

Malaysian Open goes to Susanto

KUALA LUMPUR, July 14: Indonesia won three titles and China one in the 180,000 dollars Malaysian Open badminton Championships Sunday, reports AP.

Indonesia's Hermawan Susanto took the coveted men's singles title beating Peter Gade Christensen of Denmark in the finals.

Hermawan, who showed top speed and former world champion Joko Suprianto the exit in the semifinals on Saturday, continued his excellent form and won 15-11, 15-11 in 45 minutes, the national news agency Bernama reported from Kota Kinabalu.

Hermawan, who won the title here for the first time, pocketed 14,000 dollars while runner-up Christensen received 8,000 dollars.

In the initial stages, Christensen, the Taiwan Masters champion, had the upperhand against the Indonesian, taking a 9-6 lead in the first set.

But, Hermawan, who started hesitating, came back to collect three points in a row to level 9-9. After seizing a service, Hermawan raced to a 11-9 lead but poor net plays allowed the Dane rising star to secure points and level 11-11.

Sensing Christensen's surge, Hermawan played a fast game with good court control to subdue the Dane before taking the first set with 15-11.

The inspired Hermawan started the second set aggressively and was soon leading 2-0 before the Dane crept back to 5-8. Christensen locked him at 7-9 for a long spell, until the Indonesian pulled away to lead 0-7.

Christensen, who ended the march of another Indonesian, Budi Santoso in the semifinal, kept up pace and launched a superb comeback after this, drawing level at 10-10.

Hermawan showed spurts of energy, attacking with powerful smashes to seal the victory with 15-11.

Indonesia also clinched the men's doubles title through top seeded and two-time champions Rexy Mainaky and Ricky Subagia who outclassed compatriot Ariantono Antonius and Denny Kantono in straight sets 17-15, 15-12.

The Indonesian star Susi Susanti, who put up a dismal performance in the recent World Championship in Glasgow, vented her frustration by outplaying the world champion Ye Zhaoying of China 11-5, 11-7 to clinch the women's singles title for the fourth time.

The women's doubles crown went to China's pair of Ge Fei and Gu Jun after disposing of their second pair of Liu Lu and Qiang Hong 15-7, 15-1.

San Francisco marathon Miloudi's

LOS ANGELES, July 14: Hamid Miloudi of France clinched the title of the 20th San Francisco marathon on Sunday, reports Xinhua.

Miloudi clocked 2:26.49 for the men's race while American Kristen Orr was the top women's runner from 40 US states and 27 countries and regions.

Small step for Douglas

BLOXIE, Mississippi, July 14: Buster Douglas stopped Quinn Navarre in the fourth round, an impressive victory that put the former champion back into the heavyweight title picture, reports AP.

Douglas, who upset Mike Tyson in 1990 to win the title, knocked down Navarre three times in the fourth round during the scheduled 10-round fight at Biloxi Grand Theater on Sunday.

First, he sent Navarre flying to the canvas with a right hook. Douglas then followed with two straight left hooks.

