

## Samba invasion in Roland Garros!

PARIS, June 9: Not long after Gustavo Kuerten had completed his stunning French Open victory Sunday, the sounds of samba music echoed through the boutique-lined walkways of the manicured Roland Garros complex, reports AP.

A couple dozen fans who had watched the match on TV had made their way inside the gates, instruments and all. They marched through the complex, playing an infectious beat and chanting the Brazilian champ's nickname: "GUGU!"

There's no question that the 20-year-old with a shy grin and a killer all-court game brought some welcome colour to this year's Open.

After a tournament in which the big names were knocked out fast, Kuerten and his Cinderella story provided a badly needed jolt of adrenaline and a satisfying ending.

Coming from literally nowhere, having never won a tour event or even gotten to the semifinals, the 66th-ranked player beat three former champions over seven matches to become the lowest ranked player ever to win the French Open.

From his bright yellow and blue tennis togs — which provoked some disapproval from tournament organisers — to his laser groundstrokes and his jumping and skipping around the court to pump himself up, Kuerten always gave fans something to look at.

At his post-match news conferences, he also entertained, with tales like that of Olga, his German grandmother, who scouts out the top players and tells him how to beat them.

He did, and in doing so, became the first Brazilian man to win a Grand Slam. The Brazilian fans who appeared at Roland Garros for a musical victory lap were overjoyed.

In Brazil, soccer gets a lot more attention than tennis, but that may begin to change with Kuerten's success. As if to cement his new star status, Kuerten got a good-luck fax from Pele, the former soccer great, and comparisons to the newest Brazilian soccer superstar, Ronaldo.

## Bima amaze Abahani

Title aspirants Abahani Krira Chakra yesterday suffered a jolt in the Green Delta Insurance First Division league when a spirited Sadharan Bima Krira Sangstha handed them a 2-3 defeat in one of the two matches scheduled at the National Hockey Stadium.

In a see-saw affair which saw the first half locked 1-1, skipper Morad Ikramullah, Mohammad Hasan and Ghulam Ghaus, one of their two Pakistani recruits of Bima who were inspirational throughout, scored one goal each for the insurancemen.

On the other hand, Abahani, who suffered their first defeat yesterday after nine successive victories, pulled two back through skipper Mamun and defender Khurshid who converted a penalty corner and stroke respectively.

The defeat left the Dhanmondi outfit one of the three favourites side in the league, out of the title race as they remained glued their previous collection of 27 points on completion of their tenth outing. Although it is still equal to Usha Krira Chakra and Mohammedan Sporting Club, but they have one match in hand.

Bima climbed into sixth in the 16-team league standings with 18 points.

In Monday's second engagement, Bima, spearheaded by their two young foreign recruits — Mohammad Saqlain and Ghaus — dominated the entire proceedings from the start against their out of sorts opponents playing without their regular players in Ramji, Shipu and Khokon.

Ghaus, the tall Lahore-based centre forward, put Bima ahead in the 10th minute utilising a Wahab pass.

The margin could have been doubled after three minutes had Morad, the leading Bima goal scorer who was standing unguarded inside the danger area, not missed an easy sitter.

Abahani levelled through a Mamun who converted a penalty corner in the 16th minute.

Bima had two clear opportunities to regain the lead, but

failed to capitalise on them.

After the lemon break, Bima maintained the pressure and went ahead again in the 60th minute with Morad flicking the ball home from a Saqlain hit.

But the lead lasted only three minutes as Abahani were back on level terms through a penalty stroke.

It was Abahani winger Alamgir who was blocked by three Bima defenders in the danger area prompting Pakistani umpire Masood-ur-Rahman to point to the spot. Khurshid pushed the ball home past the Bima custodian Atul.

Bima continued to attack, however, and finally got the

lead once again in the 65th minute when Hasan netted with an angular push from the right.

**AZAD ROUT ANSARS**  
Earlier, in the day's first match, Azad Sporting Club recorded their third league victory defeating Dhaka Ansars 4-0.

The winners led the first half 3-0.

Moksed struck twice while Yen and Yamin added one apiece for the winners.

The win raised Azad's tally to 10 points from as many matches. On the other hand, Ansars suffered their tenth successive defeat.

