BRISBANE, Oct 18: Champions Queensland registered their third highest score against New South Wales (NSW), but it was not enough to complete victory in their Sheffield Shield cricket match here today, reports AFP.

The match, which produced 1,305 runs and five individual centuries on a benign batting pitch, fizzled out to a draw when both captains called off play early with no hope of a result. Queensland took first innings points.

Kallis scored his highest Test score of 60 at Rawalpindi and followed it up with a fine 134 in a three-day match at Pe-
