mounts

HAMILTON, Jan 18: England took charge of their four-day first-class tour match against Northern Districts on Saturday, but captain Mike Atherton still had problems scoring runs, reports AP.

After dismissing Northern Districts for 69 in 28.4 overs, England were 166 for four at stumps on the first day.

Lefthander Graham Thorpe was on 39 and John Crawley had reached 25 in an unbroken 50-run stand.

But it was Atherton's batting problems which continue to plague England's leadup to the first Test against New Zealand, starting at Eden Park in Auckland next Friday.

He made five in 19 balls before being trapped leg before wicket to young medium-pace Scott Styris.

His two innings in New Zealand so far have produced 12 runs, and on his tour of Zimbabwe and New Zealand he has now scored just 208 runs in 15 innings.

England's four-pronged fast-medium bowling attack destroyed the Northern Districts innings.

The bowlers were helped by the pitch, which is conducive to quality seam bowling, and they took their chances.

Dominic Cork removed New Zealand's Test opener, Blair Pocock and Bryan Young, in his first 16 balls of the day, for nought and four respectively, and Northern Districts never recovered.

Warne's trip
goes awry

PERTH, Australia, Jan 18: A 3,000-kilometre (1863-mile) early morning flight by Australian leg-spinning wizard Shane Warne was not enough to inspire his state side, Victoria, in a clash against Western Australia here Friday, reports AP.

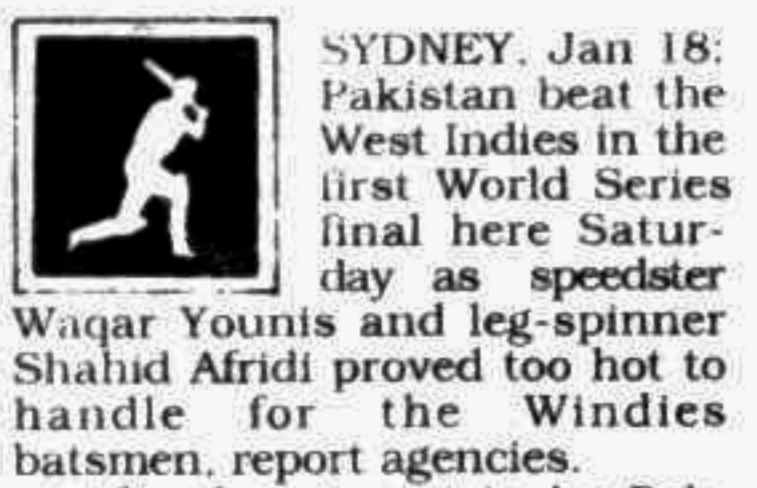
Originally left to the Victoria line-up because of commitment with the Australian side, Warne decided late Thursday night, after Australia had beaten Pakistan in a one-day match in Melbourne, to make the long trip to Perth.

But his change of plan failed to inspire his side, which crashed to a five-wicket defeat in the Mercantile Mutual Cup one-day clash.

After Victoria had made a paltry 143, Western Australia scorched to 146 for five with 6.5 overs to spare to record their fourth successive win in the contest and guarantee a home semifinal in next month.

Warne's late decision to fly to Perth after a short night's sleep was believed to be based on his desire for a further bowling work-out against top-class batting before the vital fourth Test against the West Indies, starting in Adelaide Saturday week.

Waqar, Afridi run havoc
Pakistan win first finals



SYDNEY, Jan 18: Pakistan beat the West Indies in the first World Series final here Saturday as speedster Waqar Younis and leg-spinner Shahid Afridi proved too hot to handle for the Windies batsmen, reports agencies.

After being sent in by Pakistan skipper Wasim Akram, West Indian openers Sherwin Campbell and Junior Murray gave them a flying start by putting on 99 before a dramatic middle-order collapse saw seven wickets fall for 24 runs.

It was the Windies' second unbelievable crash this week.

In their eight-wicket loss to Pakistan at the Sydney Cricket Ground on Tuesday, they threw away their last eight wickets for 25 to be all-out for 181.

The opening stand here Saturday was the highest of the series but not enough to stop Pakistan going one-up in the best-of-three finals as they cruised

as they failed to hit a boundary in the last 25 overs.

