

## PM pays tribute to Teresa

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday paid tributes to Mother Teresa placing wreaths at the foot of the white casket where the body of the Mother was rested at the Netaji Indoor Stadium at Calcutta, report agencies.

Hasina attended funeral of the Nobel laureate, Christian Nun along with a good number of world dignitaries. She flew to Calcutta by a Biman flight in the morning and went straight to the Netaji Stadium.

Later, Hasina made a courtesy call on Indian President K.R. Narayanan and his wife at the Rajbhavan.

The Prime Minister also called on her Indian counterpart I.K. Gujral at the Rajbhavan.

Expressing her deep condolences at the death of Mother Teresa on behalf of her government, she said:

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# Millions bid farewell to Teresa

## 'Mother Teresa, you are immortal'

CALCUTTA, Sept 13: In a city of 12 million, so many seemed to know Mother Teresa personally, reports AP.

Lining her funeral route today, mourners said they not only knew of Mother Teresa but had met her, been inspired by her, seen someone cured by her touch.

"Mother Teresa blessed my elder brother when he had fractured his leg in a motor accident. That's what made him well," said David Simon, a Hindu hospital employee, who stood for two hours before Mother Teresa's body was brought out of St Thomas' Church for the funeral procession.

The five-kilometer route from the church to the indoor stadium where the funeral was held was less crowded than expected. At major intersections, however, scores of people tried to break through the bamboo barriers to catch a last glimpse of the woman who made her home among Calcutta's poorest.

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CALCUTTA, Sept 13: Almost a million mourners including world leaders bade farewell to Mother Teresa on her final journey through the rain-drenched streets of Calcutta today as India held a state funeral for the "Saint of the Gutters," report agencies.

Millions more across the world watched the funeral on televisions and paid tribute to her dedicated work with the poor and dying.

Gurkha soldiers fired three volleys to mark her burial at the end of a six-hour funeral that included a Vatican-led mass in an indoor stadium, homages from world dignitaries, and the simple tributes of ordinary people the nun had served.

Four buglers sounded the last post to end the state honours for the 'saint' who died of a heart attack on September 5 at the age of 87. In keeping with the wishes of her Missionaries of Charity order, the soldiers remained outside Mother House, the order's headquarters, as the private burial took place.

Earlier the wail of bagpipes and thump of muffled drums today accompanied Teresa's simple white coffin, draped with the Indian flag, through the streets of Calcutta, the nun's adopted home and resting place.

Thousands of children, Hindus, Muslims, Jains, Christians and Sikhs lined the funeral cortege route. They threw flowers and held up photographs, cut-out newspaper pictures and bouquets.

Monsoon rains which had held off for the first part of the funeral drenched the crowds waiting outside the indoor stadium, but failed to drive them off the streets for the last rain-soaked voyage to the Mother House.

## Sixth round of CHT talks begins today

The sixth round of talks between the National Committee on Chittagong Hill Tracts (NCCHT) and the Parbatya Chattagram Jana Samhati Samity (PCJSS) will begin at a state guest house today in a fresh bid for a permanent settlement of the CHT problem.

A military helicopter carrying the PCJSS delegation, led by its Chairman Jyotindra Bodhipriya Larima, will land at BAF base Bāshār from Duidukchhara in the early afternoon. The PCJSS delegation arrived at Duidukchhara yesterday.

The meeting has been rescheduled from September 7 because Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina was on a visit to the Philippines and Indonesia last week.

A two-member delegation of the Refugee Welfare Association, led by Upendra Lal Chakma had an unscheduled meeting with the Prime Minister at her office on Friday.

Details of the meeting were not available. But sources said

that they are hopeful about a breakthrough in the tomorrow's talks which they described as crucial for peace in the CHT.

The tribal refugees staying in camps in Tripura, India, since 1986, declined to return despite two visits by members of the NCCHT, the last one taking place recently. The leaders of the refugees imposed several new conditions for returning home. These included increased ration for the returnees for one year, providing the same amount of ration even to those who had returned in 1994 and early this year, resettlement of the returnees under the aegis of the UNHCR and the ICRC, reinstatement in jobs, raising the age limit for government jobs to 40 years.

The return of the refugees depends on the outcome of the current series of negotiations between the NCCHT led by Abul Hasnat Abdullah, Chief Whip of the Jatiya Sangsad and the PCJSS.

Earlier the meeting between the two sides ended in Dhaka on July 19 after five days of talks, during which both sides exchanged drafts of a proposed agreement to resolve the problems in the CHT.

The PCJSS wants removal of Bengali settlers from the CHT, withdrawal of security forces, constitutional guarantee for the concessionary powers the government wants to grant to a 'regional council' for the three hill districts. They want wide powers for the 'regional council' to levy taxes and run local governments and institutions.

But the NCCHT reportedly agreed on a maximum level of autonomy for the 'regional council', short of constitutional guarantees, which it explained, was not possible.

But the PCJSS leadership is under pressure from militants in its student and other front organisations. Recently renegades of PCJSS formed a rival group and increased pressure

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## Many killers are there in JS: Khaleda

## Foreign ministry officials asked

not to send secret info thru' e-mail

The Foreign Ministry has directed all its officials and missions abroad to refrain from using e-mail facilities for transmission of classified and top secret information as there is apprehension that the electronic mail of Bangladesh is being intercepted.

Confidential and secret messages transmitted from Bangladesh missions abroad through e-mail has "spread out" in many host countries due to possible interception, according to complaints received from Bangladesh missions.

