In the wake of government move against delinquent loanees, a businessmen's delegation yesterday apprised the President that wilful and circumstantial defaulters of bank loans should not be banded in the same category, reports UNB.

Circumstantial defaulters should be backed by necessary facilities and privileges so that they can repay the loans and make their sick industries viable, the delegation of Bangladesh Chamber of Industries told President Shahabuddin Ahmed

"On the other hand, the wilful defaulters of bank loans should be severely dealt with under the law," it said.

PM opens city AL council meet today

Awami League chief and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina is likely to be empowered to nominate a new committee for her party's city unit as it goes into council session today, party sources told The Daily

Sheikh Hasina will inaugurate the council this afternoon. The council, scheduled to begin at 3 pm at the Engineers' Institution, will be chaired by city AL president and Mayor of Dhaka Mohammad Hanif.

Some 1,400 councillors representing city AL working committee and 107 ward and union level units are scheduled to attend the council while 1,400 more party delegates would be also present, the sources said.

The last council of city AL was held on September 16, 1992. This time the council is being held eight days before the belated national council of the ruling party, billed for May 6-7.

Though the city unit council is being held today, new office bearers and members of its 55strong executive committee is not likely to be announced to-

Khaleda at AmCham meet

We don't believe in politics of vengeance

BNP Chairperson Begum Khaleda Zia has said the government has failed to attract foreign investment because of its past record of causing economic disruptions by hartal programmes while in the opposition and for messing up of the economy since it has taken over the administration.

"The foreign investors were systematically rejected by them. How can the same investors have confidence in the call for investment by the same . people who are now in the government?" she asked.

Addressing as a guest of honour the monthly luncheon meeting of the American Chamber of Commerce in Bangladesh (Amcham) yesterday, the Leader of the Opposition in the Jatiya Sangsad and former prime minister said that during the tenure of her government the national economy was extremely favourable for foreign direct investment (FDI), but the then opposition had disrupted the political en-"We have not done anything to destabilise the political and

social environment, but the government has so messed up the economy, including the money market, that no genuine foreign investor has really started any investment yet," she Since 1991 the BNP govern-

ment had taken the initiative to attract foreign investment but the political and economic disruptions caused by the then opposition obstructed the process, she said. They had called 'hartals' on the opening day of the 'Euro-Money Conference' of foreign investors convened in Dhaka as well as on the day of inaugural work of the Jamuna Bridge Project, she recalled.

Begum Zia also referred to the 'phase of nationalisation' immediately after the Liberation War. During that "phase of socialism, all major industries were nationalised. I am still afraid of the torch bearers and sycophants of a political party. The economy of the country is bleeding till today as a result of just one bad decision," she

Reiterating her party's policy of disinvestment, the former premier blamed the then opposition for obstructing the process by trade union agita-

Begum Zia said that her party did not make any move to disrupt the normal economic process in the country and spoke against politics of vengeance.

This brings to 81 the number of countries that have so far ratified the treaty designed to outlaw the production, stockpiling, transfer and use of chemical weapons worldwide. The convention, which has
