BONN, Feb 22: Steffi Graf announced on Friday she will be out of tennis for the next four weeks with a recurrent left knee injury, missing a Federation Cup tie and events in Indian Wells and Key Biscayne, reports

Graf, who had to pull out of the Pan Pacific final in Tokyo three weeks ago with the same injury, told reporters she had been ordered not to pick up a racket for four weeks because of an inflammation of the patella

tendon. World number one Graf had been due to play in Germany's first round Federation Cup tie against the Czech Republic on March 1 and 2 in Mannhim, not far from her home town of Bruehl.

"I really wanted to play on my own doorstep. The fact that I'll be missing obviously, isn't that good for the event," said the Wimbledon, US and French Open champion, who will also be unable to defend her titles in Indian Wells starting on March 3 and Key Biscayne beginning on March 17. "Maybe I could have man-

aged to play by hook or by crook, in spite of the injury, but I really want to avoid the kind of setbacks I had in Tokyo or (pulling out of the semifinal in October) in Leipzig," she said. Graf's absence from the two

US tournaments means she may be in danger of ending her record-breaking run as world number one, and have to make way in April for Switzerland's 16-year-old Australian Open champion, Martina Hingis.

Graf said she was determined to be fit for the start of the European clay court season, adding: "My main goals are of course the French Open and Wimbledon."

### BCCI invites Bangladesh to Wills Trophy

Sports Reporter Bangladesh national cricket team will take part in the Wills Trophy in India from next sea-

This was informed by the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) president Saber Hossain Chowdhury MP while talking to the reporters vesterday after noon during the lunch break of the SAARC cricket match between Bangladesh and Sri Lanka A.

"We have already started playing in the Wills Cup in Pakistan from this season and in response to our request, the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) has also agreed to allow us in their biggest domestic tournament which involves eight best teams of the Ranji Trophy.

Saber said that the BCCI accepted Bangladesh's proposal in its working committee meeting which was held in Bombay last week. BCB vice-president Syed Ashraful Haque attended the meeting.

Besides, the BCB boss also said that Bangladesh would arrange an international cricket tournament in Dhaka next season. However, he declined to say the date and how many countries they would invite.

Sved Ashraful Haque, who was also present during the cogitation, said an umpire from Bangladesh would be included. in the Asia Cup umpires' panel which will be held in Colombo next July.

He said he attended two meetings during his four-day visit to Bombay. After the BCCI meeting, a meeting of the Asian Cricket Council was also held where he was included in a fourmember technical committee for Asia Cup. Majid Khan and Asif Igbal of Pakistan and one from Sri Lanka are the other three members.

These three aside, the rest of the outfit was in shambles. Especially towards the end of the innings, the batsmen were not able to capitalise on the momentum provided by Akram and Sanwar.

The dismissals of Javed Omar Belim and Jahangir Alam cannot go without mention. Both went caught at slip to deliveries just outside offstump. Their consistency at poking good deliveries should by now have prompted coaches to instruct young cricketers to keep their eyes shut when matching these to batting.

One observation about the batting was the over-cautiousness, especially in the initial stages. The top and middle orders' watchfulness can be appreciated, but not at the expense of having unnecessarily slow starts that puts pressure on the later batsmen. Perhaps one should keep in mind that a bad ball is a bad ball - be it in the first over or the last over - and they have to be pounced on.

When it came to bowling, the hosts fared no better than in their previous match. The evidence — the 24 wides conceded. In all fairness, Hasibul Hossain Shanto bowled with greater control than he did on Wednesday and Zakir Hossain proved a better choice to Anisur Rahman by far. But on the whole, the

bowling was wayward, biteless

and mediocre, at best.

Saiful Islam Khan, our most consistent bowler in the international arena in recent years, bowled a total of eleven wides, unforgiveable for a bowler of his experience. Enamul Huq Moni sent down successive long-hops outside leg-stump to a batsman facing his first ball. In general, short balls dominated the scene, despite continual reminders to the bowlers that it is difficult to drive on an artificial turf.

The lack of a specialist offspinner was again badly felt. Of the spinners. Moni was erratic and Naimur Rahman Durjoy, although bowling well, never looked likely to get a wicket.

As far as fielding was concerned, it was a display of unsavourly incompetence. The team simply needs to be retrained in holding on to simple catches and hitting the stumps more often from close distance.

Actually, yesterday's poor show prompted suggestions that the Bangladesh team go back to camp for some basic training. From what it seems, Gordon Greenidge has his job cut out for him. He may have to go as far back as to teach his team how to cup their hands together or, even, how to grip a ball. If does so immediately, we may still have hopes of making the World Cup. But for now, those dreams look a long way ahead.


