Diego holed by himself

BUENOS AIRES, Aug 31: Diego Maradona remained Saturday in a friend's apartment, where he has sequestered himself since learning that he failed a doping test in an Argentine league game, reports AP.

A host of reporters and TV crews standing guard at the door of the building in the upscale Recoleta district have not seen Maradona since the Argentine Football Association said Friday that he tested positive for "prohibited substances."

Carlos Fren, an old friend of Maradona's who visited him briefly Saturday morning, told reporters that "Diego spent the night alone and very depressed."

The AFA temporarily banned Maradona from playing and ordered him to appear before a disciplinary commission on Tuesday.

The final verdict will be delivered after a second test, requested by Maradona and scheduled for Wednesday.

The association also notified the federal police, a fact which apparently confirmed widespread suspicions that the 36-year-old midfielder may have tested positive for cocaine.

Maradona's manager Guillermo Coppola said in a television interview Friday that "to suspend Diego is like putting a loaded six-shooter in his hand and telling him to go shoot himself."

If the second test also proves positive, it would almost certainly signal the end of one of the most glittering — and controversial — careers in soccer history.

Buenos Aires newspapers said Friday that Maradona would probably be suspended for anything from 1-5 years by the AFA.

If so, the goal he scored on a penalty Sunday for Boca Juniors against Argentinos Juniors, the 150th in his career, may have been his last.

Thailand on thin ice

BANGKOK, Aug 31: The Olympic Council of Asia (OCA) today accused organisers in Bangkok of ignoring its calls to address problems concerning preparations, warning the country could lose the 1998 Asian Games, reports AFP.

The OCA has warned that Bangkok is in danger of losing its right to host Asia's most prestigious sports event, scheduled for December 1998, following internal bickering among officials of the Bangkok Asian Games Organising Committee (BAGOC) and fears of inadequate preparations.

The OCA has repeatedly voiced its concern at the highest level but unfortunately this had no echo within the (Bangkok) organising committee, which is why we are at the present situation," OCA director-general Abdul Mutaleb Ahmed said.

BAGOC chairman Sukhavich Rangsitpol has been blamed by local officials for inaction and differences, but has been able to ignore increasing pressure for his resignation due to his position as a deputy premier and a faction leader in the party of Prime Minister Chaovalit Yongchaiyudh.

Mutaleb said that the OCA had invited BAGOC officials to Kuwait in July to discuss urgent issues concerning the Games.

"The OCA did not receive any reply to our invitation," Mutaleb said in a statement received here from the OCA's Kuwait headquarters.

The OCA is to hold an emergency meeting on September 23, where it will call an emergency vote among its members on whether to strip Thailand of its right to host the Asian Games.

Rush's Reds day today

NEW YORK, Aug 31: Pete Sampras, the number one seed as well as the hot favourite for the title here, completed the demolition of unseeded Romanian-born German Alex Radulescu in exactly 90 minutes at the Arthur Ashe Stadium Saturday afternoon.

This was the third-round match played in bright sunshine before a few hundred fanatic tennis-lovers. Sampras' superiority was never in doubt and his ability to make his opponent buckle under constant pressure was once more in evidence. His determination to win, even in trying conditions, made him different from the others. Radulescu tried every shot he knew but here was an opponent who was far beyond the best in the world today and in the circumstances he had done well to manage 11 games — the final scores being 6-3, 6-4, 6-4.

So, Sampras moves into the round of 16.

The women's member one, Martina Hingis, after an uncertain first set against the Lanky Elena Likhovtseva, in which she was broken at least twice finally managed a 7-5, 6-2 win. Elena gave Martina the creeps out fell to her own bad choice of shots. In the second she just gave up.

Jana Novotna, the third seed, had a great escape against the teenage sensation Mirjana Lucic. The 28-year-old Czech veteran and runner up at Wimbledon last July had a taste of the future from the hard-hitting 15-year-old Croat. In the third set Lucic led 3-1 but then lost control as Novotna pinned Lucic at the net. She was visibly annoyed with herself. "It was impossible to win because I had so many ups and downs. I had 3-1 up in the third, and I definitely stopped moving into the court," said Lucic. Jana wanted challenge from the teenager and she had plenty to handle last night. Novotna moved into the round of 16 having managed a juggernaut 6-2, 6-7, 6-3.

