KARACHI, Oct 24: Pakistan Test umpire Saleem Badar was put in quarantine after being detained by Karachi airport authorities on Thursday for not having a mandatory health certificate on his return from Kenya, reports Reuter.

Airport officials said Badar, who is on the International Cricket Council (ICC) panel of umpires, would have to serve six days in quarantine before being allowed out.

Badar, who was returning home after officiating in the three-nation President Cup tournament won by Zimbabwe, had failed to get himself inoculated against yellow fever, a mandatory requirement for travellers from African countries, officials said.

Badar is on a seven-umpire panel announced by the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) to supervise international matches this year.

Abbas for more cross-border fixtures

BHOPAL, Oct 24: Pakistan veterans cricket team captain Zaheer Abbas has called for increasing the number of matches between his country and India to reduce the tension that was visible when both teams played against each other, reports PTI.

Speaking at a function here last night, Zaheer said the Toronto incident could have been avoided if the organisers there had ensured that spectators did not shout slogans when the match was on.

Mohinder Amarnath agreed with views of Zaheer on having more matches between the two cricketing nations, the Toronto incident was something that every player experienced at one time or the other during his career, he said.

"A player should carry on with his game without bothering about what happens in the stands," he added.

Eventful day at Faisalabad

scored 239 in the first innings on the first day of the deciding third cricket Test here today, reports AFP.

In reply to South Africa's first innings, Pakistan were 41-2 at close, with both the openers Saad Anwar and Ali Naqvi back in the pavilion with just 3 and 11 runs respectively.

Ijaz Ahmed and Inzamamul Haq were at the crease with 15 and 12 respectively when bad light stopped play five overs short of schedule.

It was second time lucky for Kirsten, completing a magnificent but laborious fifth Test century which had eluded him at Rawalpindi by a mere two runs.

He carried his bat through the innings and finished 100 not out. Symcox hit a beltinger 81 and the pair added 124 precious runs for the eighth wicket to lead a recovery from a struggling 98-7.

Kirsten gave a sigh of relief when the official scorer confirmed his century following a one-run confusion in his individual score.

"It is highly satisfying for me and the best thing is that I saved my team," said 30-year-

old Kirsten.

Paceman Wasim Akram finished with 4-42 while Mushtaq Ahmed took three wickets and Waqar Younis bagged two.

South Africa lost seven wickets for just 98 runs in the first session of the day after Hansie Cronje won the toss and decided to bat. The last three wickets added an invaluable 141 runs with Kirsten motivating the lower order batsmen to stay at the wicket.

Kirsten hit 15 fours in his 300-minute innings. He became the fifth South African batsman to carry the bat through a complete Test innings.

Kirsten found an able ally in Symcox and both took the score from 98-7 to 218, adding 120 runs in the second session. Symcox hit the Pakistani spinners on all parts of the ground, hitting nine fours and two sixes in his 83-ball innings.

Symcox was finally bowled by Wasim Akram for 81 soon after tea. The Kirsten-Symcox stand is the best against Pakistan in all Tests, beating the 120-run eighth wicket partnership by Indian pair of Madan Lal and Syed Kirmani on this same venue in 1982-83.

Akram and Younis sent the first four South African batsmen for just 30 runs, adroitly exploiting the early morning moisture. Adam Bacher (1) and Brian McMillan (2) were Wasim's victims — both splendidly caught in the slips by substitute Mohammad Wasim.

Waqar then captured the wickets of Daryll Cullinan (0) and Hansie Cronje (9), both leg-before-wicket. Southpaw Kirsten remained unperturbed by his loss of partners, passing 2000 Test runs in his 32nd match.

Kirsten reached his fifty in 141 minutes with the aid of eight boundaries.

Lance Klusener added 34 runs with Kirsten but on the stroke of lunch he fell victim to leg-spinner Mushtaq. Mushtaq had earlier dismissed Shaun Pollock (5) and Dave Richardson (8).

