Supreme Court upholds Benazir's dismissal

ISLMABAD, Jan 29: The Supreme Court today upheld the dismissal of Benazir Bhutto and ordered new elections to go ahead, ending the former prime minister's battle to be returned to power without another vote. reports AP.

President Farooq Leghari dismissed Benazir on November 5, charging her with corruption, economic mismanagement and sponsoring police hit-

squads. Benazir challenged the dismissal in court, and tried to block the general elections scheduled for Monday. She has said she would refuse to accept the results unless she is re-

In today's 6-1 ruling, the high court said the president's layers had produced evidence to substantiate the charges of corruption, phone tapping and extrajudicial killings.

Only 25 per cent of voters said they would vote for Benazir in Monday's polls compared with 40 per cent who said they supported the former premier Sharif, the survey released by the Private Gallup-Pakistan

The gallup poll was conducted from January 19 to 22 in the rural and urban areas over a sample of more than 2,000 voters. It warned however, that its findings still left room for un-

certainty. In three previous elections in 1988, 1990 and 1993, the PPP was behind in early poll but surged just before the vote.

However, the poll said this time the lead of Sharif's Pakistan Muslim League (PML) could be too large to bridge in the race for the 217-member National Assembly.

The survey added that cricketer-turned politician Imran Khan and his 10-monthold Movement for Justice were unlikely to garner much sup-See Page 12 Col 8

3 bills extending tenure of CHT bodies passed

The Jativa Sangsad yesterday passed three identical bills, extending the tenure of the local government councils of Rangamati, Khagrachari and Bandarban hill districts by 360

The bills, passed by voice votes, also said that the government would try to hold elections to the three local government councils within the next 180 days. In case, the elections do not take place, the government will appoint 'an interim council' to run the local admin-

istrations there, the bill said Earlier, President Shahabuddin Ahmed had promul gated three ordinances extend ing the time limit of the local government' councils. The original tenure of the elected councils (parishads) expired on July 11, 1992 and the tenure was extended thrice during the BNP government, by a total of 1640 days. With the passage of the bills yesterday, the tenure has been extended to 2000 day from 1640 days.

While arguing for passage of the bills. Energy and Mineral Resources Minister Lt Gen (retd) Noor Uddin Khan said that the government had made "substantial progress" in resolving the "crisis" in the area through dialogue. Extension of the tenure of the local bodies would eventually help the government hold 'meaningful elections' in the areas, with the active participation of both the Bangalee and non-Bangalee communities living in the Chittagong Hill

Tracts region, he said. Replying to Opposition ob jections to the passage of the bills, the minister concerned said that the BNP government had extended the tenure of the same local bodies for three

Padma barrage planned for optimum use of water

The government plans to build a barrage on the Padma river to ensure optimum utilisation of water available through Indo-Bangla water treaty. Water Resources Minister Abdur Razzak told parliament yesterday, reports UNB.

Responding to a series of questions, he said the government is trying to mobilise foreign assistance for the project. Funds are also expected from donor countries and agencies for water management programme, he added.

The minister said a proposal has already been prepared for the Padma barrage in 10 years at a cost of 4.5 billion US dollars, equivalent to about Tk 18,000 crore.

The Prime Minister has taken special initiative to mobilise the fund, he said adding that the government has received positive response from various donor agencies.

The Prime Minister's Office. the Planning Commission and the Economic Relations Division are continuing their ef forts to get funds for the project. he said, seeking cooperation See Page 12 Col 7

Local varieties of infectious micro-organisms identified

sity, Japan.

A team of Bangladeshi micro-biologists have successfully identified local varieties of micro-organisms which cause deadly infections such as meningitis. Septicaemia (blood infection) and respiratory tract infection. Identification of these mi-

cro-organisms would help the vaccine manufacturers to develop the exact vaccination for the first time in the country. Dr Samir K Saha, an associate professor at the Department

of Microbiology at the Bangladesh Institute of Child Health of Dhaka Shishu Hospital who led the team, said that for the first time these serotypes or varieties of 'Streptococcus Pneumoniae' were identified in Bangladesh which would help formulate the vac-

He, however, emphasised the need for a greater micro-biological survey in Bangladesh, India and China to determine the nature of the killer bacteria in the whole region which is killing an increasing number of

children each year. The team at the Shishu Hospital conducted the studies in collaboration with ICDDR. B and the Institute of Tropical Medicine of Nagasaki Univer-

"The diseases are under control in the western countries because they have formulated the exact vaccine after identifying the serotypes of these micro-organisms," noted Dr Saha. "But that vaccine is unlikely to be valid in our country as there is a remarkable difference of serotype distribution of these micro-organisms.

Another major breakthrough that Dr Saha has achieved through the eight year-long study is to identify "the increasing burden of infection caused by the micro-organism Heemophilus Influenzai Type-B" among the children of Bangladesh. Over the study period, in a single paediatric hospital about 700 children were found to "have the infection with this micro-organism See Page 12 Col 8
