Clinton okays economic ban on Myanmar

WASHINGTON, Apr 22: President Bill Clinton has approved imposing economic sanctions against Myanmar due to human rights abuses by the Myanmar military government, a Clinton administration official said early today.

The official said Clinton made the decision within the last few days since Myanmar's military government had become "increasingly repressive lately" and was ignoring international calls for progress toward a democratically elected government.

Visiting minister tells meeting with DCCI

Bangladesh on Thai priority list of potential trade partners

The visiting Thai Deputy Foreign Minister Pitak Intrawitayantun has said Bangladesh is on Thailand's priority list of potential partner countries regarding trade and investment, reports BSS.

"This is why my delegation and I are here," he added.

He was addressing a discussion meeting between Thai business delegation and Dhaka Chamber of Commerce and Industry DCCI here yesterday. State Minister for Foreign Affairs Abul Hasan Chowdhury, State Minister for Jute and Textile A K M Faezul Haq and DCCI President A S M Quasem also addressed the meeting.

Pitak said his country and Bangladesh have already agreed to double the volume of trade and investment by the year 2000.

"And we have reached a mutual understanding on how best to facilitate business interactions between our private sectors, and how to create an atmosphere conducive to bilateral trade and investment," he added.

The Thai Deputy Foreign Minister laid emphasis on setting up of a joint Thai-Bangladesh business council in future so that the private sectors of the two countries could take full advantage of the economic complementarities existing between the countries.

He assured that the government of Thailand would do its best to create an atmosphere conducive to further business activities between the two countries and added "I am certain that the Bangladesh government would do the same."

Pitak said, economic coop-

eration between his country and Bangladesh is set to grow from strength to strength for the benefit of the people of both the countries, with cooperation between two governments and the respective private sectors.

Speaking at the discussion meeting Abul Hasan Chowdhury said, private entrepreneurs of the country are very enthusiastic to work with their Thai counterparts and hoped that the Thai business people should take the opportunity.

Investors identify areas

The Indo-Chinese and ASEAN countries including Thailand are now looking towards the South Asia for their overseas investment while the latter one has identified Bangladesh as one of its "priority countries" in this regard, a senior Thai official said here yesterday, reports BSS.

"We are delighted to see the potential of Bangladesh and the Thai investors are considering to invest in some potential sectors like agro-based industries, fisheries, textile and garments sector and hotel and construction business," Supat Limpaporn, Assistant Secretary General of Thai Board of Investment said.

Supat, a member of the visiting Thai delegation, made the comments during talks with the Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce and Industries (MCCI) leaders at the chamber building here.

The visiting Thai entrepreneurs reviewed the possibilities and scopes of investment with their Bangladesh counterparts

here during the talks. Welcoming the delegation, MCCI President Samson H Chowdhury said in a long term scenario of international competition, Thai industries must relocate some of their operations to "cheaper production bases" to enjoy competitive edge in the global market.

"In this perspective, Bangladesh has established itself as one of the cheapest production bases in South Asia," he told the Thai entrepreneurs.

Chowdhury told the Thai delegation that Bangladeshi business community face "humiliating treatment" at the Bangkok Airport despite multiple entry visa system has been introduced to facilitate the business community of the two countries.

"Such a treatment is most unfortunate and it is our expectation that suitable instructions would be issued to immigration authorities at the earliest to stop such type treatments to Bangladeshi travellers," he added.

has been offering excellent incentives including 100 per cent foreign ownership, tax holidays, unrestricted repatriation of capital and profit.

DCCI President said, like other developing countries capital formation is a major constraint in Bangladesh and Thai investors may help in this regard.

Quasem said, the two countries should jointly aim at increasing the volume of trade and diversifying it in such a way that the trade gap between the countries remain at a manageable level.

Currently there is a trade imbalance between Bangladesh and Thailand which is in favour of Thailand. In 1995-96, Bangladesh's import from Thailand was about 61 million dollars while export was about 11 million dollars.

Meanwhile, a Thai trade fair will open at Sonargaon Hotel today.

Thirty companies will take part in the fair with products like food and beverages, toys, plastic goods, electrical appliances gems and jewellery.

Thailand keen to invest in EPZs

Thailand has expressed keen interest to invest in the Export Processing Zones of Bangladesh, says a press release.

