Agrani Bank recorded an impressive 157-run victory over lowly Gulshan Youth Club in the opening Premier Division relegation league engagement at the Dharmadhi Cricket Stadium yesterday.

Electing to bat first, Agrani Bank piled up a huge 274 before they were all out in 47.4 overs with two Pakistanis — Shahid Iqbal and Shahid Mahboob — hammering 68 and 63 runs respectively. Azam (46) was the other notable scorer for the Bankers.

In reply, Gulshan were bundled out for 117 in 41 overs after some superb bowling by Shuvro and Shahid Mahboob. In his ten nippy overs, Shuvro gave away only 17 runs and captured three wickets while Shahid Mahboob, after playing a brilliant innings of 63 in the first session, also took three wickets for 27 runs.

With yesterday's win, Agrani Bank raised their account to 12 points from as many outings while Gulshan Youth are yet to win a match following their 12 engagements and have already confirmed their relegation to the First Division league next year.

Bangladesh Sports Journalists' Association (BSJA) handed Bangladesh Sports Journalists and Writers' Community (BSJWC) a crushing 100-run defeat in a holiday cricket match at the Jagannath Hall ground yesterday.

Peter Graf found guilty

MANHEIM, Germany, Jan 24: The father of tennis champion Steffi Graf was convicted of evading taxes on her earnings and was sentenced to three years and nine months in prison, reports AP.

Chief Judge Joachim Plass said Steffi Graf "played no active part" in the tax evasion and he recommended the investigation against her be dropped.

"Steffi is a good ambassador for Germany," the judge said, adding that her father's role in helping her accomplish that "is recognized by the public."

As for evasion of 12 million marks (7.31 million dollars) in taxes and attempted evasion of another 3 million marks (1.82 million dollars), the judge said, "Peter Graf alone bears most of the responsibility."

Prosecutor Hubert Jobski said after the verdict that the investigation of Steffi Graf is continuing "and we decide on our own regarding that."

Steffi Graf, 27, never attended the 4-1/2-month trial. Filmed by Australia's Channel 7 television as she boarded a flight for Tokyo just after the verdict was announced, she said

to reporters, "Haven't you guys got enough?"

Former family tax adviser Joachim Eckardt, a co-defendant, was convicted of attempted tax evasion and of being an accessory. He was sentenced to two years six months in prison.

The prosecution and defence have a week to file an appeal, but defence attorney Franz Salditt said, "We're still impressed by the trial. We think it was handled in a perfect manner."

He mentioned that the court had rejected the prosecution's demand for a fine, noting that might have been another "load on her."

"It's clear that the court does not see any wrongful activities on the part of Steffi Graf," Salditt told reporters. "That's one of the most important points to us and the Graf family."

Peter Graf made no comment, but headed to the family home in nearby Brühl for further talks with this lawyer. Graf and Eckardt remain on bail, must report to police each week and are barred from traveling.

Graf spent 15 months in jail before he was released on 5 million marks bail on Nov. 15. That time will be counted in his term, and with half of the sentence routinely deducted for good behavior, he could end up serving another 7 and 1/2 months.

It could be months before Graf is ordered to begin serving the sentence.

Salditt, who had tried to portray his client as a "helpless, lost man" during the trial, was pleased with the judge's comments about Graf's role in establishing his daughter at the top of world tennis for 10 years.

"Others would not have been able to stand up to such pressure," the judge had said.

Although the judge placed guilt for the tax evasion squarely on Peter Graf's shoulders, he commented that tax officials first knew about problems in 1989 but waited years to investigate.

Graf didn't deny that he was using mail-box companies in the Netherlands, Liechtenstein and the Dutch Antilles as early as 1987.

One of the defences Salditt had tried to make was that Peter Graf relied on promises from local tax officials of special treatment because his high-tax German, unlike many other sports stars.

Prosecutor Jobski said following the judgment, "We must check to see if [state] finance officials are also guilty."

Since Peter Graf was arrested Aug. 2, 1995, the family has paid back taxes, based on figures determined by investigators and tax authorities. Based on the court's findings, too much back taxes may have been paid.