In reply Pakistan, without opener Aamir Sohail who was serving a one-match ban for dissent over his dismissal in Melbourne on Thursday, made light of the job.

Ijaz Ahmed, was the backbone, showing maturity befitting his name to guide his team to within sight of victory before recover from a stomach complaint to take his place in the West Indian side.

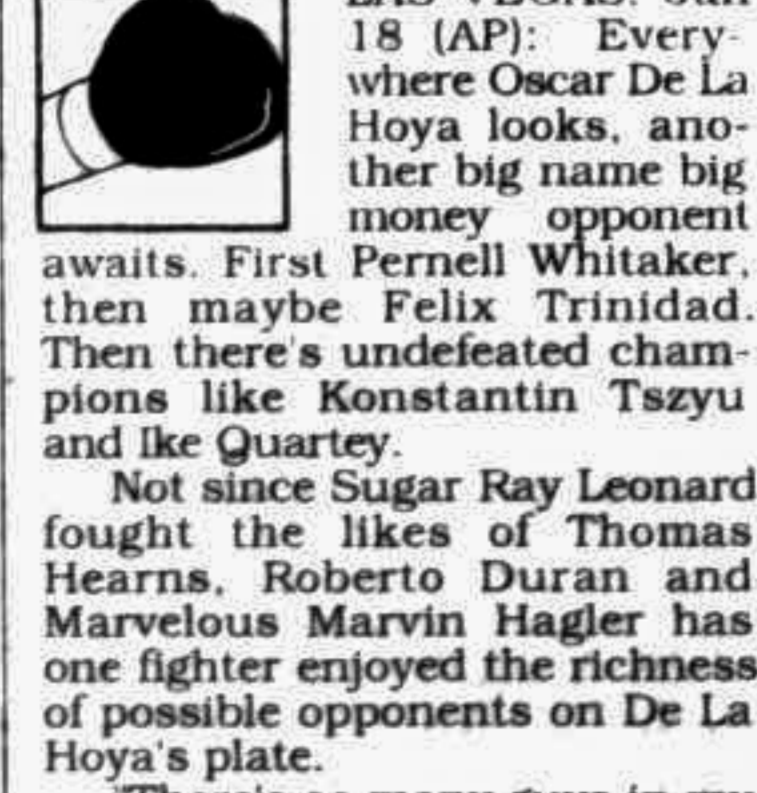

Big bout always after him



LAS VEGAS, Jan 18 (AP): Everywhere Oscar De La Hoya looks, another big name big money opponent awaits. First Pernel Whitaker, then maybe Felix Trinidad. Then there's undefeated champions like Konstantin Tszyu and Ike Quartey.

Not since Sugar Ray Leonard fought the likes of Thomas Hearns, Roberto Duran and Marvin Hagler has one fighter enjoyed the richness of possible opponents on De La Hoya's plate.

"There's so many guys in my weight class, especially when I move up to 147 pounds (67 kilograms)," De La Hoya said. "Most top fighters don't want to fight each other. I want to fight them all, everybody that is out there."

First, though, De La Hoya must take care of business Saturday night by beating WBC lightweight champion Miguel Angel Gonzalez to make a clean sweep of a quartet of Mexican champions.

De La Hoya defends the WBC 140-pound (64-kilogram) title he won from Julio Cesar Chavez in the scheduled 12-round fight that matches two unbeaten boxers. The fight tops a card at UNLV's campus arena that includes an IBF 140-pound (64-kilogram) title defense by Tszyu against Leonard, and Michael Carbajal's IBF light flyweight defense against Mauricio Pastrana.

"He doesn't like getting hit," De La Hoya said of Gonzalez. "I think he will back off once I start sticking him with those jabs."

De La Hoya (22-0, 20 knockouts) is a 7-1 favourite to beat Gonzalez, who has won all 41 of his pro fights, 31 by knockout.

If the oddsmakers are cor-

rect and he gets by Gonzalez, De La Hoya will plunge into a waiting list crammed with fighters looking for a big payday and a chance to knock off a fighter whose reputation is growing

live Mexico, will try and do what his former idol and others couldn't do — beat De La Hoya, who stopped Chavez in the fourth round last June.

