaks of service before Bjorkman rallied to reel off three games in a row to level at 4-4. He then whitewashed his opponent with a confident performance in the tiebreak and always looked in control of the

# upbeat | Old foes face tricky time



RIO DE JANEIRO. Jan 13: The South American World Cup qualifying competition was thrown wide open

on Sunday when Peru and Bolivia both won to rekindle their hopes and old foes Uruguay and Argentina drew 0-0 in Montevideo, reports Reuter. Only two points now sepa-

rate third-place Argentina from eighth -place Chile as the marathon competition, in which the nine teams play each other twice, nears the halfway mark. The top four teams in the

group qualify for the 1998 World Cup in France, with Brazil exempt from the qualifying tournament as holders. In the old days, Uruguay and

Argentina would have expected to meet little resistance from the other South American na-This time, however, they have found themselves slugging

it out with teams such as Peru. Bolivia and Ecuador and playing second fiddle to group leaders Colombia and Paraguay. The relatively poor campaigns of the two great rivals

added extra spice to Sunday's meeting — their first-ever in a World Cup qualifier - but despite the tension there was no trouble and only three players were booked. Uruguay had slightly the bet-

ter of the game in which the performance of Ignacio Gonzalez hinted that Argentina may have finally ended their goalkeeping troubles. The highlight of a solid dis-

play by Gonzalez, the fifth goalkeeper to be used by Argentine coach Daniel Passarella in the last year, was a spectacular seventh minute save from veteran Enzo Francescoli. "We overcame a stiff test and kept third place in a very tough qualifying contest," said Passarella.

The result kept Argentina ahead of Uruguay on goal difference. Both have ten points. Peru. Bolivia and Ecuador all have nine points after Peru beat Chile 2-1 in Lima and Bo-

livia beat Ecuador 2-0 in La Paz. Peru overcame Chile with first half goals by Flavio Maestri and Roberto Palacios. Ivan Zamorano grabbed a consolation for Chile, who have eight points, two minutes from time.

Bolivia have failed to make the most of playing at 3,600 metres above sea level, drawing their last three home games, but wrapped up Sunday's game in the first 12 minutes with goals by Jaime Moreno and Marco

The Bolivians won all their home games on their way to reaching the 1994 World Cup, with Brazil among their victims, and their failure to repeat the performance may seriously undermine their hopes of qualifying again.




