Bangladesh bulldoze HK

Vice-captain Aminul Islam Bulbul scored an unbeaten half-century as Bangladesh, starting their Group F second leg campaign in the sixth International Cricket Council (ICC) Trophy yesterday, beat the rain and Hong Kong by seven wickets at the Selangor ground in Kuala Lumpur.

According to a faxed message received here yesterday in the evening, the dapper right-hander, coming in to bat at his customary position of number four, hit a watchful 53 as Bangladesh, chasing a modest Hong Kong total of 145 in the stipulated 50 overs, rattled up

Batting under an overcast condition and with the light drizzle threatening to spoil the proceedings, Aminul Islam and his skipper Akram Khan, in a desired twist from a chronic failure of the middle-order, has finally come to terms, producing 77 runs for the undefeated fourth wicket.

In his workmanlike 83-ball stay at the dump wicket, Aminul, who was adjudged man-of-the-match later, built his innings scoring ones and twos, and only once he went for a big hit which produced a delightful four.

While a burly Akram, who remained unbeaten on a 45-ball 25, rolled up the match with a four, licking Jones delicately in the 39th over before the rain could cause any damage to the smooth sailing of Bangladesh.

It was Bangladesh's sixth straight win in the 22-nation meet so far. Bangladesh, who had earlier stormed into the second phase as Group B champions with five wins from as many matches, will face a stiffer challenge today from Ireland, who recorded a rain-aided upset win over fancied Holland yesterday.

However, with this impressive victory Bangladesh took the winning record against Hong Kong to 11-0 in whatever

international outings. Although the watchfulness of Akram and his deputy guided Bangladesh to a facile victory, the stage was set earlier by the bowlers, who backed by some excellent piece of fieldings, shot Hong Kong out to a paltry total. But after a tooth-less attack by Hasibul Hossain and Saiful Islam — the two new-ball bowlers — the initial break through was made by Khaled Masud, who with his military medium pace, removed openers Brew for nine. The landslide in the Hong Kong innings was switched on when Akram, coming as the second change in the

attack, had one down Emes caught and bowled for eight, reducing Hong Kong to 62 for two from where they were never been able to recover. Left-arm spinner Mohammad Rafique, who returned into the team after a one-match lay-off due to a minor injury, then ripped through the middle and lower order to finish with three for 20 in his 7.2 overs. He was ably supported by Minhazul Abedin Nannu, who chipped in with two for 27 in his eight economic overs.

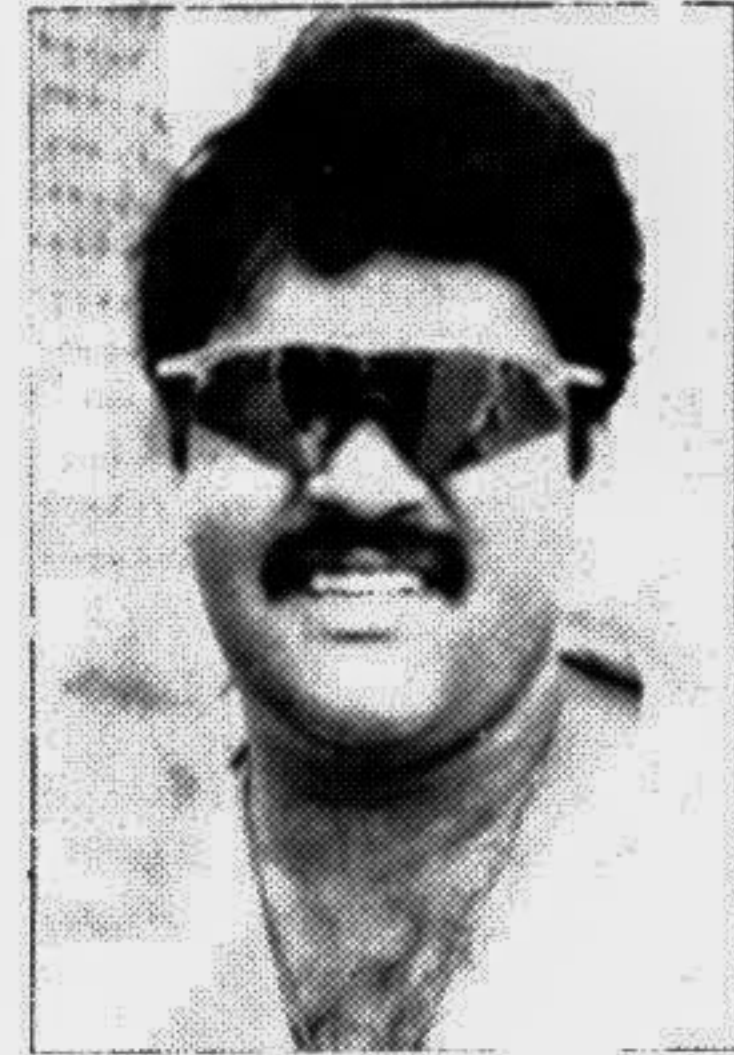
Besides, three Hong Kong batsmen including opener Farcy, who top-scored with 38, were run out. Hasibul Hossain, the tall right-arm seamer, though failed to live up with the shining ball, effected two run-outs with perfection.

