City's Dark Underworld

In every big city of the world, there is existence of an underworld of crime. Dhaka city is no exception in this regard. Even before independence and afterwards, the crime world has grown and expanded with the rapid spread of physical dimension of Dhaka city. Illegal arms trafficking, sales of drugs through a wide network, forcible occupation of lands, and extortion of money - all these have combined to strengthen the crime world gradually. According to sources concerned, the total number of "Godfathers" in the underworld is quite large approximately more than three hundred. These "Godfathers' are said to be holding the levers in controlling the underworld.

underworld, a long history of bloodshed and various other crimes is associated. Before the days of independence, old part of the city was the cradle of the underworld activities. In those days, the centres of terrorist activities were Narinda, Ganderia, Wari, Kaltabazar, Bangshal, Sheikh Shaheb Bazar, Azimpur, etc. After independence, it was alleged that a large part of the control apparatus of both old and new Dhaka went into the hands of those holding political power at that time. That marked the beginning of the underworld culture.

At the beginning of the postindependent era, a qualitative change was noticed in the underworld culture, particularly in the field of use of firearms. Previously, the main instruments for carrying on the terrorist activities were knives. cycle chains, hockey sticks and hatchets. These were subsequently replaced by pistols sten guns and hand bombs which were available in profu-

It is said that these "Godfathers" take care of the terrorists operating in the city. When any of this group is arrested, it is these "Godfathers" who exercise their influence in terms of

money or otherwise to get him out of the jail. It is also learnt that most of the so-called "Godfathers" are very influential people with established social standing. The majority of them are alleged to have political connections. Some of them are even said to have links with educational institutions and commercial interests.

According to the sources, a section of the business community maintain links with the city's underworld in the interest of their own security and also to ensure that suitable operatives of that group play a supportive role in any illegal business activity like smuggling and keep other terrorist groups which might pose dangers to their own patrons under proper vigilance

Dhaka metropolis has expanded far and wide. With such expansion, the number of strongmen claiming rights of operation in specific areas of the city has also increased. In this manner, the different areas of the city seem to have been carved up among such claimants who are leading figures in the underworld. The city dwellers have no inkling of such sharing of the city's operational areas.

In the heart of the city, Ramna area offers a vast field for operation of terrorists and toll-collectors, according to reports of law-enforcing agencies. The many markets in this area provide a lucrative source of funds for the operatives of the

underworld. The expanded areas of the city where the underworld operatives reportedly remain active include Gulshan, Malibagh, Purana Paltan. Shantinagar and Motifheel Colonies. According to police record, the large Mirpur area is marked as one of the crime zones. The Sayedabad area is

said to be another such zone. With the extension of the underworld, the centres for transaction of business in illegal firearms are also said to have proliferated. It is rumoured that the underworld operatives posses even such sophisticated weapons which the law-enforcing agencies lack. I is an intelligent guess that in the city, there are quite a good number of arms manufacturing units, most of which are of a floating nature. They are housed in rented houses and when the police get wind of their existence in any area, they are quickly shifted elsewhere to avoid police raids.

It is said that there are three tiers in the chain of command in the underworld. At the top stand the so-called "Godfathers"; in the middle there are "mini-godfathers" and at the bottom tier stand the terrorist and toll-collecting cadres. The large segment of such cadres are said to keep their focus of attention on real estate business and garments industries. The multi-storied housing projects and pre-shipment schedules of the garments industries are reportedly their main targets for toll collection.

Knowledgeable sources say that there are no last words about the underworld activities. as they are all the time expanding. The proliferation of city slums which in many cases serve as havens for the criminals compounds the problem of effective tackling of the rising menace.

Tk 37cr WASA project to meet city water needs

Dhaka Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (WASA) has taken up project to meet the demand for water in the most crisis prone areas of the city, specially in the old part, reports

The project costing about Tk 37 crore will be completed by June 1999 to add nine crore litres daily to the WASA's water supply, sources said.

Under the project, 15 new deep tubewells will be installed, 14 others re-installed and 90 kilometres of water pipelines

The ECNEC, while approving the project, discussed the system loss of 53 per cent which has been attributed to technical fault and alleged dishonesty of the meter readers.

The Dhaka WASA has un-

dertaken a step to detect leakage

in the pipelines and hoped it

would bring down the system To stop tampering by the me-tre readers, the WASA has handed over two of its six zones

to private management. In other areas, the trade unions have been integrated

with the responsibility of revenue collection and also to stop tampering in meter reading.

Pilferage of water deprives the Dhaka WASA at least Tk 50 crore each year in lost revenue and also compel millions of the city dwellers to drink polluted water, officials say.

They listed illegal connections, underbilling, improper maintenance and defalcation as the four basic factors which are responsible for the huge water loss.

Of the total system loss, about 20 per cent is due to technical reasons and nearly 33 per cent 'administrative' lapses.

About 65 per cent of the city population has access to or is connected with the WASA network and remaining 35 per cent obtained water from public connections or from illegal

The Dhaka WASA has a total of 151,000 connections in Dhaka city. Of these, about 90,000 are metered while 18,577 not included in the ledger book. Some 1,711 connection are ille-

From Page 1 members from 64 districts held a day-long meeting in the capital Monday to take stock of the situation.

The demand for urea at farmers level has fallen due to its high price compared to the low price of agricultural products, he said.

Explaining this, BFA executive secretary Abdul Baten said. "against the projected demand of 6,61,000 MT urea during the first quarter of the current financial year, we could lift only 4.40.000 MT urea till mid-October. Again, 1,25,000 MT urea remained unsold. Meanwhile, the initial high-

projection of 25 lakh MT urea demand for fiscal 1997-98 has been lowered to 21 lakh MT on the basis of consumption trend during the first three months of the fiscal.

The decision to lower the projection was taken at an inter-ministerial advisory committee meeting on fertiliser on Sunday

After revision of the demand, government is also expected to review the initial import target of five lakh MT of urea. So far, two and a half lakh tonnes have been imported. No fresh import would be required provided all the six urea fertiliser factories run by Bangladesh Chemical Industries Corporation (BCIC) maintain uninterrupted production.

According to officials, fertiliser market in the country in now steady and the price is under control due to some steps including prevention of smug-

ship, especially those having decades of political experience, maintains that they need some more time to mobilise and warm up the party rank and file across the country, before going for an allout agitation against the government.

"It is only natural that BNP will fight back government effort to curtail the people's constitutional rights to hold rallies and bring out processions, protesting mismanagement of the national economy," said one of the senior leaders, who prefers a go-slow. "But we need to get the party rank and file across the country well prepared, as well as ensure support of the commonman facing socio-economic hardship, to initiate a decisive movement against the government. It


would take some more time." The other section, comprising especially the younger ones,

asserts that the field level party activists are already prepared to go for an allout movement against 'government excesses' on the political opponents. Those with such attitude have now outnumbered the moderates in the BNP leadership, insiders said, adding that this section has a role in discouraging the party negotiators to positively respond to the AL call for a dialogue.

"The ruling party does not allow us to speak inside Parliament, it has virtually imposed ban on holding political rallies. Backed by the police, the ruling party activists have already started attacking our processions. Besides, the government has resorted to harassing thousands of BNP leaders and activists by filing false cases," an excited young leader of the party said, adding: "It is high time to begin fighting back the Awami League."

Replying to a question, he said that there was no scope for negotiation with the AL, "as the party is habituated to breaching contracts."

However, some moderates in both the parties separately told this correspondent, requesting anonymity, any tough line would virtually prove counter productive to the nation and the parties as well.


