According to a faxed message received here yesterday in the evening, the dapper right-hander, coming in to bat at his customary position of number four, hit a watchful 53 as Bangladesh, chasing a modest Hong Kong total of 145 in the stipulated 50 overs, rattled up



pretty keyed up to take on Pak-istan and Zimbabwe."



world of women's tennis. At age 16, Martina Hingis of Switzerland has swept aside her last 26 opponents on the fast track to becoming the youngest player ever to grab the top ranking in the world.

The latest player to fall to the Hingis combination of speed and tennis smarts was Monica Seles in the final of the Lipton Championships. The execution was swift, as Hingis needed only 44 minutes in a 6-2, 6-1 romp.

"It's just like a little dream comes true right now," said Hingis, who officially took over as queen of tennis when new rankings were released on Monday.

"All the life you worked for it and it's getting true, vou're becoming the best player in the world. Being the best can be an ar-

duous job, but Hingis for now seems immune to the pressures the number one spot can bring. "I've never had so much fun out there," says Hingis, who became the youngest player to win a Grand Slam title when she won the Australian Open in January "If you play well, you know

you can beat almost everybody in the world. It's great to go out there and play in front of 10,000 people."