If Bangladesh, who are expecting to stick with the same squad, win in today's match their passage to the semifinals from Group F will be almost confirmed. The eight-team second round, split into Group E and F, is being played on a round robin league format with the top two teams from each group moving into the semifinals.

The top three sides of this tournament will qualify for the 1999 World Cup to be held in England.

BDR spikers emerge champs

Bangladesh Rifles emerged unbeaten champions in the top-five volleyball tournament with a hard-fought five-set victory over Bangladesh Army in their last match at the Mirpur Indoor Stadium yesterday.

In a sec-saw encounter, BDR took the first two sets 15-13, 15-11 while the Armymen rallied to win the next two sets 17-15 and 15-12. However, the border security forces responded clinching the final set 15-10.

It was the fourth win for BDR in the five-team robin league which put them atop the standings with full four points. On the other hand, Army, who suffered their first defeat yesterday, secured the second spot with three points.

In the other match of the day, Bangladesh Air Force 3-1. The winners finished third with two points while Air Force lost all the four matches. The remaining participants in the five-team tournament, finished fourth with one point.

State Minister for Youth and Sports Obaidul Quader distributed prizes among the winners.

Sharjah set to heat up



SHARJAH, United Arab Emirates, Apr 1: Sri Lanka's faltering one-day reputation will be put under the grinder by Pakistan and Zimbabwe when the Sharjah Cup opens here on Thursday, reports AFP.

Arjuna Ranatunga's World Cup heroes have had a miserable run since being crowned one-day kings in March last year. Amidst reports of internal bickering which cost their Australian coach Dav Whatmore his job.

In the past year, the Sri Lanka have tasted success just once — winning the Singer Cup at home in September — but have lost multi-nation events in Singapore, Kenya and at this desert venue.

They came to this three-nation 75,000-dollar tournament still recovering from a humiliating tour of New Zealand where they lost both Test matches last month and were forced to share the one-day series 1-1.

Whatmore's successor, fellow Australian Bruce Yardley, got a taste of Sri Lankan cricket politics when controversy erupted over the omission of pugnacious left-hander Asanka Gurusinha for both the New Zealand tour and the Sharjah Cup.

Manager Duleep Mendis was stripped of his dual role as chief selector on Sunday, although

cricket officials insist that Gurusinha's sacking was not an issue.

They said there was a "conflict of interest" in Mendis being both manager and chief selector.

Mendis, a former Test captain, refused to comment and was surprisingly upbeat about Sri Lanka's chances in the tournament.

"We are hoping to turn the wheel of fortune again," he said during the 14-man squad's first training session on Tuesday.

"We played badly in New Zealand but the defeats have made the boys even more determined to do well here. I am certain we will bounce back."

Skipper Ranatunga was equally optimistic. The failure of our top batsmen was the main reason for losing to New Zealand, but we will not repeat those mistakes.

The New Zealand tour is history now. And the boys are pretty keyed up to take on Pakistan and Zimbabwe.

That task is easier said than done. Wasim Akram's Pakistan, rated by an Indian computer ranking as the best cricket team in the world, surprised both Australia and the West Indies while winning the World Series in January.

Zimbabwe, for long the babes of world cricket, took a giant stride forward this year when they defeated Mike Ath-

ton's England in the one-dayers at home and narrowly missed the final of the triangular series against South Africa and India.

Pakistan will be formidable even without experienced opener Amir Sohail, serving a one-month ban because of a tiff with cricket board official Majid Khan, and stroke-player Inzamam-ul-Haq, who was dropped for lack of form.

In Akram and Waqar Younis, who will receive a benefit purse from the organisers during the tournament, Pakistan have a potent strike force which is backed by the deadly spin of Saqlain Mushtaq and Mushtaq Ahmed.