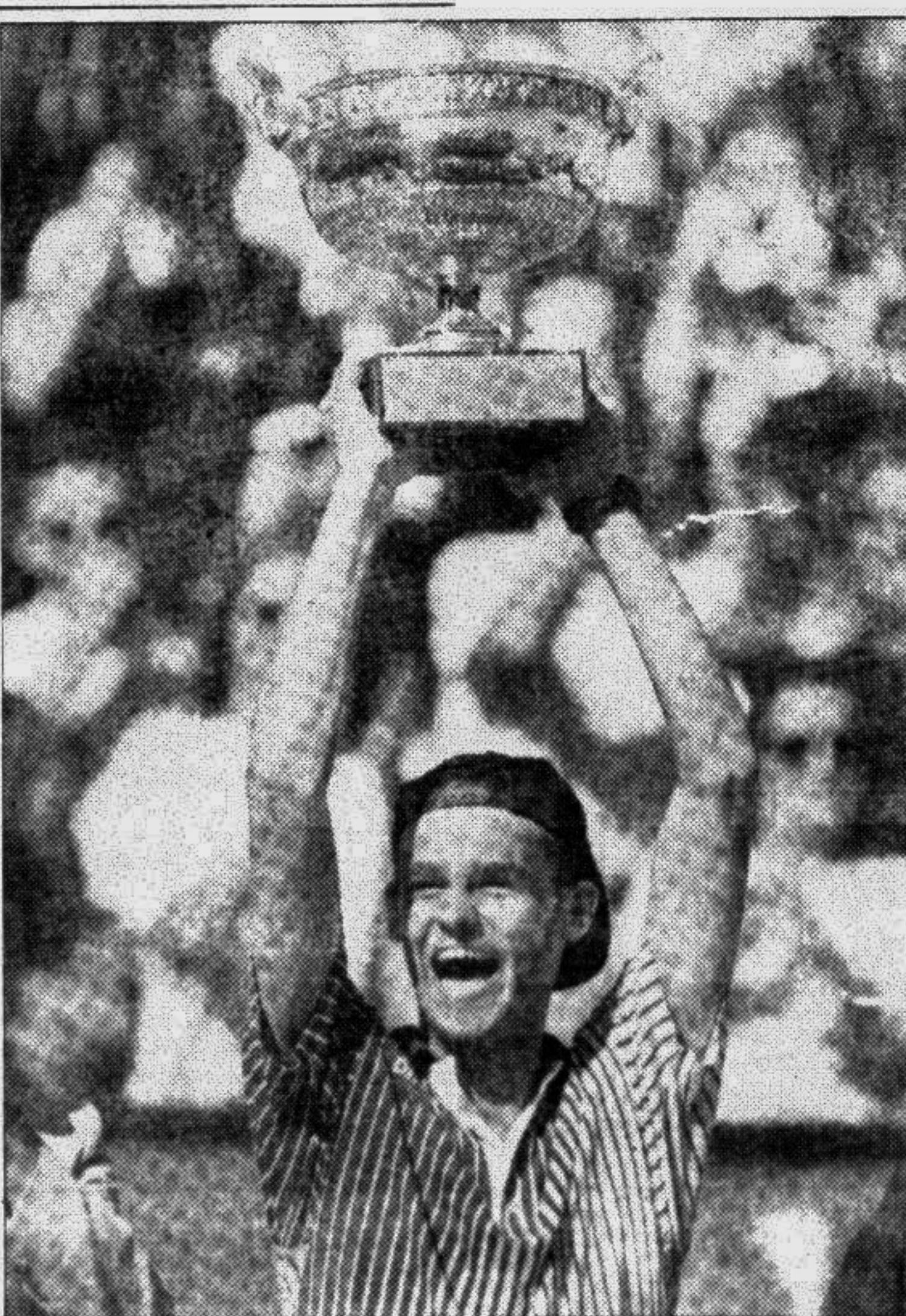
## Khokon memorial soccer

## BCB to seek Test status

Bangladesh expects to be awarded with the Test status when the annual conference of the International Cricket Council (ICC) begins at Lord's in London from June 11.

This was stated by the president of the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) Sabir Hossain Chowdhury, MP, to the press yesterday. The cricket supremo was scheduled to leave Dhaka late last night to attend the week-long extraordinary conference of the ICC, the apex body of world cricket.

"To get the one-day status is not our only goal. It will be accepted automatically in the ICC meeting. What we are actually looking for is to attain the Test status," said Sabir to the local press at the BCB office last night.

Saber, who is likely to contest for one of the three associate-member slots in the nine-member Executive Board of the ICC, added that he would persuade the other 22 associate member nations to adopt an

unanimous decision in its meeting on June 12 to back Bangladesh's bid. After the adoption it would be put forward to the policy-makers. And Bangladesh would become the tenth Test-playing nation if the

application for the senior status is approved by the ICC delegates.

