

Diego doing well

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 25: Diego Maradona played full 90 minutes and converted a penalty as Boca Juniors star-studded team began the Argentine Championship with a 4-2 win over Argentinos Juniors on Sunday, reports Reuters.

The 36-year-old veteran, playing the second competitive game of another of his countless comebacks, scored Boca's final goal against the club with whom he began his career. Claudio Caniggia, another of Boca's major signings, had a subdued debut and looked disgruntled when he was substituted during the second half while Mexico's Luis Hernandez, another Boca recruit, missed the game through injury. Caniggia, a veteran of two World Cups, was playing the first game after a year's absence from professional soccer.

Moya's maiden ATP Tour success

COMMACK, New York, Aug. 25: Fifth-seeded Carlos Moya of Spain defeated eighth-seeded Patrick Rafter of Australia, 6-4, 7-6 (7-1) to win the \$30,000 dollar Hamlet Cup on Sunday, his first ATP Tour victory of the year, reports AP.

Both played with sore right shoulders as Moya won for the first time this year after losing four previous finals appearances. He improved his record to a career-best 47-20, 23-7 on hardcourts.

Moya earned 43,000 dollars to boost his career total to 1,330,140 dollars, and became the first Spaniard to win an ATP Tour title in the United States since Jose Higuera in La Pinta California, on Feb. 27, 1983.

Rafter, now winless in five finals this year, is now 0-3 against Moya, losing all three matches in tiebreakers. He earned 25,300 dollars and saw his career-best record drop to 47-21.

Moya, seeded eighth at the US Open, will open against Guillaume Raoux of France. Rafter, seeded 13th at the Open, will face Andrei Medvedev of the Ukraine.

Moya's parents, Pilar and Andres, arrived from Spain on Saturday night and watched their son's victory.

Because of his injury, Moya has asked US Tennis Association officials to schedule him Wednesday for his first-round match.

"It's up to them," he said. "Wednesday's my 21st birthday and it would be a nice present. If they don't do it I'll still play, I won't withdraw."

Bayern move into third place

HAMBURG, Aug. 25: Bayern Munich moved to within three points of Bundesliga leaders Kaiserslautern with a 2-0 away win over Hamburg on Sunday, reports Reuters.

Mario Basler scored the opener after 23 minutes after being set up by Giovane Elber. But it took until eight minutes from time for the second to arrive via substitute Alexander Zickler.

The victory moves Bayern into third place, one of six teams on seven points.

Newly-promoted Kaiserslautern top the standings after four games with 10 points after Saturday's 3-0 victory over cup holders Schalke.

Borussia Dortmund are second, ahead of Munich on goal difference, following a 5-2 thrashing of neighbours Bochum.

Stuttgart, Rostock, Karlsruhe and Wolfsburg compete the seven point group while Hamburg are second-last with just two points.

Mixed feelings over Ashes



MELBOURNE, Aug. 25: The original Ashes urn was unlikely to be released by Lord's to be put on display in Australia, Australian Cricket Board (ACB) chief executive Mal Speed said here today, reports AFP.

He said the ACB would campaign for the Ashes urn to be released under a proposal to keep it in the country which won the most recent Ashes series.

Australia won the latest series in England 3-2 last week-end to retain the Ashes for a record fifth successive time.

"I think it would be great if we could have the Ashes in Australia," Speed said.

"And if we did get them here, I think it's fair to say that they will be here for some time."

"I also think it's unlikely that they will come to Aus-

tralia. But the board, through its chairman Denis Rogers, will be approaching the MCC (Marylebone Cricket Club and custodian of the Ashes urn) to ask that the Ashes be released in the next day or so."

The Ashes originated after a memorable Australian victory at the Oval in 1882 — Australia's first in England — which led to mock obituaries appearing in the English press, lamenting the death of English cricket and noting that its body should be cremated and the ashes taken to Australia.

The urn has left the MCC's Lord's ground once when they were exhibited in a Sydney bank during the single Test in 1988 to mark the Australian bicentennial.

Meanwhile in London, Tory Peer and best-selling novelist Lord Jeffrey Archer said it was "insulting" to Australians that their triumphant team should

not be allowed to take the Ashes urn home.

"They have won the Ashes fair and square and should have the right to put them on display in Sydney or Melbourne and let the Australian people see them," said Lord Archer, an MCC member for 20 years.

"I think it would add to the rivalry between the two countries and give added incentive when we go there to try and win them back," he said.

The Ashes have been on display in the Long room at Lord's since 1927 and the MCC believes they may be too fragile for the long trip Down Under.