A circular sent out by the Foreign Ministry to all its e-mail users dated September 7 issued an instruction to stop electronic mail facility. The circular has also mentioned the due to the interception of e-mail messages, the image of the country could be affected.

The Foreign Ministry circular did not mention who is responsible for intercepting the classified Bangladesh government information transmitted through e-mail.

It was learnt that e-mail facilities are being used by senior officials of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs for the last few months.

Earlier, a Foreign Ministry circular requested officials to use e-mail facilities to save costs, it was learnt.

A senior official of the ministry, when contacted, said that it was normal practice to send "sensitive" information through cyphercodes.

## 3 young men found dead in Feni in 24 hrs

FENI, Sept 13: Three young men were found dead here within a span of twenty-four hours in Sadar and Chhagalnaiya thanas, reports UNB.

Police recovered the body of an unidentified young man from Muhirganj under Chhagalnaiya thana early today.

Earlier on Friday morning, Beal Ahmed, 26, was killed at the Sadar hospital outdoor by some assailants. Hospital sources said the victim was poisoned to death.

The same day, police recovered the body of Imam Uddin, 18, from the staff quarter of Eastern Rice Mills, located in the local industrial area.

Motives behind the incidents could not be known. Separate cases were filed.

## BCL leader shot dead in city

A BCL leader was killed in the city yesterday.

Muklesur Rahman alias Babu, 30, president of Cantonment thana unit of Chhatra League was gunned down by an unidentified gang near a slum at South Kafirul at about 3 pm.

Police said Babu sustained fatal wounds in his head when the gang of about five armed men shot him following a previous enmity. He succumbed on the way to the DMCH at about 4:30 pm.

A resident of Ibrahimpur, Babu, who was accused in four criminal cases, was attacked following a conflict related to gaining control over the locality, police sources said.

The body was sent to the DMCH morgue for autopsy. None was arrested in this regard till last night.

## Over 100 shanties gutted in Ctg

CHITTAGONG, Sept 13: Chittagong City Corporation (CCC) today evicted some 500 slum dwellers from the city's Agrabad area for setting up a children's park, report agencies.

Witnesses said about 14 people, including two policemen, were injured in skirmishes and a fire broke out during the eviction of Jamboree Field Slum.

More than one hundred shanties were also gutted when rival gang set fire to the slum.

Six fire units with three pumps extinguished the fire in half an hour, police said.

Police said some angry inmates of the slum set it ablaze while trying to resist their eviction. But, slum dwellers blamed the police for the fire aimed to force them to leave.

Four platoons of police led by a magistrate were engaged in the CCC-initiated four-hour operation for clearing the slum that began at 9 am.

Authorities said despite repeated notices the occupants did not vacate the area selected for a park. The CCC had leased the site to a private company for developing the park.

## No talks unless nurses call off strike: Health Minister

"Unless the nurses of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BMU) call off their strike, I refuse to sit with their leaders for talks," Salauddin Yusuf, Health and Family Welfare Minister said yesterday.

While talking to The Daily Star the minister said, "I had asked for time up to September 30 during meetings with their representatives earlier to look into the matter but they ignored my call and called a strike. He termed the strike illogical."

"If the government decides to go ahead, it will take some time before placing the bill in parliament. I feel a political influence is working behind their movement. Majority of the nurses are opposing the idea of continuing strike but a section of their colleagues is obstruct-

ing them from joining."

"It is too early to call the strike. They should call off the strike at least for the sake of the patients. After all, it is a hospital. It will not bring anything good if they keep the patients in a state of emergency and sufferings. The 'negative' attitude of the nurses will bring no solution at all," he said.

The minister further said, "Discussions can decide about turning the BMU into an autonomous body. The floor is open. If they (nurses) desire they should avail the opportunity for open discussions if only the situation at the hospital becomes normal."

A leader of the Bangladesh Diploma Nurses Association (BDNA) when contacted said, "The decision to turn BMU into

an autonomous body will affect us in many ways. We will be deprived of all government facilities. Once it is an independent institution, the channel of communication will totally change. They will have the power to fire or punish us in whatever way they set the rules."

Describing the decision as "destructive," Taslima Begum, BDNA's International Affairs Secretary, said, "We shall continue the strike until the authorities withdraw the decision."

She suspected that a section of doctors belonging to Bangladesh Medical Association had a hand in the decision. "An autonomous BMU will greatly benefit the doctors"

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## Govt to import 50000 tonnes DAP fertiliser

The government plans to import diammonium phosphate (DAP) for use as fertiliser for the first time in the country.

An international tender has been floated to import 50,000 metric tons of DAP, official sources said.

Sources in the Agriculture Ministry told The Daily Star that DAP has at least three plus points. It has potential to replace TSP (triple super phosphate) gradually, its use will supplement urea and save the peasants from being cheated with smuggled SSP (single super phosphate) fertiliser from India, they said.

Besides phosphorous, DAP also contains 18 per cent urea. Due to increased demands for urea and its production shortfall in six urea plants in the country, government had to

give a huge amount of subsidy on the item in the last fiscal. There may be a shortfall of three to four lakh tonnes of urea in the current financial year, they said.

The country's lone TSP plant in Chittagong can meet only 15 per cent of the demand. A few years back, government's efforts to encourage TSP import through the private sector failed because the high-priced imported item could not compete with the highly-subsidized locally produced TSP.

Talking to The Daily Star, Food and Agriculture Minister Begum Motia Chowdhury said that the government would not give subsidy in marketing DAP. She hoped that private sector importers would go for import of DAP from next year if its im-

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