Sri Lanka can take heart from their 7-1 track record against Zimbabwe, but they have lost 43 of their 59 matches against Pakistan — 11 of them in 16 encounters in Sharjah.

Sri Lanka take on Zimbabwe in Thursday's opener. The two top teams in the double-leg preliminary league will advance to the April 11 final worth 40,000 dollars to the winners.

Life in the fast lane



KEY BISCAYNE, Florida, Apr 1: (Agencies) She's fresh-faced and formidable and now rules the world of women's tennis.

At age 16, Martina Hingis of Switzerland has swept aside her last 26 opponents on the fast track to becoming the youngest player ever to grab the top ranking in the world.

The latest player to fall to the Hingis combination of speed and tennis smarts was Monica Seles in the final of the Lipton Championships. The excitation was swift, as Hingis needed only 44 minutes in a 6-2, 6-1 romp.

"It's just like a little dream comes true right now," said Hingis, who officially took over as queen of tennis when new rankings were released on Monday.

"All the life you worked for it and it's getting true, you're becoming the best player in the world."

Being the best can be an arduous job, but Hingis for now seems immune to the pressures the number one spot can bring.

"I've never had so much fun out there," says Hingis, who be-

came the youngest player to win a Grand Slam title when she won the Australian Open in January.

"If you play well, you know you can beat almost everybody in the world. It's great to go out there and play in front of 10,000 people."

The trip to the top has been a wonderful ride; surprisingly mature for her age, Hingis never appears intimidated by opponents or anything else, nor does she anticipate feeling fearful of weighty expectations.

"What should I be afraid of?" said Hingis, tossing a questioning look. "Why should I be worried? Everything is perfect."

Hingis even turns a nonchalant eye to the vast amounts of money she's amassed this year alone; she's earned over 1 million dollars.

"The money is rolling, rolling," laughs Hingis, "well, life doesn't change because you just won 100,000 dollars more or less. I still can't drive a car, I still can't go out, I still can't do that because I'm underage everywhere."

Everywhere, that is, except in the world of tennis. Melanie Molitor, Hingis' mother and coach, clearly is doing something right — although the child prodigy might be reluctant to admit it.

"You don't want to really listen to somebody else," said Hingis, sounding like a typical teen, "because you have to be on the court by yourself anyway."

Now, she is the youngest No 1, fueling anticipation of her next meeting with Graf. Hingis has lost five of six matches against Graf, but they have yet to play this year.

Graf will be sidelined for at least four more weeks.

"Steffi at her best and Martina at her best is a great match," Fernandez said. "Martina has the legs to run down Steffi's big forehands. She's able to come in and put Steffi on defence. Steffi has the big serve and can maybe outthier her on her forehand side."

"I can't say that one is better than the other."

Hingis looks forward to the showdown.

"For sure one day it's going to come," she said, "and we'll see who's the better player."

Mixed day for seeds



HILTON HEAD ISLAND, SC, Apr 1: Tenth seed Karina Habudova of Slovakia and 15th seed Elena Likhovtseva of Russia suffered first-round defeats at the Family Circle Cup women's tennis tournament Monday as the clay court session got underway, reports Reuter.

Habudova, ranked 12th in the world, fell to 53rd-ranked Alexandra Fusai of France 7-6, 6-3.

The 19th-ranked Likhovtseva looked to have her match well in hand before 40th-ranked Italian Silvia Farina bounced back for a 1-6, 6-3, 6-4 victory.

Ninth-seeded Iva Majoli of Croatia, the highest seed to see opening-day action, struggled early but survived with a 4-6, 6-4, 6-4 victory over Canadian qualifier Rene Simpson.

Majoli said the adjustment from playing on hardcourts to the low, soft clay gave her some early problems.

"It takes some time to get used to, especially as far as sliding on the court," Majoli said.

"It's easy to lose control of your feet. In the beginning, I was a little scared, but I got comfortable later on."

Hard-serving Dutchwoman Brenda Schultz-McCarthy, seeded 14th, had all she could handle from Elena Makarova. The Russian, ranked a lowly 93rd in the world, kept Schultz-

McCarthy on court for two hours and 20 minutes before the 14th seed finally prevailed 3-6, 7-6 (7-2), 6-4.

In other matches, 13th-ranked South African Amanda Coetzer had no trouble in defeating Henrieta Nagova of Slovakia 6-2, 6-3 and No 16 Magdalena Maleeva of Bulgaria reached the next round with a straight sets victory over Czech Petra Langrova.