The skinny Gustavo Kuerten, the French Open champion, was given a guided tour of the hard courts at the US Open last night by the 17th seeded Swede Jonas Bjorkman. He was thorough in his handling of Kuerten who missed more shots than he made and finally fell 6-3, 6-1, 7-5.

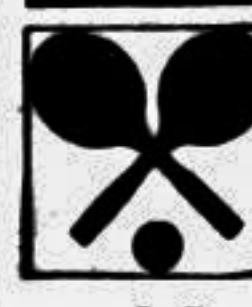

US Open Notebook



NEW YORK, Aug 31 (AP): Monica Seles has made a wish come true for 12-year-old Melissa Schweissberger of Rancho Palos Verdes, California.

Schweissberger was an avid tennis player before she was diagnosed with osteosarcoma, a type of bone cancer, about the same time Seles was stabbed in April 1993. While undergoing treatment and surgery, Schweissberger gained hope after reading Seles' biography and wanted to meet and hit with the tennis star.

Mary MacGyver, director of Program Services at the Los Angeles Make a Wish Foundation, contacted US Open tournament director Jay Snyder, who arranged tickets for Melissa, her parents and 9-year-old sister. On Wednesday, Melissa and her family had a private tour of the new Arthur Ashe Stadium and a behind-the-scenes look at the US Open.

Schweissberger also hit with Seles.

Pete Sampras is closing in on some high marks. He currently has won 10 Grand Slam tournament singles titles, more than any other active player and tied with Bill Tilden for fourth all-time. Roy Emerson owns the record for the most Grand Slam tournament singles titles with 12, followed by Bjorn Borg and Rod Laver with 11 each.

If Sampras were to win his third consecutive US Open crown this year, and the fifth of his career, it also would be his 50th career title, which would put him in seventh place on the all-time Open Era list.

Jimmy Connors won 109 tournaments during his career, followed by Ivan Lendl with 94, John McEnroe with 77, Borg and Guillermo Vilas with 62 each and Ilie Nastase with 57. Sampras currently is tied with Boris Becker with 49 titles each.

The Americans, Cuba's Neisser Bent, first in the 100 backstroke Thursday, failed to add the 200 title, finishing second to Italy's Emanuele Merisi.

Meanwhile, Primo Nebiolo, president of the Games' sanctioning body, said Saturday that Sicily '97 had not harmed Rome's bid for the 2004 Olympics.

Away from the Games, Merlene Ottey and Frank Fredericks scored a victory for the 30- and overs when they won their respective 200 metres races at a "festival of sprint."

Bill Farnsworth, clerk of the course at the Lanarkshire track, said on Sunday, "We will hold a minute's silence just before the first race, once the horses are down at the stalls we will hold the minute's silence then."

Antlers atop J-League

TOKYO, Aug 31: A goal by Brazilian striker Bismarck helped Kashima Antlers remain on top of Japan's professional J-League soccer table, reports Reuter.

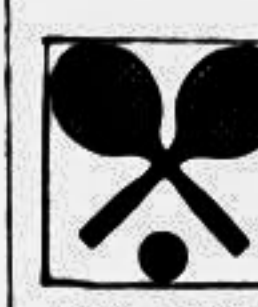
With Saturday's victory, Antlers retained the top place in the 17-club table in the second stage on goal difference.

Mirjana makes Jana sweat



NEW YORK, Aug 31: World number one Pete Sampras and Martina Hingis reached the fourth round

while the US Open in straight sets while third seed Jana Novotna was pushed to the limit by a 15-year-old prodigy, report agencies.

Two-time defending champion Sampras and 16-year-old Swiss sensation Hingis each seek their third Grand Slam title of the year, having both taken Wimbledon and Australian Open crowns.

And while Novotna escaped, three high seeds were ousted here Saturday. French Open champion Gustavo Kuerten and Spaniards Alex Corretja and Conchita Martinez fell at the 11.8 million-dollar hardcourt event.

Sampras beat 81st-ranked Alex Radulescu of Germany 6-3, 6-4, 6-4, to set up a rematch with the man who pushed him to five sets in the round of 16 at Wimbledon, 15th seed Petr Korda of the Czech Republic.

