The Pay Commission will submit its report to the government by the end of next week, official sources said.

According to the proposed pay scale, Tk 2000 has been suggested as basic pay for those government employees who now get Tk 900 as their basic.

At the entry level of cadre services, a basic pay of Tk 5650 has been suggested instead of present Tk 2850, while for the highest grade Tk 18,000 has been suggested against the present basic pay of Tk 10,000.

The government will require an additional amount of Tk 2000 crore to implement the proposed pay scale, the sources

Comilla Polytech hostels attacked

BCL leader killed, 80 rooms ransacked

COMILLA, June 4: A Chhatra League (BCL) leader was killed and 10 others were injured as armed outsiders allegedly backed by a rival student organisation attacked two hostels of Comilla Polytechnic Institute early today, reports UNB.

Witnesses said the attackers, who swooped on Maynamati and Shahidullah hostels under cover of bomb blasts and gunshots, ransacked 80 rooms and set afire the offices of the two hostel supers.

Angry students with the help of local people barricaded the Dhaka-Chittagong highway protesting the incident, disrupting traffic on the busy road for three hours from 11 am.

The Institute authorities closed classes for six days and declared mourning programmes on the days. The dead was identified as Abu Yusuf Khan, 21, a 3rd year student of Electrical Depart-

ment of the institute and joint convenor of BCL Maynamati hostel unit. Of the injured, Milon and Sachhu of 2nd year Electrical Department, Suman and Sharif of 3rd year Electrical, Jewel of

Department were admitted to Sadar Hospital. Campus sources said a group of 25-30 youths equipped with bombs and firearms shot at three BCL leaders including the Institute's convenor Rizvi, from outside the hostel at about 0030

At one stage, the group swooped on the two hostels exploding about 50 bombs and firing at least 40 rounds of gunshots, the sources said.

They then went round different rooms of the hostels, searching for BCL activists. They ransacked 50 rooms at Shahidullah hostel and 30 others at Maynamati. Offices of the two hostel supers also were set

In room number 309 of Maynamati hostel, they chopped Abu Yusuf Khan with chapati and later threw him to the ground from the second

Yusuf was rushed to Comilla Sadar Hospital in critical condition. Later, he was shifted to See Page 12 Col 6

US Embassy seizes 6 Environment Day today

World Environment Day and the 25th founding anniversary of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) will be observed in Bangladesh as elsewhere in the world today. reports UNB.

"For Life on Earth" is the theme of this year's observance of the day, chosen by the UNEP. President Shahabuddin Ahmed and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina gave separate messages on the occasion.

In his message, President Justice Shahabuddin Ahmed said the whole world should join hands to protect the earth and its lives by reflecting the ethos of sustainable develop-

"Today, the whole world is beset with grave environmental problems resulting in ecological imbalance caused by greenhouse effect, climate change, global warming, sea level rise, ozone depletion and desertifica-

Dreher said roughly 25 per cent Bangladeshis did not return to their country after their stay in the United States. The figure is "very high" compared with other countries, he added.

Explaining various reasons for not issuing visa to applicants, he said a visa official must be satisfied that the applicants would return after their stay in America.

Bangkok to host 4-nation meet tomorrow

Stage set for launching new economic bloc

Four countries bordering the Bay of Bengal are forming a new economic bloc to bolster trade and commerce and act as a bridge between the ASEAN and the SAARC countries.

The organisation, initially comprising of Bangladesh, India, Sri Lanka and Thailand, is due to be launched formally this Friday at a meeting of deputy foreign ministers or senior representatives of the four countries in Bangkok, according to official sources.

State Minister for Foreign Affairs Abul Hasan Chowdhury will be representing Bangladesh while deputy ministers or senior government officials of the three other countries are likely to represent their respective governments at the formal

launching ceremony. Senior officials from the foreign ministries of the four countries began a two-day meeting yesterday in Bangkok to fi-nalise the details of the proposed organisation.

Talking to The Daily Star Abul Hasan Chowdhury said, the Bangladesh government has already approved the idea of the new organisation and the prepared the draft following consultations among the four coun-

He said efforts taken by the government had led to the inclusion of Bangladesh in the new alliance. Chowdhury said the idea of the grouping was originally mooted by India, Sri Lanka and Thailand and was initially referred to as the "Bay

of Bengal Economic Cooperation Organisation."

Chowdhury said he was not sure if this name would be retained or a new name would be adopted at the launching following the end of deliberations at the level of secretaries in

progress in Bangkok. He said that the alliance had been initiated considering the great potential of increasing trade volume within these countries by taking advantage of the geographical proximity of the participating nations in the Bay of Bengal region and

Shima's death in 'safe custody' Probe by JS body stalled for lack of testimonies

The parliamentary committee formed to probe the mysterious death of garments worker Shima Chowdhury in Chittagong could make little headway due to non-availability of necessary testimonies, official sources said.

The Jatiya Sangsad on February 18 constituted the 11member committee headed by Foreign Minister Abdus Samad Azad to investigate the death of Shima while in 'safe custody' in Chittagong Jail on February 7.

Shima, 17, was picked up by police on suspicion of eloping with one Abdul Hafiz on October 8 last year and allegedly gang-raped by four police personnel inside Raozan thana on the following night. The girl's death when she was in 'safe custody' had sparked off a furore. Many human rights organisations raised their voices for proper investigation. Shima died only five days

after Hafizuddin, ASP of CID (Chittagong Zone), had submitted charge-sheet on alleged rape of the girl by four policemen. The four were arrested and sent to jail after a case was lodged against them. Kazi Shamsuzzaman, Joint Secretary (Committee) of the


