Peter to resume prison term

**MANHEIM, Germany, June 26:** Peter Graf, father of German tennis great Steffi Graf, will go back to prison next month to serve the remainder of his sentence for fraud, the Mannheim prosecutor's office said Wednesday, reports AFP.  
Prosecutor Horst Kuehner refused to reveal exactly when Graf would resume his sentence, indicating it would be at the end of July.

Graf, 58, was sentenced to three years, nine months in prison on January 24 but remained free along with his former tax adviser and co-defendant Joachim Eckardt pending appeals both by their lawyers and the prosecution.

Both appeals were dropped last week, paving the way for Graf to be ordered back to prison from which he had been released in November while awaiting trial.

During his time awaiting trial the courts systematically rejected his pleas for conditional release, citing fears that he might abscond.  
Given the 15 months that he has already spent in custody, and a remission for good behaviour, Graf would be out of jail again by September next year.

Eckardt, who was given two years and six months in prison, is due to resume his sentence at the same time, Kuehner said. Because of the 13 months he has already spent in prison, he may only have to serve another six months before being released.

Chris, John on standard

**WIMBLEDON, June 26 (AP):** Chris Evert and John McEnroe took turns Wednesday serving up criticism of the top players and the tennis establishment for letting the sport sink in popularity.  
Two of the greatest players in the history of the game and

now commentators for NBC, Evert and McEnroe spoke out during a conference call as rain pelted Wimbledon and wiped out all but a few matches on the third day.

"Right now, I'm not really impressed with the standard" in women's tennis, Evert said, adding that having a 16-year-old like Martina Hingis as the No. 1 player is "kind of scary."  
Hingis is really the top player "by default," Evert contended, because injuries have sidelined Steffi Graf and slowed down Monica Seles' comeback from the stabbing she suffered in 1993.

The absence of exciting rivalries or charismatic American stars in tennis, Evert said, is hurting the game in the United States. So, too, is the way tennis is promoted and run.

"We're still losing our best athletes to other sports," she said. "It's still a rich man's sport. Maybe the USTA should do a better job of funneling the money they're giving out."  
The USTA, which makes tens of millions of dollars from the US Open each year, has precious little to show for the money it pours into its player development programme or its promotion of the sport.

"I'm personally embarrassed by this sport," McEnroe said. "I'm embarrassed by the lack of interest in tennis."

McEnroe called for an overhaul of professional tennis, using the NBA's marketing strategy as a blueprint, and said players like Pete Sampras have to take a leadership role in changing the tour and not just be content with raking in money.

"In my humble opinion, we need to bring more out in Pete," McEnroe said. "Pete can do more things to say where the game is headed. He can say this game stinks and take responsibility for changing it. We've got to absolutely change the way this sport is headed."  
Evert ripped Graf for "never going to one (WTA) board meeting" in her years as No. 1.

Tennis is bigger in Europe and Japan than it is in the United States, McEnroe said, but "the game is going in the wrong direction everywhere."


The top players, he said, aren't interested in changing things because "they're making so much money" in a year-round tour that's spread out around the world. But the result is few matches among the top players, no current rivalries to propel the game these days, and no charismatic star like golfer Tiger Woods.

"Ultimately, you have to blame the players," McEnroe said. "But the (ranking) system pushes them into playing tournaments."

Players earn their rankings based on their best 14 tournaments over the past year. That

means that some clay court players can get into Wimbledon, make money by lasting a few rounds on grass, and not hurt their rankings by losing early.

"There are players who have no business playing in Wimbledon," McEnroe said.  
One sign of the sport's unhealthy state, McEnroe said, is the fact that Andre Agassi is pulling away from it, just as

Bjorn Borg did at a young age and at the height of his career.

"The moment (Agassi) became No. 1, he (went) completely in the wrong direction," McEnroe said. "When Bjorn walked away, that was a big blow."

With Agassi sitting out the Australian Open this year, saying he wanted some time off, and then the French and Wimbledon because of what he claims is a wrist injury, tennis lost the chance to capitalise on what had been a brief but exciting rivalry with Sampras.

