Relief for river erosion victims

COMILLA. July 16: The district administration recently distributed cash and relief materials among the affected people of Burichong and Brahmanpara thanas due to erosion of em-

bankment of the river Gumti, reports BSS.

About 15,000 people of six unions of the two thanas were affected due to the damage caused to the embankment, official sources said. Taka 35,000 in cash and eight metric tons of rice were distributed among the victims. Eight medical teams are working among the affected people and five shallow tubewells have been sunk to supply pure drinking water in the area.

MAGURA, July 15: Police arrested two dacoits of a gang and recovered five arms from Rainagar village in Sripur thana here recently, reports BSS.

Police also returned the fire and at one stage nabbed Akkas Ali and Shukman Ali from the spot and recovered two shutter-guns, three pipe-guns, nine bullets and some sharp weapons from their possession. Other activists of the gang, however, managed to escape. A case was filed with the police.

Faulty drainage system in Noakhali

NOAKHALI, July 16: Water-logging in the district headquarters has been causing suffering to the town-dwellers for a long time, reports UNB.

According to the dwellers, the rain water in poura area remain stagnant submerging the surrounding residential areas and roads and lanes in the absence of proper drainage system. Moreover, garbages are dumped in the 'Chhagalmara Khal' of the town blocking the water outlet causing inundation to the surroundings after a slight rainfall. Kutcha roads of the town go under water in the rainy season as many shops were established on both sides of the canal haphazardly blocking the drainage system.

R&H Deptt's land illegally occupied

SYLHET, July 16: Some one lakh square feet land of both sides of the roads in the district under Road and Highway (R&H) Department are under unauthorised possession of influential quarters, reports UNB.

Sources said of the occupied land, most are being captured from Sylhet-Sunamganj road by a section of political leaders and vested quarters. Workshops, hotels, saw-mills, clubs and dwelling houses are being constructed on the occupied lands. officials alleged. R&H Department sources said they requested the Deputy Commissioner of the district to evict the illegal occupants from the lands, but no effective measures have yet been taken.

More arms recovered in Rangpur

RANGPUR, July 16: Police in a raid for the third time recovered two countrymade guns from inside the Rangpur Polytechnic Institute recently, reports UNB.

No one, however, was arrested during the raid. Tension was prevailing in the institute since the major violence between the rival groups of students on June 17. Meanwhile, district administration has been trying to restore peace on the campus. But some teachers have expressed their doubt about the restoration of normalcy as the main terrorists are yet to be arrested.

Rivals' clash leaves one dead

NARAYANGANJ, July 16: Abdus Samad, 70, a farmer, was killed on the spot and three others were injured in a clash between two rival groups of people at Shekerchar under Sonargaon police station recently, reports BSS.

The victims came under attack following an altercation with the rival groups over money lending affairs, according to police. The body was sent to Narayangani General Hospital for autopsy and the injured were admitted to Khanpur Hospital.

Youth killed by members of in-laws

Youth killed at in-law's house SIRAJGANJ, July 16: A young man was allegedly strangulated to death by some members of his in-law's family at village Jhaprakazpur in Raigani thana recently, reports UNB.

Police said Haider Ali, 27, son of Salimuddin of village Parkodla in the same thana, married Runa Khatun, daughter of Amir Hossain, seven months back. But Haider had developed relationship with his sister-in-law and allured her to elope with him, his father-in-law Amir Hossain alleged. As Haider came to his house, the family members beat him up and later strangulated to death, police said.

Massive aman cultivation scheme

MADARIPUR, July 16: Around 69,500 hectares of land have been brought under aman cultivation in Madaripur and Shariatpur districts in the current season, reports BSS.

According to an official source, 37,000 hectares have been cultivated in Madaripur district while 32,000 hactares in Shariatpur. The Bangladesh Agriculture Development Corporation (BADC) has supplied High Yielding Varieties of aman seeds and fertilizers to the farmers.

According to District Relief and Rehabilitation Department sources, 3100 metric tons of wheat were allotted to implement the projects. About 20 lakh people of the district will be benefitted by these projects.