"It will be tough fight," Sampras said. "He's a solid player. He's a dangerous player. He can get hot. I'm confident. I won Wimbledon. I have played well. I just have to maintain and try to improve every match."

Hingis beat 25th-ranked Russian Elena Likhovtseva 7-5, 6-2 and rose to 62-2 in 1997. Argentina's 42nd-rated Florencia Labat is her next foe.

"I have no reason to not be confident," Hingis said. "Every time I step on the court I know I can win. I can beat anybody in the world. It's a good feeling to go out on the court like this."

Croatia's Mirjana Lucic, a friend of Hingis', served notice she will be the WTA's next teen sensation, battling Czech veteran Novotna before falling 6-2, 6-7 (3/7), 6-3.

"I never played anybody who hit the ball as hard as she does," Novotna said. "It was difficult to come in as hard and as deep as she hit it. I'm glad to pull this one through. This will give me a

lot of confidence." Lucic, ranked 63rd, was the first player to win her WTA debut event, taking the title this year in May at Bol, Croatia. She also reached the final in Strasbourg in her second event. This was her Grand Slam debut.

Korda, who ousted Ger-

many's Martin Damm, has lost 11 of 15 career meetings to Sampras, including six of seven on hard courts. Korda never broke Sampras' serve at Wimbledon, losing 6-4, 6-3, 6-7, 6-7, 6-4.

"He was just too good," Korda said. The year's only men's Grand Slam champion aside from Sampras, ninth seed Kuerten, lost 6-3, 6-1, 7-5, to 17th-ranked Swede Jonas Bjorkman, whom Kuerten beat in the second round on his way to the French crown.

Corretja gave Dutchman Richard Krajicek a walkover due to a sore left thigh, joining a spectator list that includes third seed Yevgeny Kafelnikov, fourth seed Goran Ivanisevic and fifth seed Thomas Muster.

Krajicek might get another walkover Monday as 12th-

seeded Spaniard Alex Mantilla suffered severe back and leg pain in outlasting 191st-rated Dutch qualifier John van Lj, tum 6-7 (1/7), 6-2, 4-6, 7-6 (7/5), 6-2.

Seventh seed Sergi Bruguera is the highest remaining seed outside of Sampras and second-ranked Michael Chang, last year's US Open runner-up.

Corretja's default and Czech Daniel Vacek's 7-6 (7/4), 7-5, 6-2 ouster of 14th seed Mark Philippoussis left Mantilla the lone seed in a quarter of the draw that includes Britain's Greg Rusedski.

The ball-bashing Brit swatted 14 aces, including one at 141 mph and another at 139 mph on match point, to beat Germany's Jens Knippschild 7-6 (7/5), 6-3, 6-1.

Spain's top female seed, number seven Conchita Martinez, also bowed out, losing to Australia's 100th-ranked Rachel McQuillan 6-2, 7-5.

McQuillan trailed 5-2 in the second set before rallying, saving two set points to break Martinez in the ninth game, breaking her again to lead 6-5 and taking the match with a forehand winner.

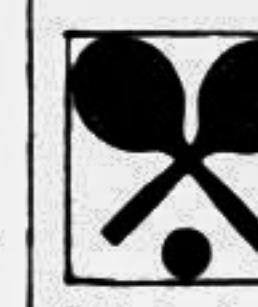
McQuillan will next face another Spaniard, 10th seed Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario, who ripped France's Alexandra Fusai 6-2, 6-1.

The only one of the new breed sporting a belly button ring is Olga Barabanschikova, the 17-year-old from Belarus. She served for the match against Florencia Labat at 5-4 in the second set, but let it slip away as Labat scored a 4-6, 7-6 (7-0), 6-1 victory.

A day after Venus Williams, who just turned 17, advanced with an upset of No 8 Anke Huber, Spain's 18-year-old Magd Serna, knocked off another seed, No 16 Kimberley Po 6-4, 6-3.

Patty Schnyder, Hingis' 18-year-old Davis Cup teammate from Switzerland, pushed Olympic gold medalist and No. 6 seed Lindsay Davenport before falling 1-6, 6-1, 6-4.

New kids ring the changes



NEW YORK, Aug 31 (AFP): Croatian 15-year-old Mirjana Lucic showed why she's champing at the bit to join the women's tennis

Tour full time Saturday, giving third seed Jana Novotna a scare at the US Open.

