JWG begins meeting in Delhi today

By M Anwarul Haq A crucial meeting between Bangladesh and India to resolve outstanding bilateral problems relating to border issues, elimination of cross-border insurgency and repatriation of Chakma refugees and other related problems begins in New Delhi today, according to official sources

A three-member Bangladesh team left Dhaka last night to attend the three-day meeting from January 28 of the Joint Working Group(JWG).

Although this is the third meeting of the Joint Working Group, this is the first since the revival of the JWG following an understanding reached between the two countries to resolve the outstanding border issues using this bilateral working forum.

Cabinet asks top bureaucrats

Identify reasons for slow pace of development

The country's bureaucrats have failed to show dynamism in implementing the policies of the new government, despite repeated prodding by the latter to accelerate the process of devel-

opment. This was observed by the council of ministers at the weekly cabinet meeting vesterday which reviewed the pace of development under the sevenmonth-old government led by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina Cabinet Division sources said.

The cabinet asked the top level bureaucrats, including Cabinet Secretary, Principal Secretary to the Prime Minister and the Establishment Secretary to immediately identify the reasons behind the failure of the bureaucracy to cut through its traditional redtapism in implementing vari ous government decisions, the sources added.

The cabinet has also asked the secretaries concerned to

submit a report, along with suggestions, to remove the bureau cratic bottlenecks, to the cabinet within shortest possible time, the sources said

Earlier. Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina herself expressed concern over the dillydallying in the implementation of various development projects and asked the officials concerned to find out a mechanism to avoid some traditional steps in clearing files.

According to the sources, Telecommunications Minister I Mohammad Nasim first expressed dissatisfaction over the performance of the top-ranking government officials at the meeting. He said it was unfortunate that despite the desire of the new government to speed up the bureaucratic machinery specially in terms of file works. the bureaucracy was behaving the same way as it had done during the period of the last