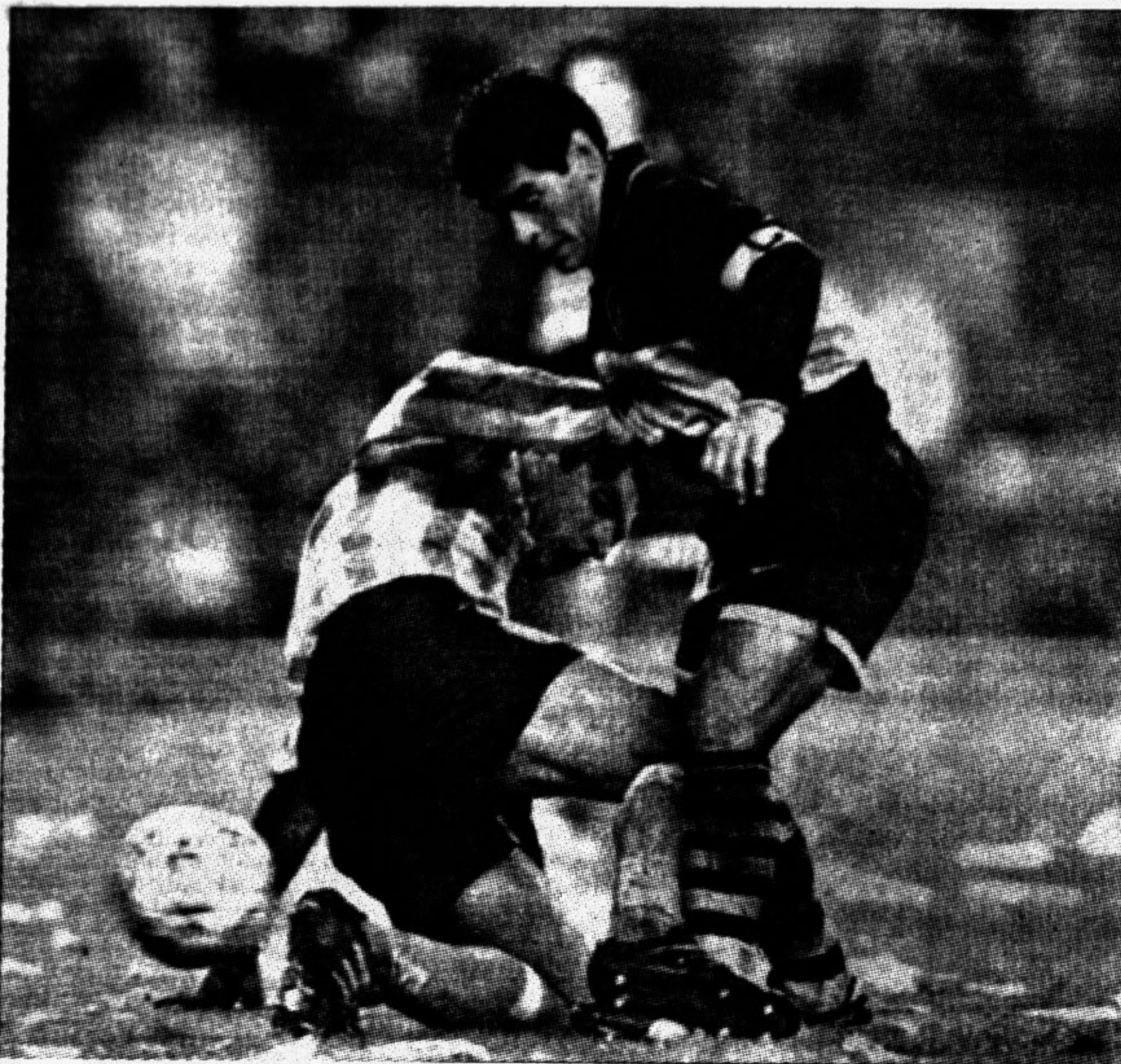
The final left hook forced referee Freddie Steinwinder III to stop the bout at 2:25 of the fourth round.

Douglas, of Columbus, Ohio, displayed unusual quickness and power.

"I've been working very hard in the gym to put the ingredients together," the 37-year-old Douglas said. "The formula is working for me. He was surprised by my left hook."

"Navarre was looking for the left jab and straight right hand. The left hook was open. I have exceptional speed for a big man. I am blessed to have all my skills."

Navarre, a Slidell, Louisiana, native who lost a controversial 12-round decision to Larry Holmes last year, said he underestimated Douglas.

Diego back as Maradona

BUENOS AIRES, July 14: He rarely moved faster than a stroll, he struggled to keep pace with the game, and he hobbled off the field in the second half after being banged on the ankle, reports AP.

But there were flashes of vintage Diego Maradona as the former Argentine captain made his fifth — and he says the last — comeback to soccer at age 36 Sunday.

The near-capacity crowd was delighted by the stocky midfielder's performance: an overhead scissor kick, some nonchalant back-heels and pinpoint passing as his team, Boca Juniors, beat Racing Club 3-2 in Maradona's first official game in 11 months.