Both teams made two changes for the series-decider. Pacer Waqar Younis and opener Aamir Sohail replaced Mohammad Wasim and Ali Husain Rizvi while the tourists included Dave Richardson and Allan Donald, leaving out Jonny Rhodes and Mark Boucher.

The first two Tests of the series ended in rain-curtailed draws.

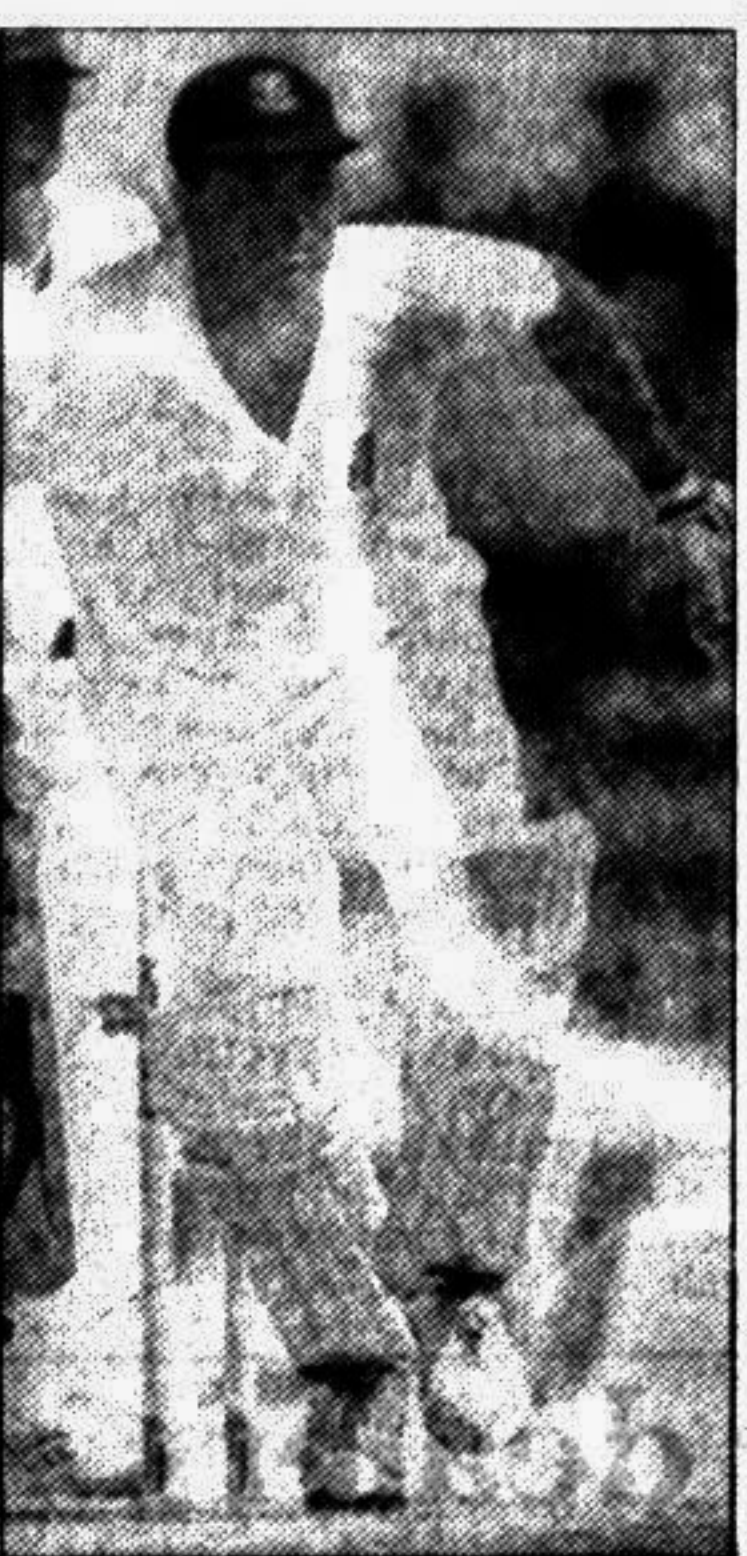

Kiwis in trouble

CAIRNS, Australia, Oct 24: New Zealand cricket coach Steve Rixon warned his batsmen to start making runs or face the sack as the Kiwis headed towards defeat in the opening match of their Australian tour Friday, reports AP.

