'Manju agreed to quit cabinet'

JP won't back this govt any more, says Ershad

TANGAIL, Sept 12: Jatiya Party Chairman H M Ershad today castigated the Awami League government for failure to run the country and said his party would not support it any more, reports UNB.

"The Awami League in its 14month reign didn't do a single good work ... There is no scope to support this government", he told a public meeting at Delduar thana parishad ground here.

"We supported AL to save the country from BNP's tyranny and hoped that it would work for the welfare of the people," he

He said JP will now play an opposition role, it will not only protest the government's misdeeds, but also launch resistance movement. "I have already told my party's Secretary General to quit the Cabinet and he pledged to do so."

"I'm neither pro-Awami League nor pro-Indian. We are pro-Bangladesh, Bangladeshi," said the JP chief.

The former President alleged that the AL government breached its pre-elections pledge for fixing jute price at Tk

500 and raised fuel price when it came down in the international market.

Referring to the country's fragile economy, he said, "I don't understand why an unsuccessful Finance Minister is not fired. The Energy Minister has also failed ...'

The former military ruler, who was deposed through a mass upheaval in 1990 after a nine-year rule, said there is no alternative to JP to run the country. He hoped that JP will form the next government.