Although he struggled at times to keep up, Maradona played a part in all three goals, interchanging quick passes with teammates, before limping off after 60 minutes with a sore ankle.

Boca's third goal was scored by defender Nestor Fabbri who rose to head in a free kick by Maradona.

His latest return to professional soccer was celebrated in carnival style with fireworks lighting up a drab and wet winter evening. The match was delayed for more than 20 minutes as photographers and television cameramen surrounded Maradona on the field.

Within two minutes, the stocky midfielder put his stamp on the game, threading a pass through to striker Sebastian Rambert. He then tested Racing goalkeeper Ignacio Gonzalez with a low shot which just went wide.

Shortly before halftime he almost caught Gonzalez napping as he curved a free kick from outside the box toward the near post only to see it palmed away.

First for an Armenian

NEWPORT, Rhode Island, July 14: Sargis Sargsian became the ATF Tour's first Armenian champion Sunday, beating New Zealand's Brett Steven 7-6, 4-6, 7-5 in the final of the Hall of Fame Championships, reports agency.

"I don't know what happened with my serve today, it just clicked," said the fifth-seeded Sargsian, who had 17 aces and just two double-faults. "I was serving harder than I have all week."

Sargsian won 76 per cent of the points in which he got his first serve in.

"It's good to prove it, because a lot of people think I'm not a grass-court player," said Sargsian, 24, who entered the tournament with just one match victory on grass.

Sargsian, the 1995 US national collegiate singles champion while attending Arizona State, earned a first prize of 36,200 dollars.

Hall of Fame's new members

NEWPORT, Rhode Island, July 14: Historic firsts from three different eras were represented Sunday, as the International Tennis Hall of Fame inducted three new members, reports AP.

Maj Walter Clopton Wingfield, who is credited with patenting the game of lawn tennis in 1874; H. W. Bunny Austin, who in 1932 was the game's first player to wear shorts; and Lesley Turner Bowrey, who played in the first Federation Cup in 1963, were inducted into the Hall of Fame in a ceremony at Center Court of the Newport Casino.

The Hall of Fame's list stands at 168 inductees.

Wingfield is remembered for the game he named "sphairistike," a Greek term for "skilled ball play." He was a grand promoter and packaged his complete lawn tennis set and "Book of the Game." George Alexander, a biographer of wingfield, accepted the honour in Wingfield's behalf.

Austin was known primarily as the first player to wear shorts pants, but he also debuted the Hazel's racket, an open-throated, "three-branch" model that more closely resembles modern rackets than the others used in his time.

Bowrey won 13 major titles, including two French singles championships. In 1964, she won three of the four major tournaments in doubles, each with a different partner. In 1963 she led Australia in the inaugural Federation Cup and she is the current captain of the Australian Fed Cup team.

Togo leads African nations

JOHANNESBURG, July 14: Togo led the charge of qualifiers for next year's African Nations' Cup finals with a one-sided 4-0 win over Liberia on Sunday as four other countries also booked their places in Burkina Faso, reports Reuter.

Togo qualified for the biennial tournament for the first time since 1984 and will be joined by Cameroon, Ghana, Morocco and Zambia who all won their matches at the weekend.

Tadjou Salou, who plays club soccer in Switzerland, set the Togolese on their way at the Municipal Stadium in Lome with a 52nd minute strike and a barrage of three goals in the last four minutes sealed a famous win.

Kossi Noutsoudje, Komlan Assignon and fittingly Bachirou Salou, the German-based striker, all grabbed late goals to secure top place in Group Six.

Cameroon's qualification was finalised on Sunday afternoon, 24 hours after they had won 1-0 in Namibia with a 69th minute goal by Joseph Tchango.

Gabon's 1-0 win over Kenya in Libreville means that Cameroon will fill one of the two qualifying places in Group Five, even if they are beaten in their final match at home to Kenya in two weeks.