New Zealand 190-4 in their second innings at stumps on the third day of the four-day game. Queensland hold an 185 run lead after batting once and are in a strong position to push for victory Saturday.

Rixon said he would bring in replacements from home if New Zealand's top order continued to bat poorly.

They struggled to cope with off-spinner Paul Jackson on Friday, raising fears of how they will cope with Australian leg-spinner Shane Warne in the three Test series starting November 7.

Captain Stephen Fleming, on 59, and all-rounder Chris Cairns, on 46, will resume Saturday.

"I know what we can do but we are not even remotely close at the moment," Rixon said. "I want these guys to be hungry for their positions and a lot of pressure is coming from back home."

The Kiwis trailed by 375 runs on first innings when Queensland declared at 571-9, opting not to send opener Martin Love back in after he had retired hurt for 201.

Teenage spinner Daniel Vettori finished with four wickets in Queensland's innings.

Agassi skips Paris Open

PARIS, Oct 24: Andre Agassi has turned down a wild card invitation and will not compete at the Paris Open, organizers said Thursday, reports AP.

The 2.1 million dollars event begins Monday with Pete Sampras being top-seeded.

Agassi was initially given a wild card since his ranking has dropped to No. 102 in the world, which has not qualified him for direct entry into the event.

Thursday organizers said in a statement that Agassi decided he was still short of competitive shape, following his early loss at the Stuttgart tournament this week where Todd Martin beat him.

Mark Philippoussis of Australia also withdrew because of a sore shoulder.

Defending champion Thomas Enqvist is questionable following his default from a match against Patrick Rafter due to a groin injury in Stuttgart.

ACA's next course of action

SYDNEY, Oct 24 (Reuters, AP): Australia's top cricketers have earmarked a commemorative one-day match on Tuesday for a possible boycott as part of their campaign for better pay and conditions, a newspaper report said today.

The players are considering their next move after the Australian Cricket Board (ACB) flatly rejected their demands for a pay increase and a greater say in running the game.

Local media reports said the match in Adelaide between Australia's one-day side and a team of past graduates from the country's cricket training academy was most at risk. The game was organised to mark the academy's 10th anniversary.

"Key players discussed industrial action by withdrawing from next Tuesday's match," the Sydney Morning Herald newspaper reported.

The paper said two domestic first-class Sheffield Shield matches, and a tour match between New Zealand and New South Wales next month would also be affected if the players' union called a strike.

Relations between the Australian Cricketers' Association (ACA) and the peak ruling body have soured badly since ACB officials walked out of a scheduled meeting between the parties on Wednesday.

ACA president Tim May called for a reopening of talks after briefing Australia Test captain Mark Taylor, one-day captain Steve Waugh and leg-spinner Shane Warne on the latest developments at a meeting in Sydney on Thursday night.

"The one thing that came out of the meeting (with Taylor, Waugh and Warne) was the players' absolute resolve to bring the document back to the negotiating table," May said.

"By not being prepared to discuss the players' proposals, the ACB, as their employer, has brought about a serious deterioration in the relationship between the players and the ACB," the former Test off-spinner said.

The players want a greater share of the ACB's revenues from sponsorship, television rights and gate receipts to be paid to them in higher wages.

They also want a right of veto on ACB decisions which affect players.

While senior players like Taylor and Warne are employed on ACB contracts worth more than 400,000 Australian dollars a year, the ACA claims many Shield players are paid about 20,000 and have little or no job security.

The ACB has revealed it paid 6.2 million Australian dollars in wages for the country's elite players during the 1996-97 season. It has not yet announced

its total income during the same period.