MELBOURNE, Jan 24: Saturday's final of the ladies singles between number 4 seed Martina Hingis and a former champion and unseeded Mary Pierce at 1997 Ford Australian Open offers a contrasting story. Turning pro at the tender age of 14, the Czech-born Swiss has a large following all over the world. Standing only 167 cm weighing 52 kg, this 16-year-old confirmed predictions of early greatness by taking the runner-up prize at the European Open then beating Monica Seles in the Oakland final and taking Graf to five sets in the year-end

Chase Championships. A few days back she took the Sydney Championships. At the '96 Ford Australian Open Amanda Coetzer stopped her at the quarters. She lost to Habsudova in a tight three-setter at Roland Garros and to Graf at Wimbledon and US Open (senior). But Graf had earlier lost to Martina in Rome at the Italian Open and never underestimated her. At Flushing Meadows last year Jana Novotna and Conchita Martinez were among her victims. Hingis enjoys doubles as much as she enjoys singles and here in Melbourne she is playing with Natasha Zvereva. Martina is Wimbledon's youngest ever champion having

won the '96 doubles title with Helena Sukova.

Mary Pierce on the other hand is 180 cm tall and weighs a good 61 kg. Not only by her looks, Pierce caught the eyes of millions of tennis fans by her superb tennis at '94 French Open where she defeated Steffi Graf. A charismatic personality the 1995 Ford Australian Open champion is often admired as much for her daring dresses and expressive manner as for her considerable talent. The 22-year-old former champion upstaged the field by wearing a simple white frock with blue trim. At '96 French Open she disappointed her fans with a third round loss, she did so in an alluring low-cut black sundress. Since scaling the tennis heights two years ago and registering a ranking of No. 3, Mary has struggled to achieve consistency. The Canadian-born Frenchwoman severed ties with coach Nick Bolletieri and is now doing well under the guidance of Brad Gilbert. She did not play in the US Open last year because of injury. She is still outside the top ten in women's tennis and a win here is not going to take her there. But the two players have one thing in common. Both of them are good sport on court and entertain the spectators as much as with their talent as with their oncourt mannerism. Hingis agrees that she herself is a 'good mover' on court but Mary is a very 'strong baseline' player. For Mary it will be home-coming, for Martina it will be coming of age, if she wins.

Muster stoops to Sampras

MELBOURNE, Jan 24: Thomas Muster's computer software did not help him today as he was brushed aside by world number one Pete Sampras in straight sets that lasted 113 minutes on the Centre Court. In quest of his second Australian Open title Sampras played superbly to outshine the dogged number five seed from Austria. The scoreline of 6-1, 7-6 (7-3) and 6-3 does not justify the class of tennis that has been on display from both the players. From his previous two gruelling five-setters against Albert Costa and Dominik Dember it was a welcome relief to have beaten one of the most experienced and persevering of players in the game today in a straight sets.

This will give him opportunity of good rest before the big day on Sunday and also deprive Carlos Moya of Spain of his wish to watch more of Pete on the TV screen to prepare himself for the final. Sampras entered the court with two distinct advantages — a better and bigger serve and 4 years juniority in age. Muster is regarded a tough player and one who would not give up on anything. His physical fitness despite his 30 years old body and indomitable energy and spirit make him one of the toughest players on the circuit. Today in front of the 15 thousand capacity crowd it was tennis per excellence. This was a sort of match where no quarters were asked and no quarters given. It was almost a fight unto death. Whatever these words may sound like the long

run, make him work on his service games. That was the main strategy I had, just to make him move as much as possible and not let him get settled in to where he likes to play. Sampras will come up with plans to combat Moya on Sunday whom he never met before. This will be Moya's first Grand Slam final and he will put in whatever he has to win the title. He has everything that Pete has plus the age deference but he does not have the experience of Pete Sampras.

AP Adds: In beating Muster for the seventh time in eight meetings, Sampras breezed through the first set but found himself trailing 5-2 in the second when the grunting, groaning Austrian muscled several passing shots by him.

But when Muster served for the set at 5-3, he wasted a set point with a forehand into the net, then saw Sampras snatch the game in a thrilling rally that featured two overheads by Sampras that Muster caught and a drop volley that Muster finally couldn't reach.

"There was my chance to take the set, and then it would have been wide open," Muster said. "But once he's ahead, he's hard to beat. He just played too good."
