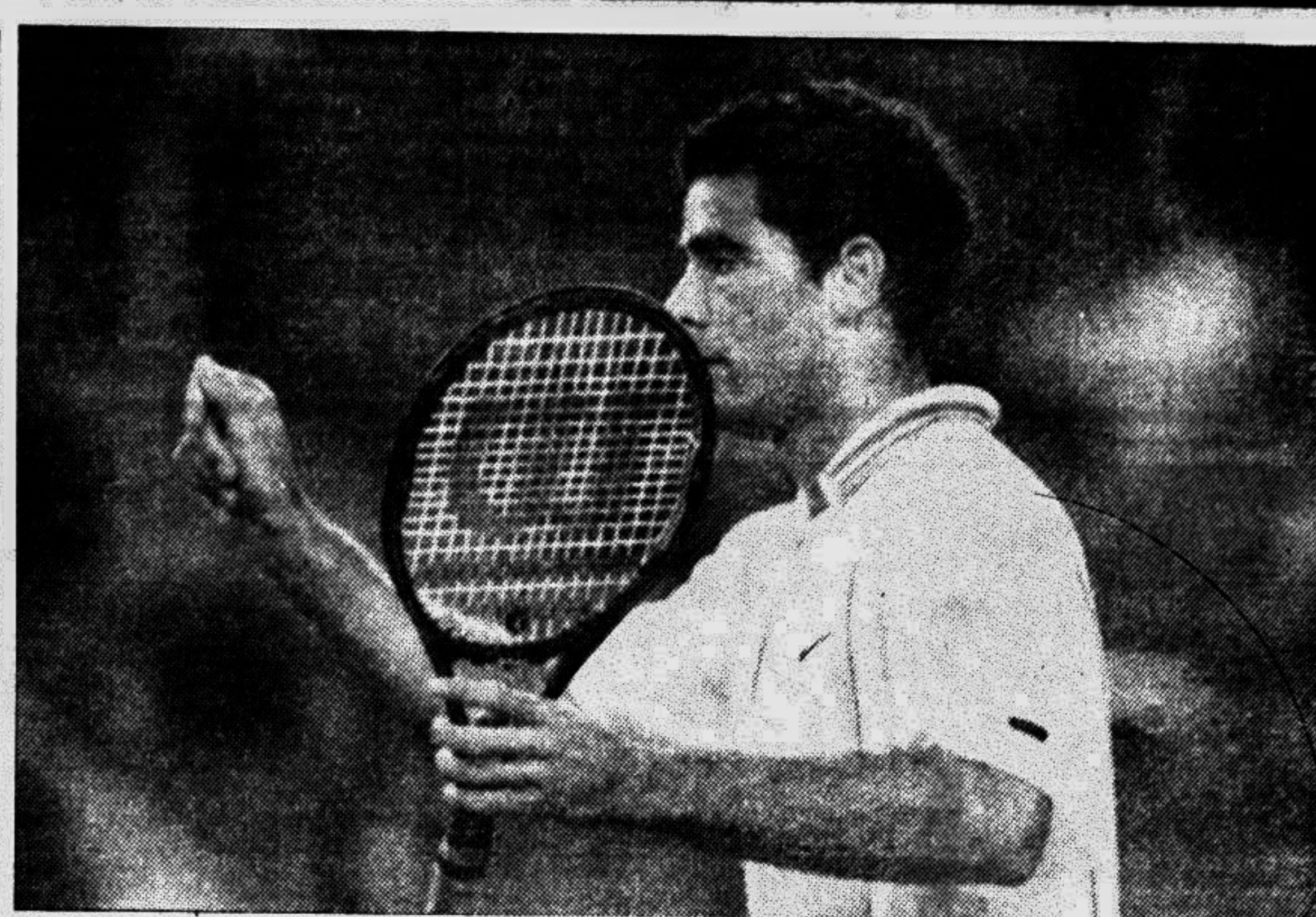
Green Delta hockey

AMSTERDAM, Sept 28: Tjani Babangida's seventh goal of the season maintained Ajax Amsterdam's 100 per cent record as they beat second placed Heerenveen 1-0 away in the Dutch First Division on Saturday, reports Reuter.

It was the first major test for the Amsterdammers after playing their first seven games against mediocre sides. There was also a measure of revenge involved after Heerenveen had beaten Ajax 2-0 last season.

Ajax, who play Maribor of Slovenia in the UEFA Cup on Tuesday, were the better of the two sides in an exciting match but it took them until the 57th minute before Babangida gave them the lead.

BONN, Sept 28: Kaiserslautern's improbable seven-game unbeaten streak was halted on Saturday when Werder Bremen upset the Bundesliga's top team 3-1 at their home Betzenberg Stadium. In another surprise, champions Borussia Dortmund lost 3-2 at home to 1860 Munich, reports Reuter.

Kaiserslautern managed to stay on top of the league with 19 points from eight matches, two more than Bayern Munich, who gained a point with a 1-1 home draw against Schalke on Friday.

"After we went ahead 1-0 we got a little too complacent," Rehlag added. "You could see at a fairly early stage that Werder were going to win. I tried to tell the team at halftime that we needed to be more aggressive in the second half."

Borussia Dortmund suffered a humbling defeat at home to 1860 Munich, who climbed to 10th from 15th. Dortmund, with nine points in eight matches, dropped five places to 12th.

"It is hard to find anything positive to say after such a defeat," said Dortmund trainer Nevio Scala.

"We played poorly in the first half and made big mistakes. We're having some bad luck at the moment. We have to work hard and believe in the future. It will definitely improve."