Salaheddine Bassir scored a second successive winning goal for Morocco to put them through from Group Three. His 21st-minute strike against Ethiopia in Addis Ababa saw Morocco qualify for the first time since the 1992 tournament.

Three-time African footballer-of-the-year Abedi Pele set up Ghana's progress to the finals with the opening goal against Zimbabwe in Accra on Sunday.

Although his goal was quickly cancelled out by Zimbabwean midfielder Shephard Muradzikwa, Ghana secured a 2-1 victory with Osei Kuffour's 39th minute winner.

Zimbabwe can still take second place in Group One if they avoid defeat against Angola in Luanda on July 27.

Zambia became the first side to qualify on Saturday with an effortless 3-1 win over neighbours Malawi, set up with a first-half penalty by Hector Chilombo and second-half goals from Frazer Kamwandi and Freddie Mwila Junior.

Zambia were playing without all but one of their foreign-based professionals, who ignored a call-up for the game from coach George Mungwa.

Malawi needed only a draw to qualify but coach Ruben Malola blamed a sloppy midfield for the defeat. "We lost concentration," he said.

Former Nations' Cup winners Algeria and Egypt kept up their late bids to go through with home wins against teams who need just a point to qualify.

Egypt beat Senegal 2-0 in Cairo on Sunday night, inspired by the return to action of Hamed Elmaghrabi, while Algeria laboured to a 1-0 win over Mali on Friday. Both can qualify with home wins in their final matches on July 27.

But 1992 winners Ivory Coast wasted an opportunity to secure their place, drawing 0-0 away against minnows Benin when a win would have seen them through.

The nine outstanding places will be decided on the weekend of July 26-27 when the final round of qualifiers are played.

Brits ride on Rusedski

LONDON, July 14: Greg Rusedski ensured Britain stays in Euro/African zone Group 1 for next year's Davis Cup by defeating Andrei Rybakov of Ukraine in straight sets in a deciding reverse singles match Sunday, reports AP.

The pressure was on Rusedski, who went into the match with Britain and Ukraine tied at 2-2 after Andrei Medvedev had defeated British No 1 Tim Henman 6-7, 6-3, 6-4, 6-4.

The big-serving Rusedski, ranked 24th in the world, served consecutive double faults to be broken in the opening game of the first set. But he fought back and broke twice against his 350th-ranked opponent, and never let him back into the match taking the next two sets 6-3, 6-3.

Finland will meet Poland in the third round of the Euro/African zone Group 2 competition after both secured second round victories.

Finland and Belarus split the opening singles Friday and Finland went up 2-1 after Sunday's doubles. Vladimir Voltshkov of Belarus made it 2-2 with a 6-1, 4-6, 7-5 victory in Sunday's first singles match.

In the deciding Kim Tilkainen of Finland defeated Alexander Shvets in a marathon five setter. The 6-7, 6-1, 7-5, 6-

7-6 victory took three hours and 20 minutes and gave Finland a 3-2 victory.

Tilkainen had substituted for teammate Tuomas Ketola who was forced to withdraw with stomach problems.

Poland, already 2-1 up against Ivory Coast, won both Sunday's singles for a 4-1 verdict.

Norway and Portugal also made it through to the third round which will be contested Sept 19-21.

Norway went into Sunday's reverse singles 2-1 up against hosts Slovenia having lost only in Saturday's doubles. The Norwegians made it 4-1 after finishing with two wins in the singles.

Portugal was 2-1 up but Yugoslavia's Bojan Vujic defeated

Kenyan runner injured

NAIROBI, July 14: Reigning Boston marathon and Commonwealth 10,000 metres champion Lameck Aguta of Kenya was badly injured in a car crash on Saturday, Kenyan police said on Sunday, reports Reuter.

Aguta sustained severe head injuries in the accident on the road between Molo and Kericho in Rift valley province.

Georgia and opponents Nigeria didn't even get on the court Sunday as rain forced play to be abandoned in Tbilisi. Visiting Nigeria will be searching for its first win when play resumes Monday, as Georgia won the opening singles matches and the doubles.

