Computer database

containing all cabinet decisions

The system is expected to be installed within three months and it will take one and a half year's to store all the previous decisions.

CRF facilities from 20 importable items withdrawn

The National Board of Revenue (NBR) yesterday said the decision to withdraw facilities of clean report of finding (CRF) from 20 importable items was aimed at protecting local industries and increasing national revenue income, reports BSS.

In a statement, it said the locally produced items were facing unequal competition as these items were being imported under CRF facilities at a much lower price than the international ruling price. On the other hand, the government was being deprived of the due revenue income.



No contract signed yet with UNOCAL, JS told

Identifying shortage of gas supply as a major hurdle in accelerating the country's power production, Energy and Mineral Resources Minister Md Nooruddin Khan told the Jatiya Sangsad yesterday that some immediate steps were being taken by the government to improve the situation.

The minister said a new gas well would be dug soon in the Bakhrabad gas field, while preparatory measures were being taken to bring southern and northern zones of the country under the gas supply network.

Referring to the latest discovery of a gas field at Shabazpur with an expected stock of one trillion cubic feet of gas, the minister said, from

there, gas would be supplied to southern parts of the country. He also informed the House that with an aim to supplying gas to the northern region after completion of the Jamuna

Bridge, pipeline have already been extended up to Alenga in Tangail. Out of 23 gas-reserve blocks in the country, exploration contracts have already been signed for eight, the minister said adding that bidding for the re-

maining 15 blocks would begin after July 15, the last date of submission of tenders. As a lawmaker from the Op-

35 mortars, 2 shells of rocket launcher found in Ctg

CHITTAGONG, May 13: A huge quantity of mortars and two shells of rocket launcher were found while workers were re-excavating a pond at East Nasirabad in the port city today, reports UNB.

The workers felt the presence of ammunition as they started digging the pond at the residence of Arif Islam, editor of the Chittagong-based Daily Life, at about 9:30 am.

As Islam notified police, a squad, led by DC (North) of CMP Ikhtederuddin Ahmed, rushed to the spot and recovered 35 mortars and two shells of rocket launcher, and took those to Panchlaish thana.

In other words, harmful smoke and loud noise of horns have made human life and environment miserable in Dhaka and other major cities.

Unfortunately, even after repeated notices and requests from the Department of Environment to control harmful smoke emission and stop using horns, which create loud noise, vehicle owners and drivers are not taking any appropriate measures. As such in order to protect human health and environment, the Government, has decided to take strong legal measures against the defaulters.

Therefore, all vehicle owners and drivers are directed to take corrective measures, to ensure emission free engines, within 30 (thirty) days of issuance of this notice and then only ply the vehicles on the road. After this time limit, the Department of Environment will take strong legal measures against the vehicles emitting harmful smoke and using horns which create loud noise.

10 killed in Gopalganj road accident

At least 15 people were killed and 66 others injured in road accidents across the country vesterday.

Our Gopalganj correspondent writes: At least 10 persons were killed and 40 others injured in a road accident at Jalilpar under Sadar thana yesterday, said police and wit-

The accident happened when a bus of Rupshi Paribahan bound for Gopalganj from Muksudpur fell into a ditch. Eight persons died on the spot and two others succumbed to their injuries on way to hospital. The deceased were identified as Nur, 40; Sarwar, 25; Kabir, 60; Jahangir, 26; Miraj, 22; Mandar, 16; Moslem, 50; Shuja 25; Kuddus, 30 and Sadek, 60 The bodies have been sent for autopsy. The injured were ad-

mitted to hospital. BSS reports: At least two persons including a school teacher were killed and 20 oth ers injured in a road accident on Dhaka-Aricha Highway.

Police said the accident took place when a Khulna-bound passenger bus collided head on with a Dhaka-bound truck near Bathuli in the morning.

Dhaka, Yangon to clear mines along border

Both the countries reached a decision to this effect in a sector commander level meeting of border security forces held recently at Mongdow township of Myanmar. Officials said dates would be fixed soon to initiate the joint operation along the

The move was taken against

From Nurul Alam the backdrop of frequent mine blasts along the border that left about 10 people killed in the past one year. During the current month three people including two Rohingya Muslims and a Bangladeshi were killed in mine explosions in the border area, the officials added.



A Rohingya Muslim, Fakir Alam, 35, died in a mine blast on May 9 at the border. Another Rohingya Muslim died in a similar incident on May 2. The officials also noted that

tension along the border. The mines were planted by Myanmar's border guards -Nasaka - to protect their camps from any attack by insurgent groups of Myanmar, they added.