If he does, he'll have succeeded where three previous Mexican champions failed. If not, he'll become just another casualty of a fighter many think is destined for greatness.

"This is the fight of my life," Gonzalez said. "All I can say is I'll win. I don't know how, but I will win."

Unlike De La Hoya, who seems to be peaking under the tutelage of trainer Jesus Rivero, the so-called "professor," Gonzalez has looked very ordinary in recent fights. He blames it on having to make the 135-pound (61-kilogram) lightweight limit.

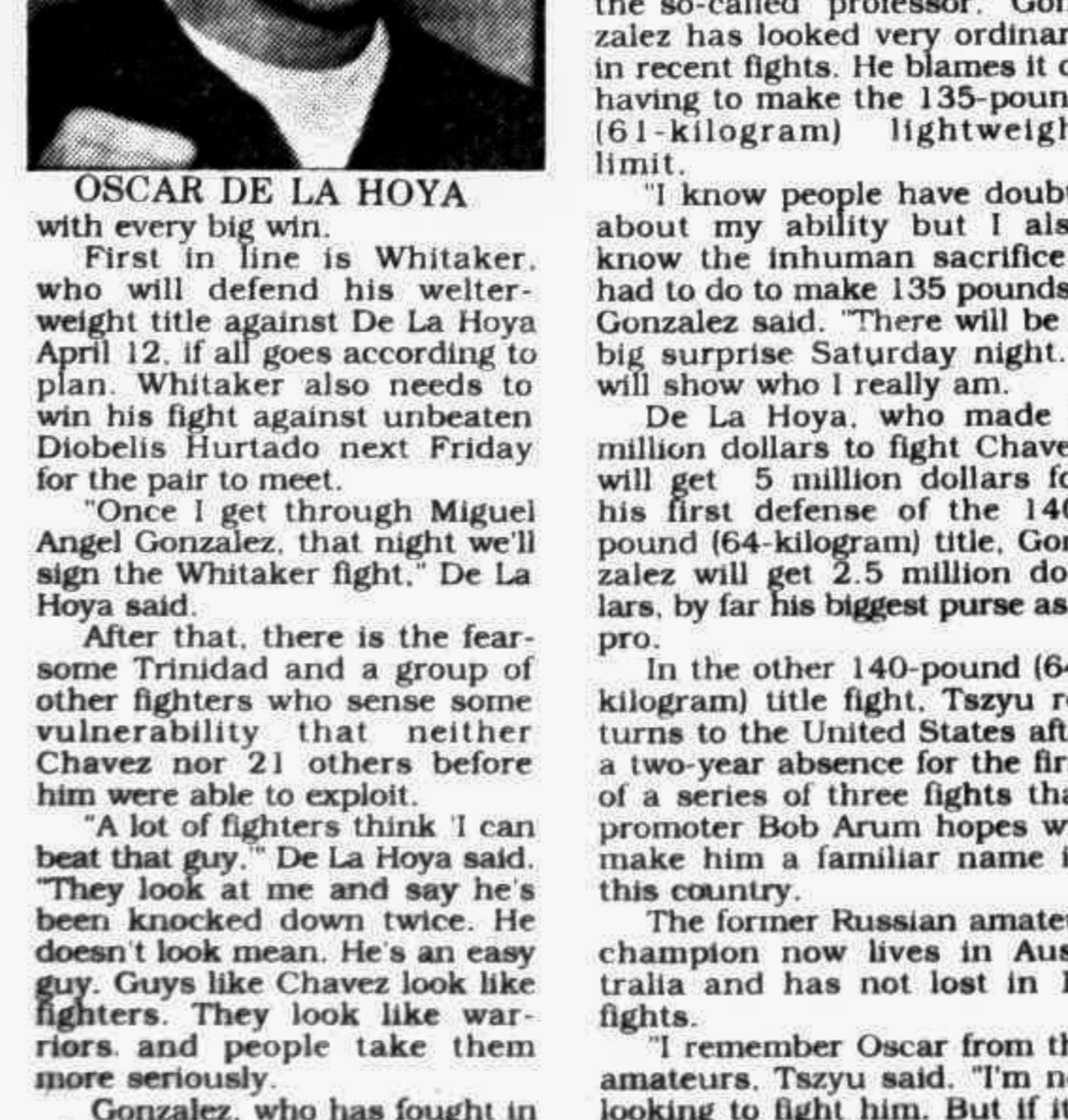
"I know people have doubts about my ability but I also know the inhuman sacrifice I had to do to make 135 pounds," Gonzalez said. "There will be a big surprise Saturday night. I will show who I really am."