Saber, however, quite diplomatically quipped when he was asked to confirm his candidature for the authoritative post in the world body. "Everything will depend upon the situation there". It was, however, learnt that the BCB has advocated Saber for contesting in the elections.

The BCB president also disclosed that he would finalise convenient date and countries to take part in the tournament, expected to be held in the capital early next year.

Besides, the crucial ICC meeting, which will conclude on June 17, is likely to adopt the resolution for naming Dhaka as one of the five zonal headquarters in ICC's serious bid to globalise the game.

The ICC body will also decide about a World Championship of Test cricket like one-day World Cup and whether or not a three-year experiment which has limited bowlers to two bouncers per over will be adopted permanently.

## Tunisia book France ticket



LONDON, June 9: Mexico closed in on a berth in the 1998 World Cup from one qualifying group while Tunisia, Nigeria and Morocco all came out of Africa this weekend to make the field for France, reports AP.

The Mexicans improved to 3-0-2 in the CONCACAF group with a 1-0 victory Sunday at El Salvador, Mexico lead the qualifying sector with 11 points, with Costa Rica next at seven and the United States tied for third with five. The top three teams advance.

Luis Garcia got the goal on a solo rush through the defence in the 64th minutes. For most of the game, Mexico played defensively, and El Salvador could not penetrate.

The three African nations joined the two automatic qualifiers — France (host) and Brazil (defending champions) — for the 32-team soccer showcase in France.

Tunisia tied Egypt 0-0 on Sunday in Cairo, assuring them the top place in African Group Two. Tunisia have 13 points to seven for Egypt with only one game remaining.

Nigeria defeated Kenya 3-0 and Morocco downed Ghana 1-0 on Saturday. On Sunday, Guinea beat Burkina Faso 3-1.

In South America, it was Argentina 2, Peru 0; Ecuador 1, Chile 1; Uruguay 1, Colombia 1; and Bolivia 1, Venezuela 1.

For hosts Argentina, Hernan Crespo opened the scoring in the 44th minutes and Diego Simeone made it 2-0 in the 46th. Argentina (5-2-4) are second in the standings with 19 points, four behind Paraguay.

Scotland have 17 points in eight games to lead Group Four. Austria, who have played two fewer games than Scotland, are second with 13 points after a 3-1 win in Latvia. Also in the group, Sweden won 3-2 at Estonia and have 12 points in six games.

In Europe, the winners of each of the nine groups and the top second-place team get the 10 automatic berths.

Elsewhere in Europe on Sunday:

In Group One, Denmark defeated Bosnia-Herzegovina 2-0. The Danes lead the group with 13 points in five games, three points ahead of Greece.

In Group Three, Hungary tied leaders Norway 1-1 in Budapest, giving Norway 11 points in five games. Hungary are second with seven points in five games. Finland defeated Azerbaijan 3-0.

In Group Five, Russia took the lead with a 2-0 win in Moscow over Israel in a game briefly delayed by torrential rain. Russia have 14 points to 13 for Israel. Bulgaria, with Hristo Stoichkov rejoining the team and scoring a goal, routed Luxembourg 4-0 to go to 12 points after five games.

In Group Six, Spain (20 points) won 1-0 over the Czech Republic and Yugoslavia (19 points) downed Slovakia 2-0. The Faeroe Islands defeated Malta 2-1.

In Africa on Sunday, Namibia defeated Liberia 2-1.

South Africa beat Zambia 3-0 — eliminating the losers from contention — Cameroon tied Angola 1-1. Togo blanked Zimbabwe 2-0, and the Republic of Congo beat Congo 1-0.

South Africa play the Republic of Congo on Aug. 17 to decide who makes it to France. Also that day, Cameroon can qualify with a win at Zimbabwe.

In Asia on Sunday, China, the group leaders, tied Tajikistan 0-0, and Turkmenistan routed winless Vietnam 4-0.

## Bailey brought down to earth

MOSCOW, June 9: Donovan Bailey lost a soggy 100-metre run to Nigeria's Davidson Ezinwa on Sunday, reports AP.

The Canadian sprinter and world record-holder, who won a showdown with Michael Johnson of the United States one week before, finished at 10.28 seconds to Ezinwa's 10.20.

The race, in the IAAF Znamensky Memorial Grand Prix meet, began moments after a torrential thunderstorm abated.