Egypt and Lithuania will also resume play Monday after bad light in Cairo forced the deciding singles match between Lithuania's Eavenidos Cariovas and Egypt's Hisham Humeideh to be abandoned. When play was interrupted, Cariovas lead Heneideh 2-6, 6-7, 7-6, 7-5, 3-2.

Ireland secured its place in next year's Group 2 of the zone with a 4-1 victory against visiting Greece.

Chimes of Big Ben

LONDON, July 14: Test captains meeting at the Lord's on Friday complained of the measure of international cricket now being played around the world. Last year, 41 Test matches and 111 one-day internationals (Pakistan being involved in 42 ODIs) were played.

The captains of the nine Test-playing countries were meeting formally for the first time in eighteen months and their recommendations will be in the agenda of the new ICC committee meeting that began at West End Hotel on Saturday.

The captains voted in favour of establishing a world championship for Test cricket and put forward their views on the future structure and frequency of the World Cup. If the captains have their way television replays could be used also to judge close catches. An Australian proposal that flood-lit grounds may use them in poor daylight conditions during Test matches is also favoured.

Those who graced the Lord's on Friday were Mark Taylor (Australia), Michael Atherton (England), Sachin Tendulkar (India), Stephen Fleming (New Zealand), Wasim Akram (Pakistan), Hansie Cronje (South Africa), Arjuna Ranatunga (Sri Lanka) Courtney Walsh (West Indies) and Alistair Campbell (Zimbabwe).

In another development former West Indian paceman Michael Holding, writing in a new edition of his book, said skipper Brian Lara is not ready to skipper the West Indies although he thinks the present captain Courtney Walsh cannot continue in charge for much longer. According to Holding, Lara is behaving rashly on and off the field and needs to cut it out.

The signing season for the next football season across Europe is on and shoppers are going in as far as South America. The little Brazilian ace Juninho who has joined Spanish side Atletico Madrid for a fee of 12 million dollars, England mid-fielder Paul Ince is moving from Inter Milan to Liverpool, Swedish international striker Martin Dahlin has signed for English side Blackburn from Italian giants Roma for a fee of 2.5 million dollars, Fabrizio Ravanelli has been offered a 7.5 million dollars deal to move from Middlesbrough to Everton, and

Gianluca Vialli may move to Celtic but he wants to stay at Chelsea if he is made a team regular which last season he was not.

Chelsea's 4 million dollars offer was not enough to bag Didier Deschamps from Juventus. Milan midfielder Roberto Bag-

gio's move to Parma has also not materialised.

Arsenal are closing in on Dutch and Ajax superstar Ronald de Boer with 6 million dollars in their pocket. A success would mean Arsenal having three Dutch players in the attack. They already have Dutch internationals Dennis Bergkamp and Marc Overmars.

Dalian Dumper Beijing

BEIJING, July 14: China's northeastern soccer powerhouse Dalian Wanda crushed Beijing Guo an 5-1 at home on Sunday, extending their lead in China's professional soccer league to 11 points, reports Reuter.

The win, fired by goals from Wang Tao, Wang Peng and a hat-trick from Hao Haidong, extended Dalian's unbeaten streak in the league to 43 games, the Xinhua news agency said.

Two-time champion Dalian now tops the standings with 25 points, 11 points clear of 1995 champion Shanghai Shenhua, which drew 0-0 at home on Sunday against Guangzhou Apollo.

Dalian opened the scoring in the 15th minute with a volley by Wang Tao, but Beijing made it into the second half without further losses.

Dutch, French in final

LONDON, July 14: France, knocked out of the Fed Cup in the semifinals for the past four years, will contest the final this year after Nathalie Tauziat and Alexandra Fusai won a thrilling doubles decider against Belgium to give France a 3-2 victory in Nice, reports AP.

France will be hosted by the Netherlands for the Oct. 4-5 final after the Dutch team beat hosts Czech Republic in the other semifinal which was also decided by the doubles.