De La Hoya, who made 9 million dollars to fight Chavez, will get 5 million dollars for his first defense of the 140-pound (64-kilogram) title. Gonzalez will get 2.5 million dollars, by far his biggest purse as a pro.

In the other 140-pound (64-kilogram) title fight, Tszyu returns to the United States after a two-year absence for the first of a series of three fights that promoter Bob Arum hopes will make him a familiar name in this country.

The former Russian amateur champion now lives in Australia and has not lost in 18 fights.

"I remember Oscar from the amateurs, Tszyu said. "I'm not looking to fight him. But if it's done, it's done."

First in line is Whitaker, who will defend his welterweight title against De La Hoya April 12, if all goes according to plan. Whitaker also needs to win his fight against unbeaten Diabellis Hurtado next Friday for the pair to meet.

"Once I get through Miguel Angel Gonzalez, that night we'll sign the Whitaker fight," De La Hoya said.

After that, there is the fearsome Trinidad and a group of other fighters who sense some vulnerability that neither Chavez nor 21 others before him were able to exploit.

"A lot of fighters think I can beat that guy," De La Hoya said. "They look at me and say he's been knocked down twice. He doesn't look mean. He's an easy guy. Guys like Chavez look like fighters. They look like warriors and people take them more seriously."

Gonzalez, who has fought in the shadow of Chavez in his na-

Bebeto Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, Jan 18: Brazil's World Cup-winning striker Bebeto is to return to Brazil from Seville to play for Vitoria of Salvador state, Vitoria spokesman said here Friday, reports AP.

Bebeto enjoyed a successful four-year spell with Deportivo la Coruna before moving back to Brazil with Flamengo last year.

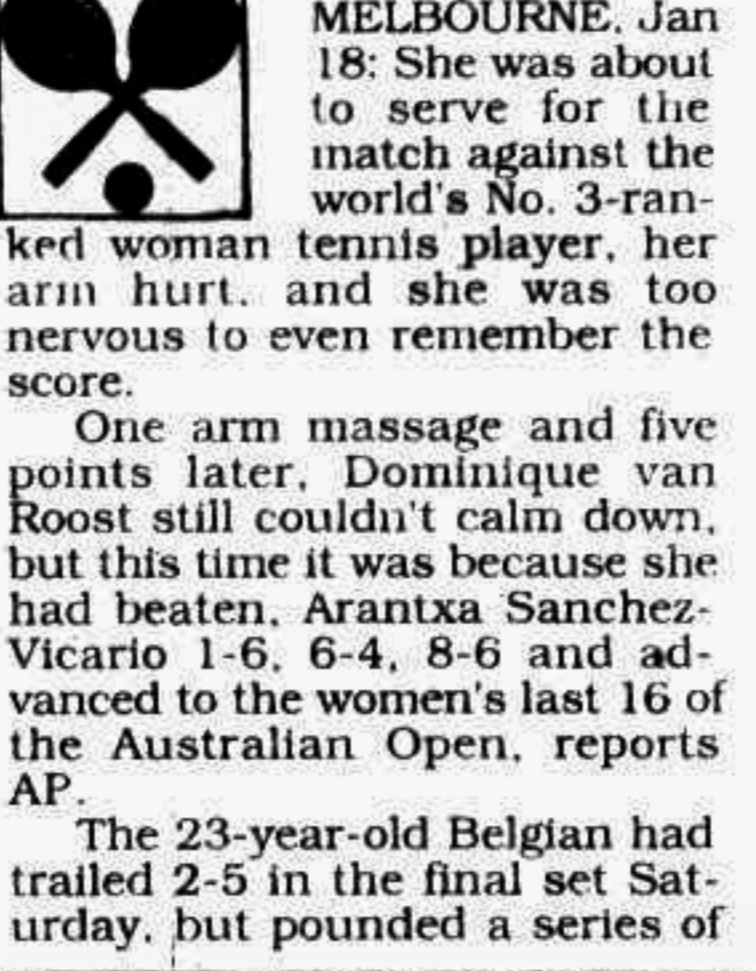
The former Indian captain who holds the world record for taking the highest number of Test wickets, said that he was not satisfied with the performance of the Indian team now touring South Africa.