But Lord Archer said, "If they can prove beyond doubt they are so fragile you cannot move them out of the Long room that is not a bad argument, but I don't wear that."

"It's an insult to the Australians to suggest they couldn't take care of them."

Aussies work on specialist one-day team

SYDNEY, Aug. 25: Australia will field specialist one-day cricket teams in future as part of their drive to win the 1999 World Cup, reports AP.

The announcement by the Australian Cricket Board on Monday backs up the growing trend towards choosing different players for Tests and one-day competitions.

Australia have made the most of different players during home series and in South Africa last year replaced several of their Test squad with new blood for the one-day series.

On longer, more expensive, tours such as the just finished Ashes series, Australia have tended to choose one squad to cover both one-day matches and Tests.

Australia were runners-up to Sri Lanka in the 1995 World Cup on the sub-continent.

"Success in the 1999 one-day World Cup in England is a major short-term goal in regard to selection policy for one-day internationals," ACB chairman Denis Rogers said in a statement.

"In line with this change in selection policy the chairman of selectors will now link up by tele-conference or video conference with the tour selectors when the Australian team is overseas," Rogers said.

There was widespread criticism of the standing selection procedures on tours with out-of-form captain Mark Taylor one of three selectors along with coach Geoff Marsh and Steve Waugh on the Ashes tour.

The selection initiative was part of a five-year development plan launched by the ACB on Monday.

Players of Test, Sheffield Shield and domestic limited overs standard will receive 10 per cent pay rises in the coming season.

Warne leaves Notts waiting

NOTTINGHAM, Aug. 25: English county Nottinghamshire will have to wait at least another month to discover whether they have won the race to sign Shane Warne as their overseas player for next season, reports AFP.

The Australian leg-spinner, who started in his country's 3-2 Ashes series defeat of England, has now received a firm offer from Notts.

The county declared their interest in signing Warne in June, when he announced that he would consider playing county cricket next season.

Notts officials held talks with Warne's manager, Austin Robertson, on the eve of the final Test at The Oval last week.

The county's cricket committee chairman Stuart Foster said: "Our offer is now on the table. We feel it's a very good one but we will now have to wait and see."

"It was made clear that an announcement about his future won't be made until late September."

Kenya's amazing 48 hrs



COLOGNE, Germany, Aug. 25: It's the season for world records in track and field. Seven in the last 10 days and still counting.

Two more fell Sunday at the Cologne Grand Prix, two days after two were shattered in Brussels. And the Berlin meet Tuesday, the final of the Golden Four series, could produce more, reports AP.

The latest efforts saw, Wilson Kipketer, a Kenyan-born Danish Citizen, lower his own 800-metre world mark and Bernard Barmasai of Kenya pulverise the 3,000-metre steeplechase world record.

The records came just two days after the 5,000 and 10,000 standards were improved in Brussels, and less than two weeks after three records were set in Zurich, Switzerland.

Both records set Sunday improved the marks set in Zurich. Kipketer posted a time of one minute, 41.13 seconds, after running 1:41.24 in Zurich.

Barmasai surged in the finish to push past fellow Kenyan Moses Kiptanui and shatter the steeplechase mark by more than three seconds, clocking 7:55.72.

Another Kenyan, Wilson Boit Kipketer, no relation to the 800-metre runner, held the record less than two weeks with a time of 7:59.08.

Pushed by Kenyan "rabbit" David Kiptoo, who set a perfect pace in the first lap, Kipketer burst ahead and easily beat the mark that had stood for 16 years until he first equalled it earlier this summer and then finally broke it in Zurich, Switzerland.

"The 'rabbit' may be perfect, but if you are not perfect you won't run a world record," Kipketer said.

"I didn't really come here to run a record. I just wanted to have eight races to qualify for the Grand Prix finals and this was my eighth race," he said.

"When I am running, I am not thinking of breaking records, I am only thinking of doing my best," said the 24-year-old star, who won the gold medal at the World Championship in Athens, Greece, earlier this month.

Kipketer earlier this summer first equalled Sebastian Coe's 1981 mark of 1:41.73, and then erased the longest-standing record in the books with his performance Aug. 13 in Zurich.

No records fell in Athens, but the lucrative meets are

proving that the athletes, especially Kenyans, are at their peak.

Barmasai engaged in a thrilling battle with Moses Kiptanui, the veteran fellow Kenyan and former world record holder. Kiptanui appeared to be heading for victory and to reclaiming his record but Barmasai, bronze medalist in Athens, pushed past him at the last hurdle and never looked back.