Wimbledon finalist Jana Novotna completed her second singles victory of the tie by defeating Brenda Schultz-McCarthy of the Netherlands 7-6, 6-3 in the first reverse singles.

It took Novotna 56 minutes to overcome her opponent's powerful serve and triumph in the first-set tiebreak, but just 41 minutes to win the second set and put the Czechs up 2-1.

"It was very difficult, but we both played excellent tennis," said Novotna. "When her first serve turns out well, it's unreturnable."

Miriam Oremans then kept the Netherlands' finals hopes alive with a 1-6, 6-2, 9-7 win over Adriana Gersi.

In the decider, Novotna and teammate Eva Martinova took an early 3-0 lead in the first set, but then lost four games in a row before the Netherlands pair of Oremans and Manon Bollegraf took the set 6-4 in 33 minutes.

In the second set both teams managed a break before a tiebreak which saw the Dutch team triumph, capping a 6-4, 7-6 victory.

France's Fusai and Tauziat won eight straight games at one stage to beat Belgium's Dominique Van Roost and Els Callens, 3-6, 6-2, 7-5.

Earlier, Sandrine Testud, who lost to Van Roost in her Saturday singles match, gave France a 2-1 lead by beating Sabine Appelmans of Belgium 6-2, 6-4. But Van Roost levelled it 2-2 by beating Fusai 6-3, 6-3 in the last of the singles.

Fusai was making her Fed Cup debut in the absence of top-ranked French player Mary Pierce. She was chosen by French captain Yannick Noah to play the singles ahead of Tauziat, who made the quarterfinals at Wimbledon but has not been able to adjust to clay.

The French pair appeared destined for defeat after losing the first set and then trailing 2-0 in the second.

But, with Noah pumping up his players from the sidelines, the momentum turned and France took the next six games to win the second set before going up 2-0 in the third.

France had three match points with Belgium serving at 3-5, but each time Tauziat sent backhands into the net, and Belgium held on before breaking to level 5-5.

The visiting Belgians lost their next service game and Tauziat served out the next game to love for the emphatic victory.

France's finals berth comes a year after the French men's team defeated Sweden in the Davis Cup final. That team was also captained by Noah.

"I feel very privileged," Noah said. "And very lucky."

World No. 1 Martina Hingis of Switzerland, world No. 8 Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario of Spain and Germany's 10th-ranked Katrin Srebnik appeared headed their countries' victories in the play offs for World Group 1. Huber upset French Open champion Iva Majoli, who was struggling with back problems, 6-7, 6-2, 6-0. That made it 2-1 to Germany, but 15-year-old Mirjana Lucic of Croatia beat Meike Babel 6-4, 6-1 to level 2-2.

Huber and Babel then beat Majoli and Lucic in the decisive doubles 7-6, 6-7, 6-1. The defeat dropped Croatia to World Group 2.

Wimbledon champion Hingis overwhelmed Argentina's Jose Gaidano 6-2, 6-1 Saturday, and beat Florencia Labat 6-1, 6-2 Sunday. That win made it 3-0 after Switzerland's Patty Schnyder had beaten Labat Saturday.

Schnyder beat Gaidano 6-1, 6-0 Sunday before Hingis and Emmanuelle Gagliardi beat Mercedes Paz and Laura Montalvo 6-3, 6-4 for a 5-0 whitewash.