The former Test all-rounder said that it was because the team lacked balance that it was unable to perform well abroad.

Belgian baffles Arantxa



MELBOURNE, Jan 18: She was about to serve for the match against the world's No. 3-ranked woman tennis player, her arm hurt, and she was too nervous to even remember the score.

One arm massage and five points later, Dominique Van Roost still couldn't calm down, but this time it was because she had beaten, Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario 1-6, 6-4, 8-6 and advanced to the women's last 16 of the Australian Open, reports AP.

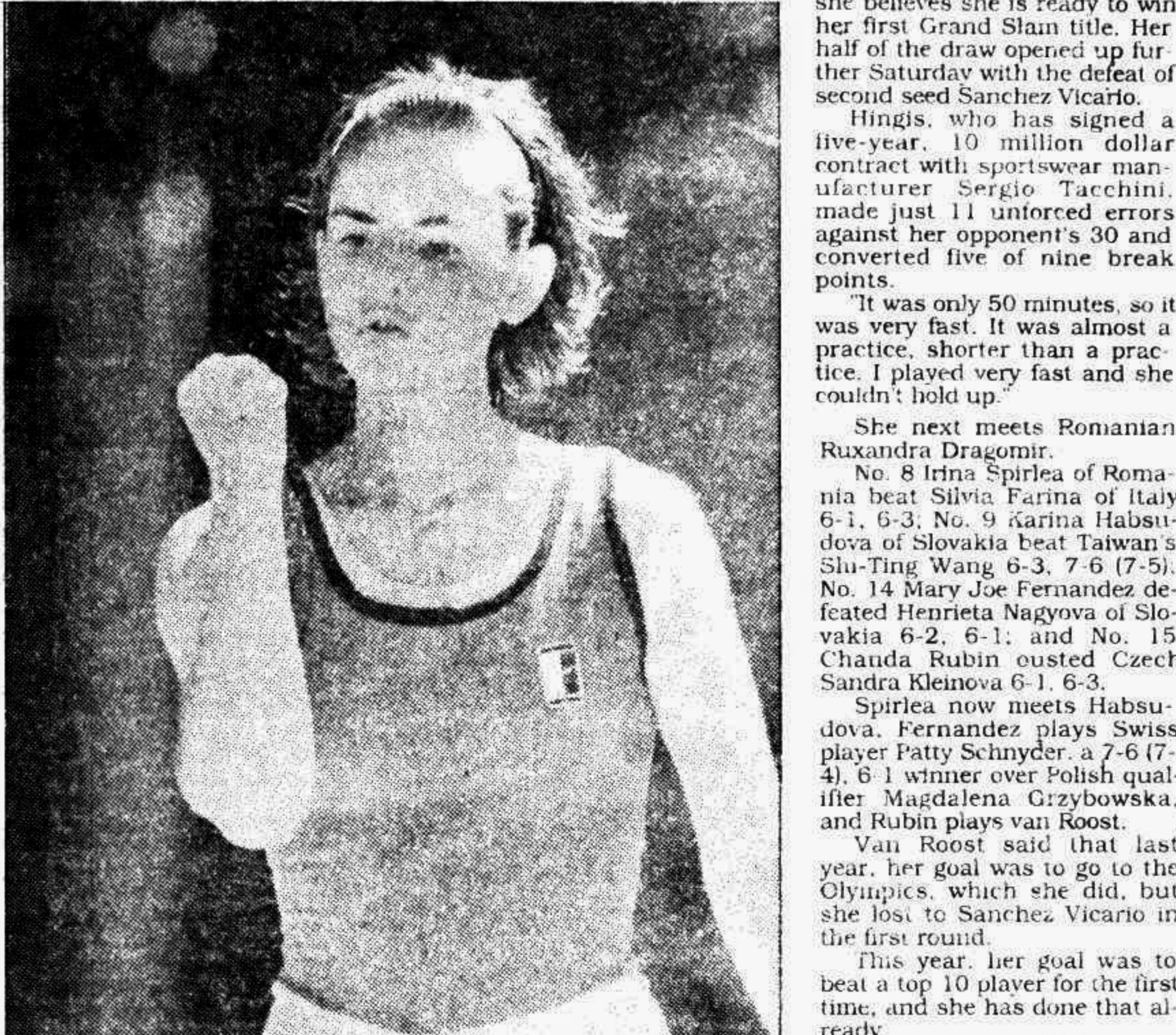
The 23-year-old Belgian had trailed 2-5 in the final set Saturday, but pounded a series of

