# Nagano starts countdown

TOKYO, Feb 7 Opening the Olympic Games is a big honour. And at 204-centimeters (6-foot 8) tall

Organisers announced earlier this week that Akebono and other top sumo wrestlers will be featured in the Games' opening ceremony performing a ritual in which they stamp on the ground repeatedly to symbolically crush evil spirits. The ritual — which has its

roots in sumo's ancient religious origins — is performed at the six main sumo tournaments held in Japan each year. In Nagano, however, it will

freezing cold. The wrestlers will be wearing only their tradi-tional loincloths.

Friday's celebrations were a much-needed respite for Nagano organisers from a string of squabbles with international sports federations over their Olympic facilities and hotel accommodations.

Organisers say that while the lack of Western-style hotel rooms remains a problem, most of the more serious disputes have been resolved and they are confident the Games will be a

"Preparations are on schedule and going smoothly," Eishiro Saito, head of the organising committee, said in a statement.

The Games in Nagano will be the first in Asia since Sapporo. Japan hosted in 1972. Japan has also hosted a Summer Olympics — in Tokyo in 1964.

Some 3,000 athletes and officials are expected to participate in Nagano.
NHL stars will be making their Olympic debut in the recently completed "Big Hat" hockey rink, and three new medal sports will be introduced -- curling, snowboarding and women's ice hockey.

But while the scale of the Games may prove to be the biggest ever, organisers say they be done in the snow and the are going to try to keep the luge finals.

Instead of glitz and special effects, Nagano is planning a "simple, solemn and spiritual" opening for the 16-day Games. according to opening ceremony producer Man Arai.

Organisers say a total 1.28 million tickets will be made available for the Games.

Applications for the tickets were distributed Friday. The actual distribution of tickets will be decided later, after a lottery is held to decide the ticket win

that former FA chairman Bert Millichip knew two years ago that UEFA was backing Germany's candidacy. Germany announced in 1993 that it would bid for the World

Cup, while England decided to mount its own bid after the successful staging of last summer's Euro 96 championship. "UEFA agreed to put forward one bid, and as long as there

was one bid, they supported this bid (Germany's)," Aigner said Friday. Asked whether UEFA now supported England's right to

submit a bid; he replied, "Yes. Aigner reiterated that UEFA wants only one candidate per continent in order to avoid the bitterness that marked the campaign for the 2002 World Cup between Asian rivals South Korea and Japan.

"We want to maximise our (Europe's) chances to get it," Aigner said. "There should be no excessive competition between associations bidding for such an event."

FIFA said this week that even if UEFA endorses Germany's bid, there is nothing to stop England from submitting its own candidacy directly to the world body.

The deadline for submission of bids is in 1999, with FIFA selecting the host country in June of the year 2000.

The World Cup controversy has become a political issue in Britain, which is in the midst of an election campaign. Both Prime Minister John Major and opposition leader Tony Blair of the Labour Party have criticised UEFA's stance and offered full support for the England bid.
