### 891 supervising officials for 93 thousand policemen

By Mizan Ali

Only 891 "supervising officials" are leading the 93 thousand police force of the country and the ratio is not "balanced," according to highly placed sources in the police depart-

Officials in the ranks of Assistant Superintendent of Police (ASP) and above are supervising officials

The "operational budget" for the police force is declining since fiscal '92-93 with an exception has '94-95, and the allocation for training is given the lowest priority, they said.

These supervising officials are "not adequately empowered to apply independent judgement in enforcement."

The training system is totally 'militaristic' in nature. Emphasis is given on physical fitness ignoring the importance of "mental development" during training. Besides, training is given only once or twice during service period, they added.

Training instructors in the police training institutes are also not adequately qualified to train the new generation police force. Many of them lack professional competence, they al-



#### Saeed Anwar sets record: Pakistan in final

Sports Reporter Opener Saeed Anwar with an epoch-making 194 set a new world record in one-day cricket as Pakistan amassed a mammoth total of 327 against archrivals India in the virtual second semifinal of the Independence Cup at the Chinaswami Stadium in Madras yesterday. Pakistan beat India by 35

runs. India scored 292 in 49.2 overs. Rahul Dravid hit 107. Pakistan will now meet Sri Lanka in the finals.

The 28-year-old Pakistan left-hander batted magnificently to surpass the previous record of 189 not out set by the great West Indian batsman Vivian Richards in 1984 against England at Manchester. Anwar who was in such a marauding mood that he clouted 22 fours and five sixes in his flawless 147-ball vigil at the crease. The southpaw, who worked the ball all around the wicket with great aplomb, plundered 26 runs from one prodigal over of Indian leg-spinner Anil Kumble, which included three consecutive sixes.

He shared three solid partnerships, 89 runs for the second wicket with skipper Rameez Raja (22), 126 runs for the third wicket with Ijaz Ahmed (39) and

### Worst-hit areas yet to get relief: Khaleda

COX'S BAZAR, May 21: As opposition leader Beguin Khaleda Zia extensively toured the worst cyclone-hit areas in the district today, people alleged to her that they were yet to get any help from the government, reports UNB.

Giving a patient hearing to the sufferings of the people, she accused the government of limiting its activities only to a media hype and tall-talks. "Two days have elapsed...

None from the government nor any relief has reached the worst-affected areas," Begum Zia said addressing two spontaneous gatherings at Badarkhali and Chiringa of Chokoria thana in Cox's Bazar.

The Leader of the Opposition in Parliament charged the government once again with conspiring to sell out the interests of the country and said they were only flying over the areas for an eyewash when it is a must to stand beside the affected people.

Demanding from the government enough relief, housebuilding material and cash donation for the cyclone-affected people, the BNP chairperson assured that her party would always be with them and do whatever they can.

"We did not come to address you .. We are here because the BNP is always a tested friend of the people," Khaleda Zia said. "It has been proved that the present government doesn't bother about people as they or their relief supplies are yet to be here."

Begum Zia said she would give the real picture of loss of lives and extent of damage through a press conference after returning to the capital. She is scheduled to leave Chittagong tonight.

### Voltage fluctuation damaging appliances

Power supply situation in the city has improved but frequent voltage fluctuation is causing damage to household electrical appliances, often beyond repair, consumers say.

Most of the consumers this correspondent talked to complained that the frequent voltage fluctuation damaged their air-conditioners, computers, water pumps, refrigerators, television sets, tape recorders and even bulbs.

The situation is such that even circuit breakers can not cope with it.

Some frustrated consumers said they feel helpless as their appliances were neither insured nor they could claim compensations from the DESA.

Even the DESA is not immune. Frequency of transformer failures are causing irritation' to DESA repair crews. "We are getting calls so often that we have to attend a transformer which we repaired the other day," a repair crew said.

### Relief goods yet to reach 5 thanas of Cox's Bazar

From Abdul Monaem Khan COX'S BAZAR, May 2: Relief goods are yet to reach the five affected thanas of the district three days after Monday's cyclone that battered the coastal resort town and adjoining areas leaving trail of destruction everywhere.

Meanwhile, the death toll in the district rose to 32, according to the officials of the district administration while the Cyclone Preparedness Programme of the Red Crescent put the figure at 37.

Besides, 200 fishermen are missing, according to unofficial reports.

Who is this man? This is the man who likes to be known as Sher-e-Khwaja. He claims to be a spiritual leader, a man with powers of prediction' It was the media that



Syed Abdul Tareq Chisty, a khadem from Ajmeer Sharif in India, and son of Khadem Peerzada Syed Abdul Mabood Chisty, visiting the office of Probe News Agency here on May 18, said: "There is no necessity for a written certificate to bestow one with the title 'Sher-e-Khwaja.' Anyone who is a devotee of Khwaja Baba at Ajmeer can be given this title. If you can please the muallem of the khadem, he is free at will to declare you to be 'Shere-e-Khwaja.' There is no special ceremony involved. There is no particular standard one must achieve to win this title. In fact, this is no specified title at all. The khadem can simply declare this before a gathering of devotees. The devotee given the title need not have any extraordinary spiritual powers. He may simply be a devotee of Khwaja Sahib who visits Ajmeer regularly and spares no expense in paying homage at the shrine."

Asked if any particular mualtem or khadem reserves the right to bestow the title, Shere-e-Khwaja? "No, no specific muallem reserves this right," Syed Tareq Chisty said. "It can be conferred by any muallem."