Van Roost hit 23 of her 46 winners in the final set, while Sanchez-Vicario had only nine the whole match. The Spanish player wasn't saved by her edge in unforced errors: 31 to 68.

Sanchez-Vicario was one of two Spanish seeds eliminated Saturday. Men's No. 16 Alberto Berasategui retired with leg cramps while trailing Slovakia's Dominik Hrbaty 6-3, 7-6 (7-3), 6-7 (4-7), 2-0.

Hrbaty now faces top-seeded Pete Sampras, who trounced Mark Woodforde 6-1, 6-0, 6-1 in just 79 minutes despite roars of support for the Australian from the Centre Court crowd of 15,000.

Hingis, 16, said afterward she believes she is ready to win her first Grand Slam title. Her half of the draw opened up further Saturday with the defeat of second seed Sanchez Vicario.

Hingis, who has signed a five-year, 10 million dollar contract with sportswear manufacturer Sergio Tacchini, made just 11 unforced errors against her opponent's 30 and converted five of nine break points.

"It was only 50 minutes, so it was very fast. It was almost a practice, shorter than a practice. I played very fast and she couldn't hold up."

She next meets Romanian Ruxandra Dragomir.

No. 8 Irina Spirlea of Romania beat Silvia Farina of Italy 6-1, 6-3. No. 9 Karina Habudova of Slovakia beat Taiwan's Shu-Ting Wang 6-3, 7-6 (7-5). No. 14 Mary Joe Fernandez defeated Henrieta Nagyova of Slovakia 6-2, 6-1; and No. 15 Chanda Rubin ousted Czech Sandra Kleinova 6-1, 6-3.

Spirlea now meets Habudova. Fernandez plays Swiss player Patty Schnyder, a 7-6 (7-4), 6-1 winner over Polish qualifier Magdalena Grzybowska, and Rubin plays van Roost.

Van Roost said that last year, her goal was to go to the Olympics, which she did, but she lost to Sanchez Vicario in the first round.

This year, her goal was to beat a top 10 player for the first time, and she has done that already.

"I was playing well last week so I had a lot of confidence, but when I started the match I was nervous of course," van Roost bubbled. "For me it was this experience in a Grand Slam stadium."

Woodford, who never has beaten Sampras in nine tries but has given him trouble in the past with his variety of spins, reached the semifinals here last year. On the way, he beat fellow Australian Mark Philippoussis, the man who eliminated Van Roost the score.

"I totally didn't know... I was so nervous," she admitted later.

"This was the first time that I played in a Grand Slam tournament since her second-round departure at Wimbledon in 1992. In the meantime, she has won the French and US Opens and been a losing finalist seven times."

The 23-year-old van Roost, on the other hand, has won just two small tournaments — last year in Wales and last week in Hobart, Australia. Her best previous Grand Slam performance was reaching the fourth round of the Australian Open in 1992, shortly after she turned pro.