ACB chief executive Mal Speed said the ruling board was happy to discuss players' welfare but opposed the ACA demands, describing them as an attempt to take administrative control.

Meanwhile, ACB chairman Denis Rogers released a letter he sent to the country's professionals, explaining why the ACB walked out on players' association members 30 seconds into a meeting.

The ACA put a proposal at the ACB on Tuesday and was to resume talks on the contents on Wednesday. The ACB representatives walked out after delivering a 30-second statement.

Rogers invited the players to meet him in Melbourne next week for a full briefing on the ACB's finances.

He said that meeting would help put the ACA's pay demands in better perspective.

However, he made it clear that the ACA's veto demand, whereby they would have a say in scheduling and other ACB decisions, was the major sticking point in the row.

By making this "unacceptable" demand, the ACA had far exceeded the role the ACB envisaged for it.

Sampras sent packing

STUTTGART, Germany, Oct 24: Pete Sampras called it "hit-and-miss tennis." Unfortunately for the No. 1 in the world, it was Richard Krajicek who hit and Sampras who missed.

The big-serving Dutchman, who is turning into Sampras' nemesis, swept past the American 6-4, 6-4 Thursday to reach the quarterfinals of the Eurocard Open, reports AP.

"He played some big tennis and he served huge," said Sampras, who has won 10 Grand Slam titles but is 2-4 in his career against Krajicek.

The two had not met since the 1996 Wimbledon quarterfinals, when Krajicek ended Sampras' run of three straight titles and went on to win his only Grand Slam championship.

Asked if he had Sampras' number, Krajicek replied, "At the moment I am 4-2 up so, yeah, it's going pretty well. I am happy I won today to keep the winning edge over him. It's important for the next matches."

Krajicek broke service in the ninth game when Sampras hit a forehand passing shot long. The Dutchman served out the set.

Krajicek broke Sampras again in the ninth game of the second, this time when Sam-

pras hit a backhand volley into the net.

Sampras had three break points early in the match, one in the second game, and two more in the fourth.

Sampras had not played for more than three weeks before this tournament, taking a

only top eight seed left in the dir's 2.05 million tournament. The US Open champion struggled early in his first match and had to rally to beat German qualifier David Prinosil 3-6, 6-2, 6-1.

Like all seeds, Rafter had a bye in the first round. His second-round opponent, Thomas Enqvist, withdrew because of an injury.

In the quarterfinals, Rafter will play Todd Martin, who only made into the tournament as a lucky loser from the qualifications. Martin's serve and volley game proved too much for French Open champion Gustavo Kuerten, the 11th seed.

Martin won 6-3, 6-4.

Ninth-seeded Marcelo Rios defeated No. 7 Yevgeny Kafelnikov 7-6 (8-6) 6-3 and will next play Petr Korda, No. 15.

Korda led 6-3 when his opponent, Cedric Pioline, pulled out with a right shoulder injury. Pioline became the fourth player to drop out during the tournament because of injury.

Jonas Bjorkman, No. 13, beat Tim Henman 6-2, 3-6, 6-3 and will next play Nicolas Kiefer, who staged a tremendous comeback.

Kiefer, down two breaks in the decisive set, saved two match points and won five straight games to beat Paul Haarhuis, 6-7 (5-7) 7-6 (7-3), 7-5.

STUTTGART, Germany, Oct 24: Petr Korda upset Marcelo Rios and Jonas Bjorkman beat German upstart Nicolas Kiefer to reach the semifinals of the Eurocard Open Friday, reports AP.

Korda, the 15th-seeded Czech who is still seeking his first title of the year after losing two finals, ousted ninth-seeded Rios 6-3, 6-4.

Bjorkman, seeded 13th, also won in straight sets, winning 6-4, 6-2 against Kiefer.

Krajicek, who is seeking his fourth title of the year will play Magnus Larsson in the quarterfinals. Larsson beat Fabrice Santoro 6-3, 7-5.
