Emergency steps being taken to control fire: PM

MAGURCHHARA (Moulvibazar). June 17: Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina today visited the Magurchhara gasfield in Kamalganj thana, where the flame is still shooting up to a height ranging from 100 to 200 feet, reports UNB.

"The government is taking emergency steps to control the fire, which is destroying valuable natural gas," the Prime Minister said while witnessing the fire from a distance of about hundred metres.

Sheikh Hasina directed the authorities concerned to take necessary measures to cope with the situation arising out of the gas well fire.

The height of the flame got reduced and now varied from 100 to 200 feet, said the President of Occidental of Bangladesh Limited, a US-based company, that started drilling See Page 12 Col 3

KR Narayanan set to become Indian President

NEW DELHI, June 17: A Hindu "untouchable" was today set to become India's president, coinciding with the 50th anniversary of the country's independence, officials said, reports

Kocheril Raman Narayanan, the incumbent vice-president, was proposed late Monday for the top post by the centre-left United Front coalition government and its major ally, the Congress(I) party.

The decision, announced after weeks of suspense, as expected to be endorsed by the Hindu nationalist and main opposition Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), the officials said.



Blast due to undetected gas pocket, claim Occidental officials

and Cameron Kennedy SRIMANGAL, June 17: Officials of the government and the US company, Occidental, worked frantically today to arrange to cap the inferno as the huge gas fire at the Magurchhara gas well raged on.

The fire which started Saturday night has become smaller, but flames still leap up to 250 feet in the air, making it impossible for anyone to go within 200 yards of the well.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, Energy Minister Noor Uddin Khan, Foreign Minister Abdus Samad Azad, Finance Minister Shah AMS Kibria Forest and Environment Minister Shajeda Chowdhury visited the disaster area.

An Occidental engineer said there was no more danger of further explosion there because gas pressure was slowly diminishing.

"The fire you are seeing now is a baby fire compared to the first day's", he said.

Busy officials at the site said well-capping equipment was on the way. A Canadian firefighting expert was already deployed to assess the extent of the blaze. Occidental officials, however, declined to comment on how long it might take to put out the fire and cap the well.

Mohiuddin Ahmed, an engineer and local consultant of Occidental said the explosion occurred because of an undetected sub-soil shallow gas pocket.

Explaining further, he said that the seismic survey conducted before drilling failed to detect the shallow gas pocket at the site. He noted that the pocket stretched over an area of 1000 acres beneath the surface.

Taming gasfield fire: Local experts hold opposing views

Bangladeshi hydrocarbon exploration experts have opposing views about how to control the fire at the Moulvibazar gas-

"It will be very unwise to put out the fire of that well which has now turned into a crater," said a hydrocarbon exploration expert who retired from Petrobangla recently after more than 30 years of service. "Because, even if the fire is put out. the gas flow cannot be stopped from gushing out. This gas will cause serious health hazard."

emphasised on taking other precautionary measures to prevent the fire from spreading.

Petrobangla, however, said that the fire should be controlled at any cost in order to implement any precautionary measure. He added that putting out the fire would not cause any noticeable health hazard.

The retired Petrobangla official, however, asserted that if a large quantity of natural gas is released in the atmosphere, it will be a health hazard of the highest degree. " Plus, there will be a risk of fire breaking out elsewhere later," he added.

Requesting anonymity, he The fire that broke out in the Haripur gasfield 30 years ago is still burning in a smaller scale, he noted. "Let nature take care

of this well. Let it burn till the reservoir becomes exhausted."

"What we should do now is take precaution against spreading of the fire, investigate the cause of the explosion and demand compensation from Occidental for damaging our natu-ral resources," he added, noting that the explosion was defi-

nitely caused by high pressure.
Occidental had reached a depth of 839 metres when the explosion took place. Occiden-tal had a workplan for drilling


