

All 113 BNP MPs
to be in JS
standing bodies,
says Tofael

All the 113 MPs belonging to the major opposition party BNP will be accommodated in parliamentary standing committees.

This was said by Commerce and Industries Minister Tofael Ahmed while talking to newsmen at Awami League central office yesterday evening.

"We will accommodate three to four BNP lawmakers in each 10-member committee. I hope BNP will come and join the coming session of parliament," the AL stalwart said.

The Jatiya Sangsad is scheduled to go into winter session on November 2. The previous session was prorogued on September 4, with BNP continuing its abstention from attending it.

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11 killed in Jessore train accident

At least eleven people were killed and over fifty injured when an express train, allegedly ignoring signals, rammed a stone-laden freight train at Singair Station, twelve miles off Jessore town yesterday morning.

The driver of the Rocket fled the scene immediately after the accident.

The district administration organised the initial rescue operation which was beefed up by the arrival of a relief train at 1.45 pm from Khulna. Rescuers initially retrieved eight bodies and later pried open the carriage and recovered three bodies, including that of a child.

The bodies were sent to Jessore General Hospital for aut-

opsy. So far, only three bodies were identified. Those are of Billal Hossain, 25, Habib, 22, and Jahan Ara, 35 of Noapara under Abhoyanagar thana in Jessore.

Of the injured admitted to Jessore General Hospital, identities of 18 were available. They are Abdus Sattar, 38, Akmal Hossain, 40, Fazal Ali, 37, Ramjan, 40, Altaf Hossain, 20, Khokan, 22, Abul, 18, Zulfiqar, 40, Chanchal, 20, Abul Hossain, 22, Haider, 38, Habibullah, 35, Kamla, 34, Ukil Gazi, 45, Abu Kasem, 50, Hasanat, 37, Taleb, 40 and Shahjahan, 25, according to hospital sources.

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UN pays \$3.3m
more to
Bangladeshi
peacekeepers

Bangladesh has been paid a further amount of \$3.3 million US dollar for the services rendered by its troops to the United Nations Iraq-Kuwait Observer Mission (UNIKOM) and the UN Observer Mission in Angola (MONUA), reports UNB.

This has come about because of regular and persistent efforts made by Bangladesh at the United Nations, according to a message received in Dhaka from New York.

Foreign Minister Abdus Samad Azad, during a meeting last week reminded UN secretary general Kofi Annan about the special request made in October last year by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina to the then secretary-general for urgent payment of UN dues to Bangladesh.

Jt demarcation work
postponed fearing

CHITTAGONG, Oct 10: The joint demarcation work along Bangladesh-Myanmar border has been postponed fearing possible mine explosion in the areas, official sources said today.

The joint border survey was postponed by Bangladesh border security force on Tuesday last, six days after it was started, the sources said.

Of the 208 kilometer land border between the two countries, a stretch of 20 kilometers from Rejupara point to Lembuchhari are risky as mines remained planted there.

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CJ for quick
disposal of
cases

Chief Justice ATM Afzal yesterday reiterated his call to the sub-ordinate judiciary for quick dispensation of cases with qualitative justice, reports UNB.

"Quick disposal of cases is a must to ensure rule of law," he said addressing the concluding session of the 4th judicial administration training course at the Old High Court.

The Chief Justice emphasised the proper training for qualitative improvement of judges for quick dispensation and better judgement.

Judicial Administration Training Institute (JATI) organised the 21-day training participated by 37 subordinate and assistant judges from across the country.

The concluding function was addressed, among others, by Dr Ersadul Bari, Law Commission Member Justice Naimuddin Ahmed, Justice AKM Sadek and JATI Director Iktedar General Justice M Badruzzaman in the chair.

Addressing the function, a participant said 50 per cent of the recruitment of judges to the Supreme Court should come from the sub-ordinate judiciary.

