Brazil squad sans Ronaldo

RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug 27: In ternazionale striker Ronaldo was left out of Brazil's squad for next month's friendly against Ecuador when coach Mario Zagallo named his team on Tuesday, reports Reuter.

Ronaldo, whose 43 million dollars transfer from Barcelona in the close season made him the world's most expensive soccer player, was omitted from the side along with Roberto Carlos because he had already played five friendlies this year — the quota for which clubs are forced to release players in one year. However, Zagallo has taken

the opportunity of introducing uncapped midfielder Emerson, who plays for German side Bayer Leverkusen, among the six foreign-based players in the squad for the game on September 10.

Emerson, full name Emerson Ferreira da Rosa, joined the German club from Brazilian champions Gremio in July.

Zagallo retained striker Sonny Anderson, who scored on his debut this month in the 2-1 win away to South Korea and recalled Spanish-based midfielders Rivaldo and Mauro Silva.

Fullbacks Cafu, who plays for Roma, and Ze Roberto, of Real Madrid, were also included.

Zamorano sidelined

SANTIAGO, Aug 27: Chile striker Ivan Zamorano will be left out of the squad for his country's World Cup qualifier at home to Argentina next month because of injury, a spokesman said on Tuesday, reports Reuter.

Zamorano's exclusion. which is a disaster for his team. was decided after it was realised that he was unlikely to have recovered in time from an injury sustained playing for his Italian club Internazionale earlier this month.

"We have been in touch with him and there has not been much of a recovery," said Andres Espinosa, spokesman for the Chilean Football Federa-

Zamorano told local newspaper Las Ultimas Noticias that he expected to be match fit in two weeks time.

Chile, who have won all their home matches in the South American World Cup qualifying group, face Argentina in Santiago on September 10. The squad will be named Thursday.

The top four teams qualify for France and Chile currently occupy fourth place, but only on goal difference ahead of a resurgent Peru. The two countries clash in what could be a decisive match in Santiago in Octo-

Zamorano, who was included in the squad for last week's 1-0 defeat in Uruguay but did not play, has scored 12 goals in the World Cup qualifiers, exactly half of his team's total.

average of 100. Needing to score only four runs to achieve the landmark figure, he was dismissed for a duck - much to the disbelief of the huge crowd who had flocked to the ground to farewell him.

In all, Bradman played 338 first-class innings, scoring 28,067 runs at an average of 95.14. Statistically, his achievements have never been threatened, let alone equalled. Born in Cootamundra in ru-

ral New South Wales state on August 27, 1908, Bradman moved as a child to Bowral, 80 km (50 miles) southwest of Sydney. He has lived in Adelaide with his wife Jesse for most of his adult life.

Last year Australian newspapers said Bradman had suffered a mild stroke, but cricket officials denied the report and said he was still in good health for his age.

BARLIN. Aug 27: Namibian Frank Fredericks beat another high-class 100 metres field to share the bigger jackpot in Athletics with middle-distance runners Gabriela Szabo and Hicham-el Guerrouj on Tuesday, reports Reuter.

Fredericks won the Berlin Grand Prix 100m in 9.99 seconds after victories in Oslo. Zurich and Brussels to win a share of 20 one-kilo bars of gold for the second consecutive sea-

The 29-year-old Namibian, who won a share of the 200,000 dollars prize last season with four wins in the 200, produced a typically strong finish to outsprint Canadian Olympic champion Donovan Bailey and American Tim Montgomery who both clocked 10.05 in equal second.

The gold bars are divided between athletes who win specific events at the four most lucrative meetings in the sport.

Romania's Szabo won her fourth race easily in the women's 5,000 in 14 minutes 44.35 seconds while Morocco's El Guerrouj shrugged off a brave challenge from 3,000 and 5,000 world record holder Daniel Komen of Kenya to take the men's mile in 3:45.64.

Fredericks not only left Berlin quite a lot richer but he also made up for a relatively disappointing campaign at the World Championships earlier this month in Athens where he had to be content with a silver medal in the 200 metres.

"To have beaten the best sprinters in the world on four occasions means just as much to me as a world title," he said.

World champion Szabo ran a tactical race, staying safely behind the pace-makers before making her move in the final lap to beat Kenya's Lydia Cheromei and Briton Paula Radcliffe into second and third place respectively.

"Obviously, I was not interested in a fast pace," Szabo said. "It was the victory that was important. I'm relieved. The season is nearly over now. It's been a very successful one four me."

BERLIN, Aug 27 (Agencies): Carl Lewis said a final goodbye to his Europeans fans on Tuesday in the same stadium where his idol

Jesse Owens made athletics history more than 60 years ago. The nine-time Olympic champion anchored a worldclass 4x100 metres relay at the Berlin Grand Prix in his last race on the continent before he retires next month.

And it was a victory and it came at the stadium where Jesse Ownes won four gold medals at the 1936 Olympics, stunning Hitler and making a mockery of the Nazi's Aryan supremacy theories.

Donovan Bailey, the Olympic champion and world record holder from Canada led off and handed over to Lerov Burrell, Lewis' teammate from the Santa Monica Track Club. He then passed on to Frank Fredericks, the Namibian who built up the lead and then gave Lewis a joking, slight shove in the back.

Lewis then sprinted home to the cheers of the fans and his team won in 38.24 seconds. Addressing the crowd later.

Hungary's Olympic hammer champion Balazs Kiss won the first athletics gold medal of the World University Games on Tuesday with a throw of 79.42 metres, reports agencies. Kiss, the defending cham-

pion, triumphed comfortably with his second throw, beating Ukraine's Vadim Kolesnik and Russia's Ilia Konovalov into second and third respectively. Two of the Hungarian's other

attempts would have been enough to bring him gold even though they were a full four metres below his winning distance in Atlanta. Local heroine Annarita Sidoti finished a disappointing

third in the 10-km walk after winning World Championship gold in Athens earlier this month.

Sepeng. Olympic silver medalist in Atlanta last year, won his race in 1:52.66 while Tellez, second at the World Championships, came through in 1:50.93.
