The Pakistan A team will be the first among the three subcontinental cricketing giants to arrive in the capital to feature in the third SAARC cricket tournament, scheduled to being at the Dhaka Stadium from February 19.

The strong Pakistan side led by former Test captain Asif Mujtaba is expected to fly into the city on February 16. Defending champions India A will arrive in the capital on February 17 while Sri Lanka A is expected to turn up on February 18. The quadrangular meet also includes the Bangladesh national team, which finished runner-up here in December

Meanwhile, the organisers Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) are working round the clock for a successful completion of the meet. The tourney which was first held in 1992, however, fell through due to political unrest following the demolition of a Mosque in India.

After the abortive first at tempt, it was successfully completed the following year when India A won and Pakistan finished second.

India then retained the title of the annual international event in 1994 defeating Bangladesh in the final. But for the hosts their remarkable performance en route to the fi-nal turned out to a red letter day n the annuls of the country's cricket.





just 26 balls that included six boundaries, smashed a Lance Klusener deliver that Rhodes dove for and snared with one hand.

Indian officials later complained Rhodes grounded the ball, but the catch stood to leave India at 54 for two.

Azharuddin and Rahul Dravid then put on a 62-run third wicket partnership until Dravid was caught by Gary Kirsten off a Hansie Cronje delivery. When Azharuddin was run out by Daryll Cullinan, one of three run outs in the innings. India was destined to finish with less than 200 runs.

Allan Donald led the South African attack with figures of two wickets for 23 runs in 10 overs, while Klusener also claimed two wickets for 35 runs in his 10 overs.

JOHANNESBURG, Feb 12: Australian skipper Mark Taylor plans to use four warm-up matches in South Africa to work on his struggling form prior to the first Test beginning Feb 28, reports AP. Taylor, 32. has hit a new low