BIT students clash
with shopowners
in Khulna: 7 hurt

KHULNA, Oct 10: A clash between a group of Bangladesh Institute of Technology (BIT) shopowners at Phulbari near the BIT campus today left eleven persons injured, police said.

At least four shops were looted during the clash.

Police lobbed twenty rounds of tear gas shells to bring the situation under control.

The injured persons include six policemen, three BIT students and two shopowners. They were injured with splinters of hand bombs, police said.

Police said that the clash took place after an altercation between a shopowner and some students over playing of carom and viewing TV programme on Thursday night.

Meanwhile, students of BIT have been asked not to leave the campus without prior permission.

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Govt will be given some more time: Khaleda

Leader of the Opposition in the Jatiya Sangsad Begum Khaleda Zia said yesterday she would give "some more time to the government to correct itself."

"Stop repression on the opposition, don't let loose the terrorists on the streets and refrain from undemocratic, anti-people and anti-state activities", she asked the government, blaming it for doing nothing good for the people during its 16 months in power.

"Time will come when we won't be able to stop the people (from taking to the streets) even if we sit idle", the BNP chairperson told a discussion meeting at the auditorium of the Engineers' Institution in the city, marking the seventh death anniversary of Naziruddin Zehad, a martyr in the anti-Ershad movement.

The discussion, organised by the Zehad Smriti Parishad, was attended by a large number of activists of the BNP and its front organisations.

In an oblique reference to the Awami League's forming the government with the help of Ershad's Jatiya Party, Begum Zia warned that the AL government would also face the same consequence that happened to JP in the face of people's movement. "Time is not far away when this government won't get any time to flee unless it gives up autocratic practices."

She also blamed the AL for sharing power and "allying secretly with the fallen autocrats before and after coming to power."

The BNP chief once again announced that her party was unwilling to go for hartals and street agitations and asked the government not to force her to adopt such options.

Begum Zia made it clear that banning street rallies or removing the bridge leading to Zia's mazar were not the issues for her party to go for agitation.

says in the citation, to have this convention gain even broader support," said Francis Sejersted, chairman of the Norwegian Nobel Committee that chooses the winner of the prestigious prize.

The committee cited Williams and the ICBL for starting a "process which in the space of a few years changed a ban on anti-personnel mines from a vision to a feasible reality."

The prize, worth 7.5 million Swedish kronor (one million dollars) is to be divided equally between Williams and the organisation.

After six years of quietly working toward a ban on anti-personnel mines, the campaign burst into the public consciousness with the August 31 death of Princess Diana, the cause's most visible supporter.

"We have noted that Princess Diana was one of those who were engaged in the cause. But there were very many people involved," Sejersted said.

The visibility of the campaign grew even more in September, when more than 90 countries drafted a treaty that would totally ban anti-personnel mines. However, the United States has said it would not sign the treaty, and Russia and China did not take part in the treaty talks.

According to the United Nations these are the 10 countries with the most land mines still in place: Afghanistan-9 million; Iraq-5 million; Pakistan-5 million; Cambodia-4 million; China-7 million; Western Sahara-1 million; Mozambique-1 million; Somalia-1 million; Bosnia-Herzegovina-1 million; and Croatia-1 million.

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218 rape, 44 acid-throwing incidents in 3 months

There were 218 incidents of rape, 44 of acid-throwing and 39 dowry-related deaths in the country during the July-September period of this year, the Coordination Council for Human Rights in Bangladesh (CCHR) has said.

Women and children are victims of human rights violation, it said and recommended strict enforcement of laws and,

noting that the rates of crime and human rights violation in rural and suburban areas were comparatively high, the CCHR strongly suggested that the authorities concentrate their "full attention" on those areas and that the judicial system be decentralised.

"Police, BDR, Ansar, VDP personnel usually work in the grassroots level. Their moral standard, family background and upbringing should be closely scrutinized before recruitment", the CCHR report said.

It also appealed to the government, political leaders and others concerned to analyze the report and take immediate appropriate measures to solve these burning problems.

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