JESSORE, July 16: The port users have demanded reduction in weekly holidays at Benapole Land Port.

They demanded it with a view to difusing traffic jam and ensuring continuity of revenue earnings in the port.

About 90 per cent trade between India and Bangladesh is operated through Benapole Land Port. According to a port source,

revenue earnings from this port exceeds Taka 500 crore per year. At present goods are exported and imported only in trucks through this port. It will soon be divided after re-opening of Jessore-Benapole railway line.

Repair works on this line is in progress. It is expected to be completed and likely to be reopened by mid '98. Traffic jam at this port is a

During the fiscal 1995-96, a total of 85,000 Bangladeshi and Indian trucks were loaded and off loaded from this port. During the fiscal 1996-97 the figure rose to 90,000.

The cargo handlings during this period were 5,50,000 metric tons. These handlings were operated by the Port Authority on working days except weekly holidays and government holidays. The Customs Department issued the clearance order.

The total working days of the last year were 313 days excluding 52 government holidays till May this year. It has now come down to 261 days a year following increase in weekly holidays from one day to two

A source on condition of anonymity told that the total working days would not exceed more than 240 days per year due to recurrence of strike, hartal Now on the first day of week

People buy Indian medicine for its low price. Indian iron capsules and vitamin syrups

are popular among the people.
But contraband medicines like phensidyl also enters the country through Jaflong, Tam-abil, Jakiganj frontiers. It is learnt that most of the medicines have exceeded the expiry date which are injurious to health.

These medicines are sold in unauthorised medicine shops in bazars of border region and Zindabazar, Taltala, Choughatta and stadium markets in secret.

The Indian medicines nam-

ely quadrom, rebital, burnol, foroxon, feofol and others including expensive ones are coming through the border areas almost everyday.

Standard of education falls in Satkhira schools

SATKHIRA, July 16: The secondary education is being hampered due to shortage of teachers, lack of proper maintenance and shortage of furniture in schools of seven thanas in Satkhira district.

There are 245 secondary schools including 241 non-government secondary schools and 152 madrashas in the district. The thana wise secondary schools and madrashas are as follows: Satkhira sadar-secondary schools-55 and madrashas-21, Tala-63 and 38, Kalaroa-37 and 18, Debhata-10 and 5. Assassuni-35 and 24. Kaligonj-28 and 21 and Shyamnagar thana -27 and 24.

The maximum number of schools and madrashas are in critical condition due to shortage of teachers, dilapidated condition of schools and other problems.

The maximum numbers of schools and madrashas are housed in tinsheds. During rainfall sufferings of the learners and teachers reaches the climax. The condition of some old science laboratories is miserable Some schools have no

benches, table and almirahs. Qualified and meritorious persons do not take up teaching at non-government secondary schools. Facilities like gratuity. house rent, bonus and pension are not given in non-government schools.

Besides, the school authorities can not pay 20 per cent salary to the teachers due to shortage of funds. There is a government ban on increasing tuition fees of the students. The institutions have no other source of income. Most of the teachers who have no proper qualifications for jobs elsewhere ultimately take up the teaching profession in nongovernment high schools.

Good English language teachers and good arithmetic teachers are not available in non-government high schools. As a result, the Secondary School Certificate (SSC) examiness are compelled to adopt unfair means in the examination halls due to the deterioration of the standard of teaching. Expe-

rienced science teachers are also very limited in these schools.

Private coaching has been commercialised in the districts. Most of the teachers are now interested in private coaching. So they do not give full attention to their students in the school.

The schools do not have their own syllabus. Besides, question papers are not made by the respective institutions. The question papers which are bought from various commercial question setters at cheap rate are full of errors. The examination fees are also collected from the students at higher rate, most guardians al-

Classes are not held during 3 to 4 months of the academic year on the pretext of nonavailability of government approved books.

Guardians have apprehended, if the authorities concerned of these schools do not take necessary steps towards positive direction, the standard of education will fall further.
