trade and commerce. Aaluddin Brujerdi, Deputy Foreign Minister of Iran said here yester-The Iranian government has given legal status to those Bangladeshi wage earners in

that country who did not have valid documents, he said. Brujerdi was addressing press conference at the Iranian embassy on conclusion of his two-day visit to Bangladesh.

Brujerdi talked in Persian language which was translated into English by an interpreter. Mohammad Abbaszadeh Charge de Affairs of the Iranian embassy, was also present.

Home Minister Rafiqul Islam yesterday regretted the attacks on BNP supporters in Feni that left a number of people injured, including a legislator of the party, and assured the opposition party that the government would ensure exemplary punishment to those responsible for the attacks.

The minister was giving a statement in the Jatiya Sangsad following a heated debate on the reported attacks on BNP supporters who were on their way to join the public meeting addressed by party chief Begum Khaleda Zia in Feni on Wednesday.

"I am sorry that the BNP supporters were exposed to terrorist attack on their way to join the party rally in Feni Wednesday. I also express deep sympathy for the BNP legislator who received injury," the Home Minister said adding, ."I




Welcoming the Prince at Bangabhaban, President Shahabuddin said Bangladesh has always looked upon Britain as one of its trusted friends and partners in development.

Forge business-NGO ties for development

Prince Charles has stressed the need for businesses to forge a partnership with the society to help develop a strategy for sustainable development in the changing world.

"We are aiming at coupling economic development with social development as businesses cannot flourish indefinitely while the society it serves is in poverty," he said at the concluding session of a daylong work

shop at a city hotel yesterday. The Prence of Wales Business Leaders Forum (PWBLF) and the PRIP Trust organised the 'Partners in Development' workshop in collaboration with the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI).

The concluding session was also addressed by Foreign Minister Abdus Samad Azad. State Minister for Planning Dr Mohiuddin Khan Alamgir, Yusuf

Abdullah Harun, President FBCCI, Khushi Kabir of Nijera Kori, Aroma Goon, Executive Director of PRIP, Shahin Anam, Director of PRIP, Ross Tennyson and Jane Nelson of PWBLF.

Giving a background of forming the PWBLF, Prince Charles said it had developed contacts with the World Bank Overseas Development Aid and the British Council. "We have been able to form a