Lucic was a set and two breaks down when she launched a fight back that took her to a 3-1 lead in the third before Novotna, the third-ranked player in the world, finally won 6-2, 6-7 (3/7), 6-3.

Such a gutsy performance might be enough to satisfy some Grand Slam debutants but not Lucic.

"Yeah well, I really think I should have won this match," she said. "I had everything. I had the total match in my hands. I'm really not happy."

Although Lucic is not yet old enough to play full time on the WTA Tour, her results so far have given her every reason to be ambitious.

She celebrated her 15th birthday in March, and became the first player ever to win her first WTA Tour tournament when she captured the Bol Ladies Open crown on May 4.

She finished runner-up to Steffi Graf at her second WTA Tour tournament in Strasbourg.

"I wasn't thinking, it was great, first time for me to play on such a big stadium against third player in the world," Lucic said. "I wasn't thinking about that at all. That didn't impress me. I just didn't play my own game."

Novotna, who has three Grand Slam runner-up finishes, could certainly sympathise with Lucic's disappointment but she also thought the youngster should lighten up a little.

"It showed even on the court, that she was really serious," Novotna said. "She was sure she was going to win, what can I say. I think she should take it easier on herself, she has many more Grand Slam matches to come, she should enjoy herself."

But Lucic can't wait to join her friend Martina Hingis, the youngest player ever to hold the

world number one ranking, at the top of the tennis heap.

Hingis, 16, beckons that Lucic is the best of the rest of the teenagers, who seem to be taking over the women's game.

Long with Hingis herself, 17-year-old American Venus Williams has advanced to the fourth round.

Russian 16-year-old Anna Kournikova didn't quite make it, nor did 17-year-old Belarusian Olga Barabanschikova, but they certainly performed well enough to make their elders sit up and take notice.

"Well, they can't stay up there forever," Hingis said of the layers who are slowly ceding their places to the rising youngsters.

"Everything gets faster in women's tennis, everyone is improving. The girls, they get more athletic, everyone wants to be on the top. Everyone is getting better."

Hingis has little time for the

Soccer cliché

MOSCOW, Aug 31: At least 10 people were injured and many others arrested when fighting broke out between Spartak Moscow and Zenit St Petersburg in a Russian Premier League match on Saturday, Moscow police said, reports Reuter.

Russian news agencies said around 30 people had been injured of whom 13 had been taken to hospital and quoted police as saying it was the worst soccer violence so far this year.

League champions Spartak beat mid-table Zenit 2-0, maintaining their challenge for this season's title.

Records lowered at Sicily

SICILY, Aug 31: Clement Chukwu set a World University Games record and gave Nigeria their first medal when he won the 400 metres on Saturday, reports agencies.

Chukwu triumphed in 44.81 seconds, a personal-best which erased the Games' record of 44.98 set by Harald Schmid of West Germany in 1979 in Mexico City.

The Nigerian, running in the outside lane, surged through to the finish ahead of American Jerome Davis, second in 45.30, and Lenzual Laird of Jamaica, third in 45.54.

Roman Sebrle of the Czech Republic set a Games' record of 8,360 points in the decathlon to eclipse another West German record — the 8,348 points of Sigi Wentz from 1987 in Zagreb.

Allison Curbishley gave Britain their first medal on the penultimate day when she won the women's 400 metres in 50.84, edging Olga Kotliarva of Russia into second and Cuba's Idalmis Bonne into third.

Cuba also took gold and silver in the women's javelin, Iael Lopez winning with third round throw of 64.30 metres ahead of teammate Sonia Bisset's 63.46.

Bisset collapsed in pain after her third throw clutching her left calf. She was carried from the track and had to forfeit her final three throws.

In the men's basketball, the United States romped to a widely-predicted gold when they beat Canada 72-64 in the final. Brazil got past Italy 77-69 in the third-place game.

Italy beat Hungary 5-4 for the water polo gold, but the hosts lost two other team finals, going down to South Korea 15-7, 15-11, 16-14 in men's volleyball and to Hungary 45-33 in the women's team foil.

Chinese divers finished 1-2 in the men's platform, with Xiao Hailiang taking gold and Wei Jianhui silver.

Japan picked up gold and bronze in the men's 200 medley, and ended the US winning streak in relays at four by taking the 4x100 medley ahead of
