by banks," Sinha said. "Banks are refusing to open back-to-back LC for those whose orders were cancelled due to the political upheavals. We do not want any special favour but normal bank-to-client relationship," he said.

At least 400 RMG units are in doldrums due to the banks' "unfriendly" attitude. They cannot open LCs despite orders in their hands, he added.

The BGMEA president identified the insurance cost as one of the principal impediments hedging the cost efficiency. "We are being charged at the rate fixed in the early eighties when the export turnover was a meagre 200 million dollars. The insurance companies are charging us 1.2 per cent in category C insurance without theft and pilferage, which is double the rate

in the neighbouring countries." Banks charge about one per cent acceptance charge when LC is accepted: Prior to that, they charged point 75 to point 80 per cent. The rates are not found anywhere. "Unless insurance and bank charges are competitive with our rivals we cannot have the cutting edge over

them," Sinha said He demanded an effective Apparel Board for the RMG sector along with single pool customs and accounting, backward linkage with government patronisation and splitting the composite textile mills in different parts of the country having basic infrastructural support like power, gas, water and roads for its growth.

On the backward linkage, he said there has to be a master plan for it before it is too late.

"Under the World Trade Organisation ground rules, the playing field will be level in future. The quota system will disappear totally in the next century. Unless we have total indigenous contents, our exports will slump because of the cost disad-

vantage. Looking at the future, the BGMEA president said the apparel prices have declined world over but the consumers are placing stress on quality, which we have fulfilled. Ultimately we can make it a ten billion dollar industry if we have requisite support.

Germany: 3 Bangladeshis held

WARSAW, Feb 7: Fifty-five illegal immigrants from Bangladesh and Sri Lanka have been detained near the Polish-German border after trying to enter Germany, a spokesman for the Polish borderguards said today, reports AFP.

Border police arrested 52 Sri Lankan nationals and three Bangladeshis in the home of a resident of the border village of Tuplice of Thursday, where they were waiting to be taken across the border to Germany.

said: "Your (Hasina), insistence on speaking the truth made you dangerous to tyrants.
"They (tyrants) confined you to your father's house. But they

never imprisoned your spirit," Westling said.

"There, chatelaine of your father's home and of his legacy. you lived in the freedom known only to the brave. And now, a quarter of a century after your father realised his dream of an independent Bangladesh, you have restored the course of democracy.'

Earlier, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, attired in ceremonial costume, was led to the dais in a procession led by the University President, Jon Westling.

The national anthem of the two countries were played and the Holy Quran recited by Imam Talal Eid, Religious Director of the Islamic Centre for New Eng-

Westling said: "Your father gave Bangladesh life at the cost of his own. At frequent cost of your liberty and the continual risk of your life, you have restored your country's democratic birthright.

"With an eloquence that is as simple as it is incisive, you have defined your goal for the people of Bangladesh: "Bread and ballot."

Westling said too often, the people of the Third World had been told that they must exchange the ballot for bread and had ended up with neither. "Under your courageous leadership, Bangladesh will have both."

Accepting the rare honour, the Bangladesh premier thanked the Boston University authorities for choosing her for this honour and addressed the world leaders' forum at the uni-

versity. "I'm delighted to receive the degree of Doctor of Laws. I would like to thank Boston University for choosing me for this honour. I accept this on behalf of my people who have elected me to lead them into the 21st century.



also increased have marginally. However, the prices of fine rices have been found stable.

According to its varieties, each kg of fine rice is being sold at Tk 24 to 36. Katari Bhog costs Tk 24-26 per kg while Chinigura and Kalijira are being sold at Tk 28 to 34. Other items, required for Eid special dishes, like simai and lassa are being sold at Tk 24 to 30 according to its brand. Dried grapes costs Tk 65 to 90 per kg, cinnamon Tk 120 to 160, clove Tk 80 to 140 and cardamom Tk 240 to 400. Sugar price remains stable at Tk 30 to 32.

Prices of other essentials, mainly vegetables, were found stable. One kg of garlic costs Tk 36 to 40, onion Tk 12 to 14, ginger Tk 24 to 30 and cauliflower and cabbages (medium sized) Tk 8 to 12.
