CORAL SPRINGS, Florida, May 7: Top seed Jonas Bjorkman of Sweden and defending champion Jason Stoltenberg of Australia eased into the second round of America's Red Clay tennis championship on Tuesday, reports Reuter.

Chittagong firmly in control**Pilot plays pivotal role**

Trapattoni stays at Bayern

ROME, May 7: Giovanni Trapattoni confirmed on Monday that he will remain Bayern Munich coach next season after the German club refused to let him join Roma, reports Reuter.

Trapattoni had been linked to the Italian Serie A club, who fired Argentine Carlos Bianchi earlier in the season and appointed 74-year-old Swede Nils Liedholm as a stopgap.

But the Italian told state RAI television that Bayern had refused to allow him to terminate his contract with the Bundesliga leaders a season early.

"I met president (Franco) Sensi a week ago and we agreed that if I could get the go-ahead from Bayern I would coach Roma," said Trapattoni.

"It did not work out that way because Bayern, a club that I am obliged to because they took me at a difficult moment, refused to relinquish my contract."

Trapattoni, the most successful coach in Italy who led both Juventus and Internazionale to a total of eight titles, said he had never signed anything with Roma but had agreed a conditional verbal undertaking.

"Now I have nothing more to add," he said. "It's too early to say what I'll do when my contract with Bayern expires. I prefer to live from day to day."

National wicketkeeper Khaled Masood Pilot, one of the key performer in Bangladesh's ICC Trophy triumph in Malaysia last month, was batting on 75. The ganging right-hander, who scored a duck in the first innings, has more than amended his previous failure by inspiring Chittagong to an unassailable lead.