The interest was shown when the visiting Thai Deputy Foreign Minister, Pitak Intrawitayantun, went to see the Dhaka Export Processing Zone at Savar yesterday. He is leading a high-power 49-member delegation.

The Executive Chairman of the Bangladesh Export Processing Zones Authority, Moazzem Hussain Khan, briefed the Thai Deputy Foreign Minister about various facilities and incentives offered by BEPZA to the investors.

Intrawitayantun evinced deep interest to learn that production cost in the EPZs of Bangladesh is one of the lowest in the world because of most inexpensive labour force and uninterrupted production.

He said Thailand is actively considering increasing investment in Bangladesh on priority basis.

Later Intrawitayantun visited a number of industries in DEPZ and expressed satisfaction over the working process and environment.

Shrimp farming helps reduce malaria in Vietnam

HANOI, Apr 22: Researchers in Ho Chi Minh City have found a direct link between shrimp farming and a reduction in malaria infections, the World Health Organization (WHO) said on Monday, reports AFP.

Scientists from the Sub-Institute of Malariology in Ho Chi Minh City found malaria mosquito larvae were not found where shrimp were grown with mangroves or in ponds which use pumps to circulate water, the WHO said in a media statement.

The discovery resulted from the observation that malaria cases fell 85 per cent in coastal provinces in the Mekong Delta where shrimp farming was conducted in mangrove swamps, while other areas where shrimp was farmed in stagnant ponds stagnant ponds saw no decline in the number of cases.

The findings of the WHO could have important implications for rural development, it said.

"The Vietnamese discovery of a possible link between good shrimp pond management and malaria prevention is important not only to the Mekong Delta, but throughout coastal areas in the province," the statement said.

Last year in Vietnam, 198 people died from malaria, down from 348 malaria fatalities in 1995, according to official statistics.

The number of malaria infected patients in 1996 was 532,860, down 20 per cent from a year earlier.

Lloyd's Register publishes new edition of Future IMO Legislation

Lloyd's Register (LR) has published a new edition of its popular booklet *Future IMO Legislation*, available free of charge, says a press release.

The publication, edited by Mike Magill of LR's Construction Services Department, highlights all IMO legislation of a technical nature which will enter into force between 1997 and 2010. It also contains details of legislation under consideration or awaiting ratification.

The information includes many important changes which were adopted during 1996, in particular amendments to SOLAS Chapters II-1, II-2, III, V, VI and VII, as well as the IBC and IGC Codes.

Agreement with German Marine Administration

Lloyd's Register (LR) has signed a ship survey agreement with the German Marine Administration (See-Berufsgenossenschaft) to provide statutory and technical surveys for both new and existing German flag ships, with effect from May 1, this year.

The German Marine Administration also signed similar agreements with Det Norske Veritas and Bureau Veritas. Previously only the national classification society, Germanischer Lloyd, could provide such services.

Foundation course for Southeast Bank officers begins

A month-long foundation course for the probationary officers of Southeast Bank Ltd opened yesterday at Bangladesh Institute of Bank Management (BIBM). Syed Anisul Huq, Managing Director of Southeast Bank, inaugurated the course. A H M Nurul Islam Chowdhury, Director General of BIBM presided over the inaugural function, says a press release.

The specially designed course will mainly focus on banking laws and practices, specific banking legislation, deposit banking foreign exchange operations, audit and inspection, customer services etc.

NEW DELHI, Apr 22: India's new Prime Minister Inder Kumar Gujral on Monday vowed to speed up the pace of economic reforms and said the country could achieve a growth rate of eight per cent by the turn of the century, reports AFP.

Gujral, who retained the Foreign Ministry portfolio after being sworn-in, also said he would stick to the foreign policy of his predecessor HD Deve Gowda's ousted government.

"The economic and foreign policies pursued by the Deve Gowda government will be sustained and further strengthened," Gujral said.

Foreign Secretary Farooq Sobhan paid a two-day visit to Moscow April 14-15 to hold annual consultations with his Russian counterpart Deputy Foreign Minister Grigory B Karasin, reports UNB.

They discussed bilateral matters and regional and international issues of common concern, and agreed to strengthen economic ties and explore new areas of cooperation between the two countries, according to a message received here Monday.