Tennis needs "drastic change" to renew excitement in it, McEnroe said, though he added, "I don't think anything will be done."

Among the changes he said are needed are an overhaul of the schedule and a revamping of the ranking system.

Holyfield riding higher

**LAS VEGAS, Nevada, June 26:** Evander Holyfield is ready to cement his status as the dominant heavy weight of the 1990s — and may be beyond it — with a second victory over the once-invincible "iron" Mike Tyson, reports AFP.

Holyfield and Tyson meet again on Saturday, seven and one-half months after Holyfield stunned the boxing world by brutalizing Tyson and stopping him in the 11th round.

Holyfield regained the World Boxing Association heavyweight title and he doesn't believe he'll have to give it back on Saturday.

"I have the ultimate respect for Mike. And I have the ultimate respect for myself," Holyfield said. "I look at this fight as two guys who are the best of their era, and it all comes down to how we handle pressure."

"I truly feel when it comes down to talent, we are equally talented, but I also know that pressures bust fights. And I think God for giving me peace of mind in times of pressure, to overcome pressure."

Holyfield has long maintained that the mental and spiritual strength he derives from his devout Christianity are as crucial to him in the ring as his physical skills.

But he has left nothing to chance, and sparring partner Gary Bell says Holyfield is stronger and sharper now than he was before the November fight.

Most of the pressure this time around is on Tyson, who in November was knocked down in the sixth round, battered in the 10th and finally stopped in the 11th.

It was a stunning upset for Holyfield. Just past his 34th birthday and thought by most to be putting himself at serious

risk against Tyson.

Holyfield earned 11 million dollars for the first fight, while both the champion and Tyson, who was an early 2-1 favourite, will earn 30 million dollars for Saturday's fight, plus some proceeds from the pay-per-view television earnings.

More importantly, with a victory Holyfield can lay to rest any lingering whispers that his championships in the 1990s would not have been achieved if Tyson had not been imprisoned three years for rape.

"It's important for me to be the best of this era," said Holyfield, who brings a record of 33 victories — 24 inside the distance — and three defeats into the bout. "That's why I'm in it."

"I became the heavyweight champion of the world in 1990. I had the title in 1992, then I lost it, came back in 1993, lost it, now I'm champ again in 1997, you look in that seven-year stretch, I was better than anybody, and I'll take it all the way to the year 2000."

Tyson has said he underestimated Holyfield in the wake of Holyfield's knockout defeat by Riddick Bowe in 1995 and a lacklustre victory over Bobby Czyz in May of 1996.

Holyfield said that revisionist history that proved Tyson hadn't faced up to the defeat.

"To hear him say that, I realise he hasn't gotten over the first one," Holyfield said. "That first defeat is still there with him. It's too much for him."

The Multidrive 16th national youth volleyball championship commences at the National Indoor Stadium in Mirpur this afternoon.



Sound start for Seles

**LONDON, June 26:** In a late move that surprised many at the Wimbledon last evening, the number two seed Monica Seles took the Centre Court against Rachel McQuillan of Australia in first round match before a crowd that waited the whole day to be a part of the action.

There was no specific announcement even at 4:30 in the afternoon as drizzles continued making start of play uncertain. But at four minutes past six in the evening (11:04 pm Bangladesh time) the match started. Seles ran down her opponent with ruthless competence in less than 50 minutes

but not before rain kept her two points away from a straight sets (6-0, 6-2) victory.

As Seles disappeared into the retiring room happy and confident, Jana Novotna of the Czech Republic had her hands full with little known German Fraulin M Probst in her first round match at Court No. 1. The first set gave enough indication of what was coming in the second as the German won it in identical margin of 6-4. But it was altogether a different story as the Czech overhauled her opponent 6-0 in the final set to move into the next round.

Despite inclement weather during the last four days here at London, people in their thousands are flocking at the AELTC premises to have a glimpse of

their heroes (and heroines) and a feel of the superb atmosphere. As the new number one court dance at the Championships, have marked improvements. On Tuesday, the second day of the Championships, a total of 37,871 spectators attended which was an improvement of around 3400 persons against 1996. Management of the premises expect more crowd on improvement of the weather.