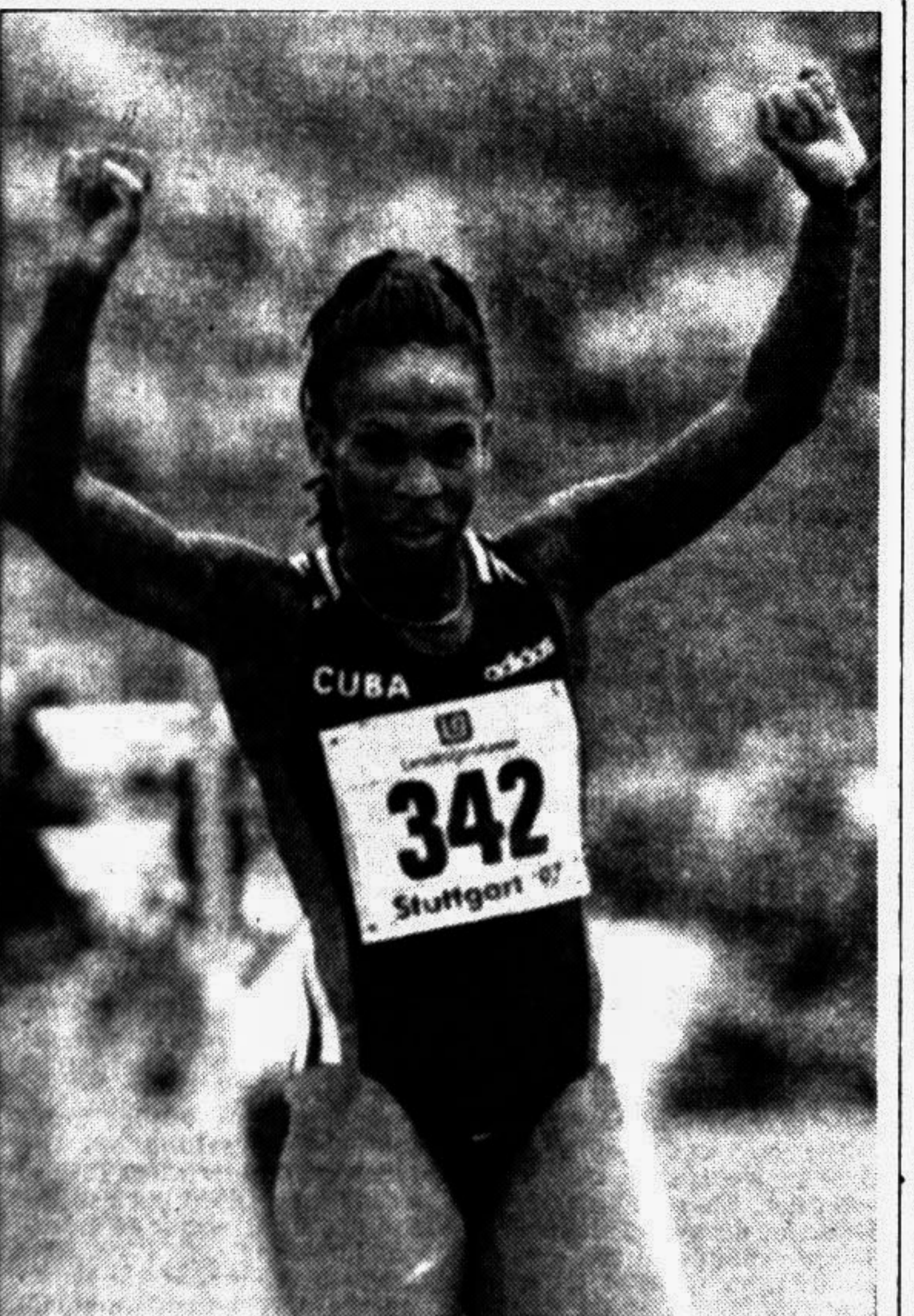
Spain also stays in World Group 1 after defeating Australia 3-2 in a playoff at the Gold Coast. It was level 1-1 after Saturday's opening singles, but Vicario gave Spain a 2-0 lead when she defeated Annabel Ellwood 6-2, 6-0 for her second victory of the tie.

Maria Luisa Serna, who lost to Ellwood in her opening match, then secured Spain's victory with an equally convincing 6-1, 6-3 win against Rachel McQuillan.

Australia had a consolation victory in the doubles.

In the play offs for World Group 2, Austria's Barbara Schett played crucial roles in her singles and doubles matches to steer Austria to a 3-2 victory over South Africa. With the loss, South Africa was relegated to regional qualifying next year.

Italy completed a 5-0 whitewash of Indonesia in Jakarta and Slovakia did the same against Canada in Bratislava.
