Favourites Pakistan A expectedly won the battle of the bitter neighbours in the third SAARC tourney when they handed their counterparts from across the border, India A a convincing 68-run defeat at the Dhaka Stadium yesterday.

The clash of the second string sides of the two giants of the cricketing world petered into an anti-climatic finish as the holders, broken at the back by a burst of pure pace from Mohammad Zahid limped to 164 for nine after their arch rivals set them a victory target of 233. Put into bat, Pakistan A made 232 for nine.

With this win, Pakistan stormed into the final of the four-nation invitational tournament with one match to spare against Sri Lanka A. While it was India's first defeat against Pakistan in the unofficial one-day tourney since its inception in 1992.