"No, no, no," van Roost said when asked if she was well-

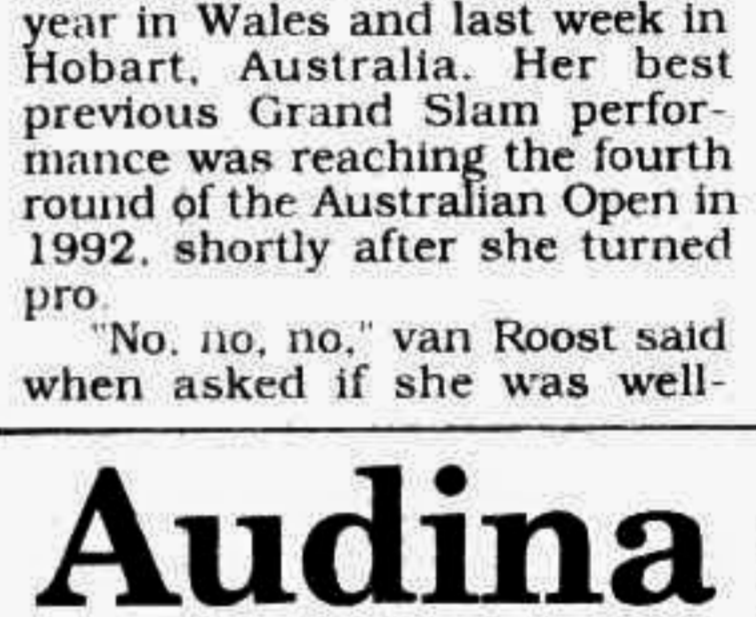
Monica skips

Pacific Open

TOKYO, Jan 18: A nagging finger injury has forced Monica Seles out of the Toray Pan Pacific Open women's tournament here this month, again frustrating officials hopes for a clash with world number one Steffi Graf, organisers said Friday, reports AP.

Last year it was a foot injury which kept Graf from the tournament which was won by Croatia's Iva Majoli who beat Seles in the quarter-finals.

"The tournament will extremely regret Monica Seles' absence but we sincerely hope she will make a comeback in her best form," said a spokesman for the organisers. "She has not played since December 4."

Audina advances to final



TOKYO, Jan 18: Olympic silver medalist Mia Audina of Indonesia landed key smashes Saturday to outscore world champion Ye Zhaoying to the women's singles final at the Yonex Japan Open badminton tournament, reports AP.

In the other hard-fought semifinals match, China's Gong Zhichao overcame a 6-0 deficit in the first set, rallying past last week's Taipei Open champion Camilla Martin of Denmark 12-11, 6-11, 11-2.

In men's play, unseeded Peter Rasmussen of Denmark breezed past veteran Indonesian Ardi Wiranata 15-2, 15-5.

In Sunday's final match, Rasmussen meets ninth-seeded Park Sung-woo of South Korea, who came from behind to eliminate Taipei Open champion Peter Gade, Christian of Denmark 13-18, 15-10, 15-5.

In the men's doubles final Sunday, Olympic champions and top-seeded Rexy Mainaky and Ricky Subagdjaja of Indonesia play against Olympic bronze medalists and third seed Antonius and Denny Kantoro, also of Indonesia.

Audina advances to final

The women's doubles finalists will be top-seeded Eliza and Zelin Resiana of Indonesia vs second seed Gu Jun and Ge Fei of China.

In the mixed doubles final also on Sunday, fifth seed Jens Erikson and Martine Thomsen of Denmark take on unseeded Liu Yong and Ge Fei of China.

The 170,000 dollars Japan Open is the second in the 20 badminton Grand Prix Circuit series this year, following the season opener in Taipei.

"The game was really unpredictable when I allowed Ye to lead 5-2 in the second set," said the 17-year-old Audina. "Then I found right things to do, that is make her run more from one corner to the other. And I attacked only at the right moment."

Audina, the world's top-ranked player, acknowledged second-seeded Gong is a tough opponent.

"She is powerful in attack and good at defense. I'll have to find her weak point on the court tomorrow," she said.

Audina climbed to the No. 1 singles rank after winning the US Open singles title last September.

Gong, 19, winner of the 1996 Asian Championships, said she beat Audina in their only match so far, at the World Grand Prix Finals in Jakarta in November.

"I'll just do my best and try to play in a relaxed manner tomorrow," she said.

Rasmussen, seeking his first title in any Grand Prix-level tournament, has reached the final by eliminating, among others, fifth seed Ong Ewe Hock of Malaysia and ninth-seeded Luo Yigang of China.

On his way to the final, Park, the 1995 Sweden Open champion, ousted Olympic champion Poul-Erik Hoyer-Larsen in the third round.

"Rasmussen is a speedy, powerful player," Park said. "Although he's coming back from a year of slump due to leg injuries, he's a tough foe to play against."

Park said he himself was in a slump the whole season last year due to leg and knee injuries.

"I'm okay now. So is Rasmussen, I believe," he said.
