Coetzer, a semifinalist at the Australian Open last year, said she felt pretty good despite the heat, and set out to work hard on each point. She retrieved shot after shot and often was rewarded with eventual misses by Graf, who had 53 unforced errors to 28 for Coetzer. It was her second victory

over Graf in 11 tries. "It's always great to beat somebody like that for the first time. But to do it twice really makes me feel good, it gives me a lot of confidence," said the No.

Venables' vision

MELBOURNE, Jan 19: Former England soccer coach Terry Venables would like to see his Australian side adopt a killer instinct before the World Cup qualifiers begin in June, reports AP.

"I thought we set about what we were doing early on and I thought we made some chances." Venables said after Australia beat New Zealand 1-0 Saturday in the Four Nations tournament in his first match at the helm. "I thought if perhaps we were a little bit more ruthless early on it would have made the difference.

"We did very well up to a point, we made hard work of it at the end." The former England, Barcelona and Tottenham manager has been handed the task of guiding Australia to the World Cup finals for the first time since 1974.

Australia, who showed flashes of brilliance and spells of sloppiness, started the game at an electric pace and finished at a sluggish trot against the less-fancied New Zealanders.

Matthew Bingley scored the only goal of the game after 25 minutes. Goalkeeper Zeljko Kalac's long throw found Kris Trajanovski on the halfway line and Trajanovski's quick through ball gave Bingley the chance to steer the ball past goalkeeper Jason Batty. Despite the win. Venables

said there was plenty of work to do in the next several months. "The opposition was not there to let us run over them, they were to get a result and

quite rightly too," he said. "A win is a win, but once we got into a commanding position we should have rammed it home, but we didn't really so we've got to work at that." Venables discarded the single striker's game that was prevalent under former coach Eddie Thomson's reign, preferring a triple strike force.

But he was uncertain whether he would try the strategy again when the side meets South Korea on Wednesday in Brisbane or against Norway in Sydney on Saturday. South Korea edged Norway 1-0 in the tournament opener. "You always know that

you've got a lot of work to do especially if I'm going to try and change things," Venables said.

He said he had only seen the players for four days and needed more time to assess their strength. The new coach, who has represented England at every international level, produced some passionate outthe game.



A different Saturday for Sampras

MELBOURNE, Jan 19: It was again a Saturday night only a year later. The weather was pleasant and the Centre Court was Thanks, Tawfig. full to the brim. Last year on this night the 1994 champion

and 1995 runner-up Pete Sampras was knocked out by his distant Greek 'cousin' the Australian, Mark Phillippoussis in a third round match in front of a capacity crowd. Sam pras looked like a helpless orphan before the 19-year-old Phillippoussis whose ancestors contributed to a large extent to make Melbourne the third city after Athens of the largest Greek community in the world knowledgeable Australians told me that it all started after the second world war. The 'relatives' of Aristotle Onassis arrived in bulk by ships and later brought their women, married them and settled comfortably in the vast expense of this continent. This time Sampras faced another Australian -Mark Woodforde who lives in Adelaide. Mark was a semifinalist last year having last to the ultimate champion Boris Becker. The announcement came in flambouyant style over the PA system mentioning Woodforde in front of the world number one Pete Sampras. His voice was showned by a highly partisan crowd as the players appeared on the court.

But it was a different Saturday night. Sampras made his intentions very clear right from the first and when he broke the first service game of Woodforde the third and possibly fourth generation Greek's in the gallery brought the Greek flag with them and most enthusiastic of them deemed with it to show their solidarity with the most illusions Greek. 

The player has said it is unintentional but that she needs time to prepare herself for the next point. Huber admitted she found it

difficult.

"You know it before you play her," said Huber. "She takes a lot of time and you can still get crazy on the other side, yes."

Pierce beat Huber in the same round at the 1995 Australian Open before going on to beat Arantxa Sanchez Vicario of Spain in the final.

Surin reaps rich

HAMILTON, Ontario, Jan 19: World indoor champion Bruny Surin continued to rule the boards Saturday as he won his third successive race on the 1997 Canadian indoor circuit at the Hamilton indoor games, reports Reuter. Surin twice the world indoor

60-metre champion, won the 50-metre at the 87th Hamilton meet in 5.67 seconds. Canadian Olympic relay teammate Robert Esmie was second in 5.70 sec onds and American Vice Henderson third in 5.79.

Surins victory earned him 5,000 dollars for capturing a three-race series that included 60-metre races in Montreal on Friday and Saskatoon last weekend.

Last year's sprint series winner, Olympic 100 metres champion and world recordholder Donovan Bailey, took the three-race series off. Bailey will compete next week indoors in Brazil one of only two indoor meets he'll run this year.
