

232 runs. Bangladesh, who went into the match for an upset win against the only Test-playing nation in the fray, faced the harsh reality in the most punishing way as the Zimbabweans walloped their way to a huge total in 50 overs before their bowlers taking the centre stage.

Opener Andy Flower smashed highest 70 for his second consecutive half-century against Bangladesh while allrounder Guy Whittal, who scored a duck in the first match, hammered 52. Skipper Alistair Campbell chipped in with 40.

In reply, Bangladesh were off to a disastrous start losing six wickets for only 46 runs in the face of some hostile bowling from Zimbabwean left-arm seamer Brian Strang, who finished with six for only 20 runs. The holocaust started in the third over when Brian dismissed Bangladesh opener Athar Ali Khan for 9. He was ably supported by the leg-spin duo of brother Paul Strang and Adam Huckle who evenly shared four wickets among

For Bangladesh only four batsmen could reach the double figure mark with Minhazul Abedin Nannu top-scoring with 18. Tail-ender Hasibul Hossain Shanto made 16 while skipper Akram Khan and young rightarm seamer Safiuddin Ahmed Babu contributed 11 runs apiece in the paltry Bangladesh total. which included 16 extras.

Meanwhile, it was learnt that vice-captain Aminul Islam Bulbul, who sustained a knee injury, did not play in yesterday's match. He was replaced by Jahangir Alam.

Defender Massod Rana lobbed the ball to Nakib who headed the ball past the advancing Arambagh custodian Tony on his left.



Taylor hopes against hope



BRISBANE. Oct. 14: Australian Test skipper Mark Taylor refused to the Test and one-day sides. accept the obvious underlying mess-

nounced the first national oneday cricket side of the season and left him out, reports AFP. It was the first Australian team to be chosen since the Australian Cricket Board (ACB) announced a policy of choosing separate Test and one-day sides.

Selectors chose Taylor's Ashes Test deputy Steve Waugh to lead the side. One-day specialists, Darren Lehmann, Shane Lee, Michael

Di Venuto, Jan Harvey and Adam Dale were named for the October 28 match against Australian Cricket Academy graduates to mark the academy's 10th anniversary in Adelaide. Taylor admitted it could be an indication that he wasn't in-


cluded in the selectors' plans for this summer's one-day internationals even though ACB chairman Denis Rogers said the leadership appointments of Waugh and vice-captain Shane Warne were for one game only. "What they are saying is I'm

not in our best one-day team," Taylor said. "I'm sure a lot of people will read a lot into it and the selec-

tors have probably showed some of their hand by doing it." Taylor had been aware his

chances of making the side were slim although at the season launch he pressed his argument to retain one captaincy for both

"I would have liked to have played the game but I'm also a realist, knew it was a possibil-

ity I wasn't going to," he said. "This is a minor disappeintment at this stage. I've got three Sheffield Shield games and two others before the first Test (against New Zealand) to hopefully get picked in that, then to continue to impress to get in that first one-day side. Chairman of selectors

Trevor Hohns said the Australian team was chosen only for the academy game, preferring not to be drawn on the underlying issue of whether Taylor would play one day cricket in the new season.

"The team, or teams, is for one game only," Hohns said. "Certainly it is a pointer to the future but to the other question (of Taylor's position) I can't

answer that at the moment." The ACB's vision is to develop a specialist one-day outfit capable of winning the 1999 World Cup, repairing Australia's recent poor record in the abbreviated version of the game.