The strong field is headed by 16-year-old Swiss sensation Martina Hingis, who is expected to play her first match as the No 1 player in the world Tuesday night.

Hingis, who takes five titles and a 26-0 1997 match record into this event, opens against Germany's Barbara Rittner in the second round after receiving a first-round bye.

Monica Seles, who was crushed by Hingis in the Lipton Championships final Saturday, is also entered into this event.

KUALA LUMPUR, Apr 1: First-timers to the ICC Trophy, Scotland, scored a morale-boosting 42-run victory over Denmark to get off to a sound start in their bid to enter the last four in this competition, reports AFP.

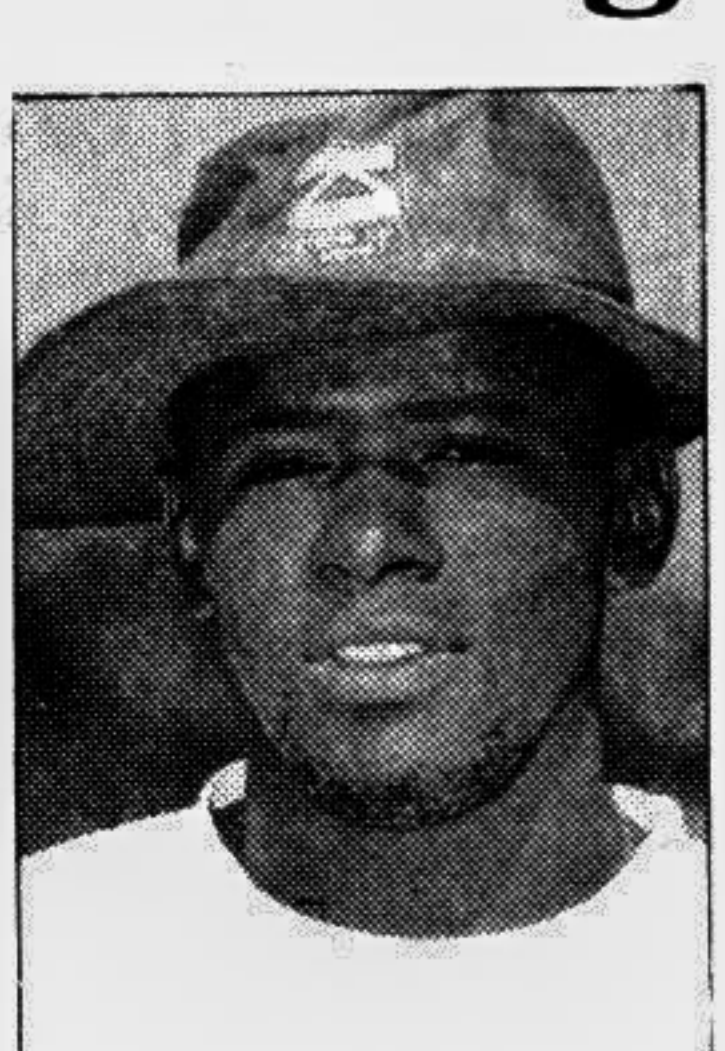
The Scots, led in exemplary fashion by skipper George Salmond, bowled out Denmark for 122, having set them a modest target of 165.

Salmond was the mainstay of the Scots innings with a fighting 59. It proved invaluable in the end with Denmark struggling to cope with a medium pace attack.

The victory will be a big boost to Scotland's campaign to qualify for the semifinals.

Kenya, the favourites in Scotland's second round, Group E, also won, beating Canada on a higher comparative scoring rate in a game which was ultimately rained out.

Kenyan captain Maurice Odumbe continued his superb form with the bat to score an unbeaten 148, the highest individual score in this tournament so far. The dashing stroke-maker received good support from Steven Tikolo, who made 93, as Kenya reached 303 for six

Canada were struggling at 127 for seven in the 47th over when a thunderstorm halted play. Under a new format being used for the first time to decide the fate of matches washed out by rain, Kenya were declared winners.

There was a similar scenario in Group F where Ireland beat Holland on this system in a game stopped by rain. Holland scored 211 for eight in their al-

lotted overs, with Peter Cantrell hitting an unbeaten 53.

In reply Ireland were 91 for three when rain stopped play. They were duly awarded the game.

According to the tournament rules, the side batting second must have faced 20 overs for this comparative scoring system to apply in case of rain. If rain forces a match to be abandoned before 20 overs are bowled in the second innings, points would be shared.
