

### Antonio anticipates the time

ROME, Sept 16 (Reuter): Just two games into the Serie A season, Antonio Angelillo fears that his all-time Italian league scoring record may not last the 40 years he hoped for.

Angelillo scored 33 goals for Inter Milan in the 1958-59 season but he said on Monday that two free-scoring weekends at the start of the Italian season had him worried

Argentine Gabriel Batistuta has scored five goals for Fiorentina while Brazil's Ronaldo is starting to fire up at

Inter. like to hold on to the record for at least another year to make it 40 years but this time the threat is concrete." Angelillo said. "Batistuta has made a great start, Ronaldo is getting into his stride, it'll be a

great championship. Batistuta scored a hattrick in a thrilling 3-2 victory at Udinese on the opening day and claimed two more at Bari on

Sunday. Ronaldo's debut Serie A goal came on Sunday in a 4-2 victory over Bologna, where Roberto

Baggio scored Bologna's two goals to take his total to three from two outings. In all, 62 goals were scored on the first two weekends of the

new campaign, 20 more than on the corresponding weekends last year.

The average game has yielded 3.44 goals against an average for the entire 1996-97 season of 2.63.

Although goal averages have generally fallen since World War Two, Inter's one-time leading marksman said it was just as difficult to score in the 1950s as in the 1990s.

"Thirty-three goals scored 40 years ago are no less valuable than 33 goals scored today," said Angelillo.

"Today, football is more difficult but even in my day attackers never had an easy life. There were man-to-man markers then as now and sweepers who never gave you space.'

Spirited Indian cricketers will be looking forward to clinch a decisive lead in the sive-game Sahara Cup series when they meet arch-rivals Pakistan in the crucial third match at the Toronto Cricket. Skating and Curling Club ground today.

The new-look Indian team, led by Sachin Tendulkar, hold a 2-0 advantage against Pakistan whose batting looked surprisingly brittle so far, scoring 188 and 116 runs respectively in two matches.

Only veteran Salim Malik appeared to be comfortable against the young new-ball bowlers of India and on the dicey pitch of Toronto.

Pakistan moreover will be without their experienced batsman Inzamamul Haq who was suspended for two matches following his confrontation with a spectator who reportedly hurled abusive words through a megaphone.

### Three rookies in Spanish squad

MADRID, Sept 16: Uncapped Atletico Madrid defenders Carlos Aguilera and Santi Denia were named on Monday in an 18-man Spain squad to face Slovakia in an important World Cup qualifier on

September 24, reports Reuter. Spanish national coach Javier Clemente has rewarded the two players with their first international call-ups after their outstanding displays for Atletico in this season's first three matches.

They fill the gaps left by Barcelona's Josep Guardiola. who is injured, and Abdelardo Fernandez, who has suffered a dramatic loss of form.

Spain, with two matches to come, top European Group Six with 20 points from eight games, ahead of Yugoslavia (20 from nine) and Slovakia (16 from eight).

Clemente has kept faith with Barcelona trio Guillermo Amor, Albert Ferrer and Juan Pizzi even though all three have been unable to command regular first-team places with the Catalan Club.

Bangladesh Cric-ket Board (BCB) yesterday named 30 players for the under-20 team camp which will participate in the World Youth Cup qualifying rounds scheduled to start in Hong Kong

from November 30. Around 400 cricketers took part in the preliminary trials last month from which 45 were initially selected for the net and after a two-week training these thirty have been selected for the camp which begins at the Dhaka Stadium next Saturday.

Bangladesh alongwith seven other associate members of the ICC in the Asian region -Maldives, Malaysia, Nepal, Singapore, Fiji, Papua New Guinea and hosts Hong Kong, will vie for the two continental berths at the 15-team final round of the World Youth Cup billed for a January 11, 1997. start in South Africa. In the two-group robin league format. Bangladesh have been placed alongwith Maldives, Malaysia and Nepal while the other group comprises the other four teams.

Apart the nine Test playing nations, Namibia and Kenya from African region and Ireland and Scotland from Euro-American region, will fea-ture in the final round.

According to the decision of the ICC, the associate members will be able to send their under-20 squad for the meet while the Test playing nations will have to filed their under-19 teams.

ternational amateur boxing tournament that bears his

Slowly, Muhammad Ali rose, smiled and rang the ringside bell three times to signal the opening of the inaugural Muhammad Ali Cup International Amateur Boxing Challenge at the Commonwealth Convention Centre.

Members of the 21 countries represented in the event marched into the arena bearing the flags of their home nations. The event is expected to raise more than one million dollars for a planned Ali museum and education centre in Louisville and several USA Boxing Youth programmes. It also will help determine members of the US team that will compete at the World Championships in

Budapest, Hungary, in October. "We are proud to be here on this unique occasion — a boxing competition in the name of the

greatest of the great boxers the world has ever produced," said Anwar Chowdhury of Pakistan, the president of the International Amateur Boxing Association. "It is my wish and desire that this tournament should become an annual feature.

"For a long time, we have been thinking about having tournament. Unfortunately, it never became a reality. But the magic name of Muhammad Ali was responsible for making it possible to have this tournament in this beautiful city.

Nearly 100 boxers from more than 20 nations are to compete in the tournament, including the US team's topranked boxers in 11 of 12 weight classes. The exception is lightweight, where the topranked boxer did not participate in the training camp.

Preliminary bouts are scheduled through Wednesday with the semifinals on Thursday and the championship bouts Friday. The week will be capped by a star-studded tribute to amateur boxing, featuring the first appearance of Mike Tyson and Evander Holyfield together since their June fight in which Tyson was disqualified for twice biting Holyfield on the ear.

The tribute will feature a mini concert by singer Natalie Cole; a reading of Ali's words by actor James Earl Jones; jokes by comedian and actor Jeff Foxworthy; and some lighthearted rounds of boxing, featuring the likes of Holyfield and Tyson taking on local celebrities, such as Kentucky basket-



With Monday marking three years until the opening ceremony, organisers are concerned over the slow sales of "gold memberships" for the stadium. These packages guarantee a seat for every day of the Olympics and for events at the stadium

for the next 30 years.

According to an internal memo, only one-third of 34,400 packages, at 7,500 dollars apiece, have been sold. The lack of interest from corporate Australia has jeopardized up to 120 million dollars of funding toward the 450 million dollar venue. The 110,000-seat stadium is the centerpiece of the Olympics, and the bulk of the money to build the stadium is to come from the special member-

ships. Atlanta, site of the 1996 Summer Games, had a similar problem when sales of commemorative bricks fell far be-

low projections. Sydney organisers are con-fident they can overcome the difficulties that beset the last Olympics, and they suspect the International Olympic Committee is keeping a wary eye on developments after Atlanta's hard-sell commer-

Australian Olympic Committee chief John Coates expects Sydney to be better than

Atlanta for the competitors. "The important thing is that


