

Tannery wastes, now being diverted into low lying areas near Rayerbazar outside the Dhaka flood protection embankment, are destroying a vast stretch of arable land and all sorts of marine life.

WASA officials in charge of the drainage said the wastes had to be diverted to the new areas as the old channel was blocked by a recently built tan-

Previously, the lethal wastes flowed into the river Buriganga from the Hazaribagh Sluice, further downstream.

Water Development Board (WDB) sources said the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) was yet to give them the necessary papers, identifying the khas land around the embankment. "We are sure that the tannery in question was built on government land but cannot take action because we do not have any details to back us up," a WDB official said.

Director General of the Department of Environment (DOE) Saiyid Musharraf Husain said no authorisation was sought from his office prior to taking this decision.

"Before selecting the new discharge area, they should have asked the DOE," Husain said, adding that DOE would soon investigate the matter. He pointed out that Fisheries, the See Page 12 Col 8

NEW DELHI, May 31: Sonia Gandhi was at the centre stage of Indian politics today with the top brass of the country's oldest party offering to clear the decks for the reclusive widow to take charge, reports AFP.

Sitaram Kesri, the present chief of the Congress (I) who faces a leadership challenge in next month's party elections, late Friday said he would quit the race if the enigmatic Sonia wanted to lead the party. Sonia is the widow of former

prime minister Rajiv Gandhi. who was assassinated in 1991. Kesri said he had made her the offer previously, after her husband's death.

"I had made the offer to her in 1991 and even today I am ready to withdraw if she agrees to become the party president in the interest of party unity," he said here.

The Italian-born widow, af ter repeatedly refusing to enter Indian politics, joined the Congress this month. Since then, many party activists have asked her to take up the top job and refurbish the party's flag-

ging image. His main rival Sharad Pawar, a member of the Congress decision-making body. who vowed to defeat Kesri on June 9 for presidency of the 112-year-old party, also said he would step aside for Sonia.

Pawar, 56, had asked the party leadership to unanimously choose Sonia Gandhi, whose husband, mother-in-law Indira Gandhi and her father Jawaharlal Nehru, led the See Page 12 Col 6