Kiptanui lost the Athens race in a similar way and the lost his record of 7:59.18 to Wilson Boit Kipketer in Zurich. We were nearly three seconds under his gold mark, but was still the big loser of the last few days. Boit Kipketer missed the Cologne event because of a knee injury.

"I didn't expect the record," Barmasai said. "I want to thank Kiptanui, because he was in Kenya owe him a lot."

The two world records stood out in an afternoon of several other stellar performances.

Tim Lobinger of Germany joined an exclusive club when he cleared six metres in the pole vault, becoming only the sixth man to go over the barrier.

Ana Fidelia Quirot of Cuba, the world champion, ran the sixth fastest women's 800-metre time in history and the fastest this year when she clocked 1:54.82.

Donovan Bailey of Canada, the Olympic champion, surged ahead shortly after the start and powered past three American sprinters to win the 100-metre dash.

Bailey, who was beaten by American Maurice Greene for the gold medal in Athens, clocked a fast time of 9.99 seconds into a head wind on a warm and muggy day. Greene did not run here.

"No one can beat me here," Bailey boasted after the race. "I spent a whole week preparing for this race, that's why I was so fast. And in spite of a head wind."

Tim Montgomery, the bronze medalist in Athens, finished second in 10.01, while Dennis Mitchell was third in 10.12. The third American in the race, Vincent Henderson, was fourth in 10.24.

But there was an American win in the women's 200, when Marion Jones eased to victory past two medalists from Athens.

Jones, the 100-metre world champion who became the third fastest woman over the distance in Brussels two days ago with a time of 10.76, clocked 21.93 over the 200 Sunday.

Merlene Ottey, the Jamaican veteran who won bronze medalist in Athens, was second in 22.17, while Juliet Cuthbert, another Jamaican, was third in 22.49.

World Cup badminton Sun, Susanti singles champs

YOGYAKARTA, Indonesia, Aug. 25: Sun Jun outlasted Indonesia's Joko Suprianto 15-8, 15-8 in a 50-minute duel, and Ge Fei won a pair of doubles titles to give China three of the five crowns at the World Cup badminton on Sunday, reports AP.

It was 22-year-old Sun's first victory over the nine-year-old Suprianto in four tries.

Ge, half of the top-ranked women's pair, joined with compatriot Gu Jun to beat Qin Yiyuan and Tang Songshu 15-10, 9-15, 15-9 in an all-Chinese final.

She then paired with Liu Yong to claim the mixed doubles title by defeating Trikus and Minarti Timur of Indonesia, 12-15, 15-7, 15-10.

Indonesia took the other two titles, led by Susi Susanti's victory in the women's singles. Susanti took only 20 minutes to overpower China's Ye Zhaoying, 11-8, 11-5.

Ye took initiative in the first set and led 8-7 before Susanti steadied and won four points on three service changes.

Supported by more than 3,000 spectators at Amongoro Stadium in the Central Java's ancient city of Yogyakarta, Susanti took an early 2-0 lead in the second set, then 6-2.

Ye tried to rally with three consecutive points, but Susanti fought back and ended the game by collecting the last five points in two service changes.

Cappellini captures Russian GP

MOSCOW, Aug. 25: Guido Cappellini of Italy battled American Scott Gillman to the wire Sunday to win the Grand Prix of Russia Formula 1 powerboat race, a first victory in 1997 for the defending champion, says a press release.

Cappellini negotiated the 51 laps on a placid Volga River in 69.15 minutes, nipping Gillman, the 1997 UIMF drivers series leader, at the wire by 0.3 minutes. The top racers were the only drivers to complete 51 laps. Finn Pertti Leppala was third with a time of 69.20 for 50 laps, ahead of Sweden's Goran Karlof and Italy's Fabrizio Bocca.

Although conditions were ideal, 30° Celsius temperature and humid under bright sunshine, only 13 of the original 23 starters were able to finish the race. Among the non-finishers were the Gold Leaf F1 Racing Team pair of Massimo Roggero and Jonathan Jones.

A day earlier, Roggero had qualified with the pole position, only to have his engine fail on the second lap of Sunday's race. Jones, in fifth on the grid at the race start, had his engine quit three times after taking on too much water, the result of a high-sider (a lateral

flip) early in the race, and was forced to abandon on the 21st lap.

After six races, Gillman leads the drivers' championship with 95 points, 20 ahead of runner-up Leppala. Cappellini is third with 65 points, while Karlof is fourth, with 30.



Sunday's result led Gold Leaf's Jones and Roggero far back in the standings in ninth and 12th place respectively with 20 and 13 points.

The next round in the nine-race series will be the Italian Grand Prix at Campione, Sept. 14.
