Repatriation of CHT refugees resumes Nov 21

AGARTALA, Oct 12: The fourth phase of repatriation of Chakma refugees, sheltered in six refugee camps in Tripura, will start on November 21, re-

ports PTI. The decision to resume the process of repatriation was taken after a visit to Dhaka last month by a delegation of Chakma leaders led by the President of the Jumma Refugee Welfare Association, Upendra Lal Chakma, according to the Welfare Association press release here today.

There were three earlier phases of repatriation on February 15, 1994, June 21, 1994 and March 29, 1997 during which a total of 12,300 Chakma refugees returned to Bangladesh. About 44,000 are still left in the six refugee camps in South Tripura district of Tripura.

At least 15 people were killed and over 700 injured in a hailstorm that hit Tongi yesterday evening and caused maximum casualties among thousands of devotees who gathered under a massive makeshift tin-shed pandal at the Biswa Ijtema ground.

Five bodies were kept at Tongi Hospital, three at DMCH while three were kept by the litema organisers. Four other bodies could not be traced immediately but police suspected those were taken by their rela-


